


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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT:

We of Pascas are in awe of the achievements of the leadership, government and bureaucracy of Jordan for what they have achieved for their people of 11.5 million including 3 million refugees, given the young median age of 24.5 years, the very limited natural resources which includes being a water deprived nation, and the difficult neighbourhood that Jordan resides within. Jordan ranks second highest globally by the number of refugees per capita. Jordan has become a respected leading in education and health and has capitalised on its tourism industry, all with moderate gross domestic product per capita and instability throughout the region.

THE PRODUCT:

Understanding culture in Jordan is like unwrapping a story, a story unique to a particular community. So, what's Jordan's story, you ask? It's a diverse tapestry, interwoven with tangible and intangible elements distinct to its people. This includes **values**, **norms**, **beliefs**, **traditions**, **and various historic events and locations** that set a nation apart from the rest.

The **culture of Jordan** is the product of its geography and distinct historical evolution, which is closely connected to an intricate several thousand-year history.

The Middle Eastern Arab country of Jordan is located on the Jordan River's East Bank. Due to its location at the crossroads of the three continents of Europe, Asia, and Africa, the country's culture is influenced by Arabic, Islamic, and Western elements.

Future reforms are expected to introduce more interactive and practical learning approaches, fostering creativity and innovation among students. Collaboration with international educational organisations could further enrich Jordan's curriculum, helping to meet global educational criteria – and surpass same!

Moreover, the role of vocational and technical education is anticipated to expand. As the labour market increasingly demands specialised skills, Jordan must ensure that its education system provides alternative pathways that equip students with practical expertise. Strengthening partnerships between educational institutions and industries can facilitate the alignment of training programs with economic needs, offering students applicable skills and enhancing their employability.

CHALLENGES FACING the HEALTH CARE SYSTEM of JORDAN

One of the primary issues with the healthcare system in Jordan is the limitation of resources. Despite the government's efforts to enhance healthcare infrastructure and services, the growing population and increasing demand for medical care often outpace available resources. This shortfall can lead to longer wait times for patients and sometimes inadequate treatment options.

Another significant challenge is the disparity in service delivery between urban and rural areas. In cities, healthcare facilities are generally better equipped and staffed, whereas remote regions often lack access to essential medical services.

The impact of regional crises, including conflicts and refugee influxes, has also placed additional strain on Jordan's healthcare system. Existing healthcare infrastructure has faced challenges in adapting to the distinct health needs of refugees, further complicating service delivery.

NATIONAL INFRASTRUCTARE PROGRAM SUPPORT

Nothing is more urgent than the implementation of water security infrastructure. This will also need to involve neighbours as the scarcity is not unique to Jordan.

The completion of the railway network is required not only throughout Jordan but linking to neighbours.

Road infrastructure requires long term upgrades to bring about safety as well as address the issues arising from the high population influx.

Long term national infrastructure programs need to be defined and financially supported.

SOCIAL FOCUS to MITIGATE

There are the rising rates of depression among refugees, many of whom carry the trauma of war and prolonged displacement, paired with a critical lack of support.

About 80% of Jordan's refugees live below the poverty line, with 60% in extreme poverty.

The unemployment rate is still above the pre-pandemic levels (22.6%), especially among women (29.4%) and the young (46.1% among those under 25 years).

Only 14.7% of women within the working age contribute to the country's workforce compared with 39.49% worldwide. Nevertheless, there is a high percentage of female undergraduate students in Jordan (i.e. 55%) and this number increases to 65% among healthcare students. The country has maintained a steady average growth rate of 2.5% over the past decade. However, there is room for improvement in generating more job opportunities for Jordan's young population and for bringing more women into the labour market. Jordan's labour force participation rate was 33.0% in Q2-2023 (and only 13.8% for women).

Gender can unfortunately play a role in salary variations, with men often earning more than women for equivalent roles, highlighting the gender pay gap. Females working in the private sector in Jordan earn 41% less than their male counterparts. The wages gap between females and males is unconsciousably large!

Ensuring the mobilisation of a very educated female population in Jordan presents a huge potential as one of the key factors of economic stability in a dynamic region. No economy can advance to its full potential unless both women and men participate fully. Being half the world's population, women have an equally important role in driving economic growth.

The incidence of road traffic accidents (RTA) is particularly high (i.e. 18/100,000 inhabitants).

The smoking rate in Jordan is one of the highest in the world, with a prevalence of 70.2% among adults. The male/female ratio is 53.6% /46.4%.

The prevalence of obesity in the Jordanian population is 44.2% in men and 47.8% in women.

The number of hospital beds in Jordan (i.e. 4.4/1,000 inhabitants) is relatively low compared with other countries (i.e., 12.65/1,000 inhabitants in South Korea). There is a need to increase the number of hospital beds and bed occupation efficiency, which requires further reinvestment in the infrastructure and a better management of resources.

Jordan has a high number of physicians, dentists, and pharmacists per 10,000 inhabitants and a relatively low number of nurses.

The Government of Jordan is implementing a three-track, 10-year Political, Public Sector and Economic Modernisation Agenda that was launched in 2021. Reforms focus on democratising political life, including by empowering women and youth; doubling Jordan's growth rate; creating one million new jobs; improving living conditions; promoting sustainability and strengthening government effectiveness and accountability

The OLD WAYS are to GO!

This time in history is to see the dismantling of all institutionalised systems and practices that controllers have imposed upon us all. High level controllers have been removed from their positions of power and those remaining will see their temples of authority disintegrate around them. misery and joys to set in place a host of possibilities for the new friend to consider, embrace and take control of their newly revealed possibilities, pathway and potential independence.





The Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan is a small country with few natural resources, but it has played a pivotal role in the struggle for power in the Middle East. It is a key ally of the United States.

After the Arab revolt against the Ottomans in 1916 during World War One, the region was partitioned by Britain and France, with the Emirate of Transjordan established in 1921 and becoming a British protectorate. Jordan became independent in 1946.

Jordan captured the West Bank in the 1948 Arab-Israeli War and annexed it until Israeli forces took it during the Six Day War in 1967. Jordan gave up its claim to the territory in 1988, and in 1994 became the second Arab state to sign a peace treaty with Israel.

It is home to some two million Palestinian refugees. Since start of the civil war in Syrian, it has seen an influx of some 1.4 million Syrian refugees, placing a substantial strain on its resources and infrastructure.

King Abdullah II, Jordan's monarch since 1999, has extensive powers. He appoints governments, approves legislation, and can dissolve parliament.

Faced with demands for political reform in the wake of the popular uprisings across the Arab world in 2011, the king dismissed his government at the time and appointed the first of a series of prime ministers to oversee the introduction of political changes, but concerns over living costs and financial issues have led to regular street protests.


Proportional representation was introduced in the Jordanian parliament in the 2016 general election, a move the king has said will eventually lead to establishing parliamentary governments.

MEDIA



Jordanian media take care not to cross red lines in their reporting. These include criticism of the political system, the monarchy, the military and religion. Editorial curbs are often enforced through self-censorship, rather than coercion or repression. Outlets linked to the state take a strong progovernment line, while private media are more likely to criticise specific government policies.

Some key dates in Jordan's history:

- **3600-1200BC** Bronze Age sees the emergence of fortified towns and urban centres.
- 1200-332 BC Kingdoms of Ammon, Edom and Moab flourish during the Iron Age.
- **c.740-720BC** Area conquered by the Neo-Assyrian Empire.
- **605-539BC** After the collapse of the Assyrians, area incorporated into the Neo-Babylonian Empire under Nebuchadnezzar the Great.
- **539-330BC** Becomes part of the Persian Achaemenid Empire under Cyrus the Great.
- 330BC Greeks under Alexander the Great conquer the area.
- **323BC** Alexander dies. His empire splits among his generals and much of Jordan is subsequently disputed between the Ptolemies in Egypt and the Seleucids in Syria.
- **3rd Century BC-100AD** During this period the Nabataean kingdom flourishes through control of much of the trade routes of the region from its desert capital, Petra.
- **63BC** Roman general Pompey the Great annexes the region which becomes a Roman province.
- **324AD** Roman Empire splits into West and East. The Eastern Roman Empire later known as the Byzantine Empire continues to control or influence the region.
- **636** Arab conquest. Byzantine forces decisively defeated by Muslim armies at the Battle of Yarmuk.
- **c. 650** Umayyad dynasty make Damascus the capital of their empire.
- **750** Abbasids overthrow the Umayyads and move their capital to Baghdad.
- 969-1070 After the decline of the Abbasids, Jordan is ruled by the Fatimid Caliphate.
- 1115-1187 Becomes part of the Crusader Kingdom of Jerusalem.
- 1187 Battle of Hattin. The Crusaders are defeated by the Kurdish leader Salah ad-Din, the founder of the Ayyubid dynasty.
- **1260** Mongol invasion; Mongols defeated by Egyptian Mamluk forces at the Battle of Ain Jalut.
- **1400** Turco-Mongol leader Tamurlane sacks Aleppo and Damascus.
- **1516** Ottomans conquer region and incorporate it into their empire.
- 1914-18 World War One.
- **1916** Great Arab Revolt. Encouraged by Britain and France who want to militarily weaken the Ottoman Empire, and driven by long-term resentment towards the Ottoman authorities and growing Arab nationalism. The revolt is led by Sharif Hussein of Mecca.
- **1921** Emirate of Transjordan established with Abdullah, Hussein's son, as emir.
- **1946** The United Nations recognises Jordan as an independent sovereign kingdom.

- **1948** State of Israel created in British-mandate Palestine. Thousands of Palestinians flee Arab-Israeli fighting to West Bank and Jordan.
- 1950 Jordan annexes West Bank.
- **1951** King Abdullah assassinated by Palestinian gunman angry at his apparent collusion with Israel in the division of Palestine.
- 1952 Hussein proclaimed king after his father, Talal, is declared mentally unfit to rule.
- 1957 British troops complete their withdrawal from Jordan.
- **1967** Israel takes control of Jerusalem and the West Bank during Six-Day War, leading to major influx of refugees into Jordan.
- **1970-71** Jordan expels Palestinian Liberation Organisation armed camps from the country in the Black September conflict.
- 1994 Jordan signs peace treaty with Israel, ending 46-year official state of war.
- 1999 Hussein dies. His eldest son Crown Prince Abdullah succeeds to the throne.
- **2011** Political turmoil in Arab countries reflected in street protests over political reform and the cost of living.





Why do many Israelis emphasise the original British Mandate for Palestine including the whole of modern (Trans-) Jordan? Do they think the Jews could have successfully populated the entire Mandate territory both west and east of River Jordan?



Ah, another "what-if" question...



OK, let's give it a swift try using a hefty measure of speculation.

So, the original mandate did include both sides of the River Jordan as can be seen above.

And this is how it looked like after the Brits split it by selling it to the Hashemites, most likely assuming, in their patronising self-righteousness that Arabs would prefer to move to the eastern part since it was ruled by Arabs, even if they were foreign to the land...

Boy, were the Brits wrong!

Now, considering the fact that the Jews at the time, especially in Europe had over 6,000,000 Jews more than in 1945 (some migrated before and during WW2 and some were, well, as we all know, exterminated), when the original mandatary map was drawn upon all its 120,000+ square km, could accommodate most of the Jewish people (say 13,000,000) with less sparsity than Argentina or Australia...

And here is where a calculator comes in handy.

Unified mandate for Palestine – 120K km with say 13,000,000 Jews and some 7,000,000 Arabs (We cannot know how keeping the mandate unified would affect the Arab population, so I will have to speculate that without Jordan in the picture, the Middle East would have a different dispersion of those work immigrants that eventually make up the Palestinian people) would make a population density of 166 per square km.

Argentina – 2,780K square km with 46 million (2024) yields an average density of 16.5

Australia – 7,688K square km with 27 million (2024) yields an average density of 3.51.

But let's look a bit closer to home.

Saudi Arabia – 2,150K square km with 37.5 million (2024) yields an average density of 17.44

And last but not least, Egypt – 1,010K square km with 117 million (2024) yields an average density of 115.84.

So, if you're worried that the land would be empty, rest assured that just as current Israel (with an average population density of 47 per square km) took a great part of its deserts and made them into crop-yielding land, sustaining considerable population, I have a feeling that most of the original land would be populated and cultivated with less sparsity of all those mentioned above.


Israel–Jordan relations are the diplomatic, economic and cultural relations between Israel and Jordan. The two countries share a land border, with three border crossings: Yitzhak

Rabin / Wadi Araba Crossing, Jordan River Crossing and the Allenby / King Hussein Bridge Crossing, which connects the West Bank with Jordan. The relationship between the two countries is regulated by the Israel–Jordan peace treaty in 1994, which formally ended the state of war that had existed between the two countries since the establishment of the State of Israel in 1948, and also established diplomatic relations, besides other matters. Relations between the countries get strained from time to time, usually over tensions at the Al-Aqsa mosque. On 8 October 2020, Israel and Jordan reached an agreement to allow flights to cross over both countries' airspace.

Jordan helped Israel by intercepting Iranian drones during the strikes in Israel in April 2024.

From 1950 until it was occupied by Israel in the Six-Day War of 1967, the West Bank was governed as part of Jordan, though it was divided from the Jordanian population of the East Bank by the Jordan River. The relationship between the East and West banks was uneasy, both because of Palestinian suspicions of the Hashemite dynasty and because of the aspirations of Palestinians in the West Bank for a separate state. The web of relationships connecting the two halves of Jordan grew during this period, however, and by 1967 the West Bank represented about 47% of Jordan's population and about 30% of its gross domestic product.

The Jordanian constitution recognizes the Jordanian occupation (1949-1967) of land obtained in an aggressive war against Israel as an inseparable part of the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan. In fact to this very day, even with a dramatic change to that very same constitution, nearly every Arab living on the West Bank of the Jordan River could still claim citizenship in Jordan. They are subjects of the Jordanian king.



Background

After World War I and the dissolution of the Ottoman Empire, the League of Nations awarded Britain the mandate to govern much of the Middle East. In 1921, Britain demarcated from Palestine a semi-autonomous region of Transjordan and recognized ABDALLAH I from the Hashemite family as the country's first leader. The Hashemites also controlled the Hijaz, or the western coastal area of modern-day Saudi Arabia, until 1925, when IBN SAUD and Wahhabi tribes pushed them out. The country gained its independence in 1946 and thereafter became the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan.

The country has had four kings. Long-time ruler King HUSSEIN (r. 1953-99) successfully navigated competing pressures from the major powers (US, UK, and Soviet Union), various Arab states, Israel, and Palestinian militants, the latter of which led to a brief civil war in 1970 that is known as "Black September" and ended in King HUSSEIN ousting the militants.

Jordan's borders have changed since it gained independence. In 1948, Jordan took control of the West Bank and East Jerusalem in the first Arab-Israeli War, eventually annexing those territories in 1950 and granting its new Palestinian residents Jordanian citizenship. In 1967, Jordan lost the West Bank and East Jerusalem to Israel in the Six-Day War but retained administrative claims to the West Bank until 1988, when King HUSSEIN permanently relinquished Jordanian claims to the West Bank in favour of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO). King HUSSEIN signed a peace treaty with Israel in 1994, after Israel and the PLO signed the Oslo Accords in 1993.

Jordanian kings continue to claim custodianship of the Muslim holy sites in Jerusalem by virtue of their Hashemite heritage as descendants of the Prophet Mohammad and agreements with Israel and Jerusalem-based religious and Palestinian leaders. After Israel captured East Jerusalem in the 1967 War, it authorized the Jordanian-controlled Islamic Trust, or Waqf, to continue administering the Al Haram ash Sharif/Temple Mount holy compound, and the Jordan-Israel peace treaty reaffirmed Jordan's "special role" in administering the Muslim holy shrines in Jerusalem. Jordanian kings claim custodianship of the Christian sites in Jerusalem on the basis of the 7th-century Pact of Omar, when the Muslim leader, after conquering Jerusalem, agreed to permit Christian worship.

King HUSSEIN died in 1999 and was succeeded by his eldest son and current King ABDALLAH II. In 2009, ABDALLAH II designated his son HUSSEIN as the Crown Prince. During his reign, ABDALLAH II has contended with a series of challenges, including the Arab Spring influx of refugees from neighbouring states, the COVID-19 pandemic, the effects of the war in Ukraine, a perennially weak economy, and the Israel-HAMAS conflict that began in October 2023.

Jordan has a population of more than 11.5 million inhabitants as of 2024. Jordanians (Arabic) are the citizens of Jordan. Around 94% of Jordanians are Arabs, while the remaining 6% belong to ethnic minorities, including Circassians, Chechens, Armenians and Kurds. In early 2016 about 30% of the population were non-citizens, a figure including refugees, legal and illegal immigrants. Jordan's annual population growth rate stands at 3.05% as of 2023, with an average birth rate of 2.8. There were 1,977,534 households in Jordan in 2015, with an average of 4.8 persons per household.

Quick Facts Jordan, Population ...

The official language is Arabic, while English is the second most widely spoken language by Jordanians. It is also widely used in commerce and government. In 2016, about 84% of Jordan's population live in urban towns and cities. Many Jordanians and people of Jordanian descent live across the world, mainly in the Gulf Cooperation Council Countries, United States, Canada and Turkey.

In 2016, Jordan was named as the largest refugee hosting country per capita in the world, followed by Turkey, Pakistan and Lebanon. Jordan hosts refugees mainly from the Palestinian territories, Syria, and Iraq, as well as smaller communities from other nations. There are also hundreds of thousands of workers from Egypt, Indonesia and South Asia, who work as domestic and construction workers.

Definition

The territory of Jordan can be defined by the history of its creation following events after the end of World War I, the League of Nations and redrawing of the borders of the Eastern Mediterranean littoral. The ensuing decisions, most notably the Sykes–Picot Agreement, which created the Mandatory Palestine. In September 1922, Transjordan was formally identified as a subdivision of the Mandate Palestine after the League of Nations approved the British Transjordan memorandum which stated that the Mandate east of the Jordan River would be excluded from all the provisions dealing with Jewish settlement west of the Jordan River.

Arab

Arab Jordanians are mostly either descended from families and clans who were living in the cities and towns in Transjordan prior to Jordanian independence in 1946, most notably in the governorates of Jerash, Ajlun, Balqa, Irbid, Madaba, Al Karak, Aqaba, Amman and some other towns in the country, or from the Palestinian families who sought refuge in Jordan in different times in the 20th century, mostly during and after the wars of 1948 and 1967. Many Christians are natives especially in towns such as Fuhies, Madaba, Al Karak, Ajlun, or have Bedouin origins, and a significant number came in 1948 and 1967 mainly from Jerusalem, Jaffa, Lydda, Bethlehem, and other Palestinian cities.

Druze

The Druze people are believed to constitute about 0.5% of the total population of Jordan, around 32,000 people. The Druze, who refer to themselves as al-Muwahhideen, or "believers in one God," are

concentrated in the rural, mountainous areas west and north of Amman. Even though the faith originally developed out of Ismaili Islam, most Druze do not identify as Muslims, and they do not accept the five pillars of Islam.

Bedouin Arabs

The other group of Jordanians is descended from Bedouins, of which less than 1% live a nomadic lifestyle. Bedouin settlements are concentrated in the south and east of the country.

Afro-Jordanians

An unknown but considerable number of Jordanians are of African descent.

Armenians

There were an estimated 5,000 Armenians living within the country in 2009. An estimated 4,500 of these are members of the Armenian Apostolic Church, and predominantly speak the Western dialect of the Armenian language. This population makes up the majority of non-Arab Christians in the country.

Assyrians

There is an Assyrian refugee population in Jordan. Many Assyrians have arrived in Jordan as refugees since the invasion of Iraq, making up a large part of the Iraqi refugees.

Turks

There are people of Turkish ancestry living in Jordan. These people have had a thriving presence in Jordan since the rule of the Ottoman Empire. Today, there is a minority of about 60,000 people in the country who are the descendants of the Ottoman-Turkish immigrants. As of 2009, there are also 8,262 Turkish citizens who are recent migrants to Jordan.

Circassians

By the end of the 19th century, the Ottoman Authorities directed the Circassian immigrants to settle in Jordan. The Circassians are Sunni Muslims and are estimated to number 100,000 to 170,000 people.

Chechens

There are about 10,000 Chechens estimated to reside in Jordan.

Doms

There are around 70,000 gypsies in Jordan.

Refugees

Jordan is a home to 2,175,491 registered Palestinian refugees. Out of those 2,175,491 refugees, 634,182 have not been given Jordanian citizenship. Jordan also hosts around 1.4 million Syrian refugees who fled to the country due to the Syrian Civil War since 2011. About 31,163 Yemenis and 22,700 Libyan refugees live in Jordan as of January 2015. There are thousands of Lebanese refugees who came to Jordan when civil strife and war and the 2006 war broke out in their native country. Up to 1 million Iraqis came to Jordan following the Iraq War in 2003. In 2015, their number was 130,911. About 2,500 Iraqi Mandaean refugees have been resettled in Jordan.

Genetics

Bahri et al. (2011) observed that the Jordanians have a genetic profile that is Arabian Semitic, despite the succession of several civilisations in Jordan. They have a common origin in Mesopotamia and are not too genetically dissimilar from the peoples of the United Arab Emirates and North Africa, who respectively have a common origin in Arabia and North Africa.

Zanetti et al. (2014) discovered significant genetic differentiation between general Jordanians and Bedouin Arabs. General Jordanians were more similar to other Middle Eastern populations whilst Bedouin Arabs were more similar to North Africans. However, the Bedouin Arabs played a significant role in the "peopling" of Jordan, both in the past and present.




Health and education

Jordan prides itself on its health services, some of the best in the region. Qualified medics, favourable investment climate and Jordan's stability have contributed to the success of this sector.

Jordan has a very advanced education system. The school education system comprises 2 years of preschool education, 10 years of compulsory basic education, and two years of secondary academic or vocational education, after which the students sit for the General Certificate of Secondary Education Exam (Tawjihi). Scholars may attend either private or public schools.

Access to higher education is open to holders of the General Secondary Education Certificate, who can then choose between private Community Colleges, public Community Colleges or universities (public and private). The credit-hour system, which entitles students to select courses according to a study plan, is implemented at universities. The number of public universities has reached (10), besides (17) universities that are private, and (51) community colleges. Numbers of universities accompanied by significant increase in number of students enrolled to study in these universities, where the number of enrolled students in both public and private universities is estimated at nearly 236 thousand; 28 thousand out of the total are from Arab or foreign nationalities.

The Integration of Refugees

The rationale for integration

- 1. Ideally, the situation of being a refugee is not permanent. In practice, the refugee will either return voluntarily to his or her home country when the conditions that forced him or her into exile have been reversed, or will have to find a lasting solution within a new community either in the country of first refuge or in a third country.
- 2. The 1951 *Convention relating to the Status of Refugees* and its 1967 *Protocol* place considerable emphasis on the integration of refugees. The Convention enumerates social and economic rights designed to assist integration, and in its Article 34 calls on States to facilitate the "assimilation and naturalisation" of refugees.
- 3. The rationale of the *Convention*'s framework is that gradually refugees should be able to enjoy a wider range of rights as their association and ties with the host state grow stronger. In this sense, the 1951 *Convention* gives refugees a solid basis on which they can progressively restore the social and economic independence needed to get on with their lives.
- 4. UNHCR has consistently advocated for beneficiaries of subsidiary protection to be accorded the same level of integration facilities as persons recognised as refugees under the 1951 *Convention*. Their need for international protection is equally compelling and frequently as long in duration as that of refugees. Integration measures for persons granted subsidiary protection would also enhance their capacity to contribute productively to the societies which have accepted them.

Integration is a two-way process

- 5. The integration of refugees is a dynamic and multifaceted two-way process which requires efforts by all parties concerned, including a preparedness on the part of refugees to adapt to the host society without having to forego their own cultural identity, and a corresponding readiness on the part of host communities and public institutions to welcome refugees and meet the needs of a diverse population. The process of integration is complex and gradual, comprising distinct but inter-related legal, economic, social and cultural dimensions, all of which are important for refugees' ability to integrate successfully as fully included members of the host society.
- 6. Virtually all European countries have sizeable refugee populations who are likely to remain in their midst. A good number of them are doing well economically in their new societies, and many have become citizens. But far too many others have not been integrated whether economically or socially. Unemployment and underemployment is endemic, many who want to naturalise find barriers to citizenship, and residential and social segregation continues in some countries.

7. In the Republic of Cyprus, 454 people were granted refugee status and another 1,792 subsidiary protection at the end of 2013. These are all people who live year after year with little hope of ever returning to their home countries. While the Republic of Cyprus has achieved a lot since the introduction of the national asylum system twelve years ago, a lot more remains to be done in the area of integration. Although refugees are by law entitled to the same socio-economic rights as nationals, there are a number of impediments they have to contend with in their integration efforts. This would range from problems of access to subsidised housing and practical barriers that may make it difficult for refugees fully to enjoy the right to work, to challenges relating to the recognition of their academic and professional qualifications, restrictions on family reunification and stringent criteria for naturalisation.

Integration is a continuum

- 8. A key question to be asked is at what point integration programs for refugees should start. Upon application for refugee status? After recognition of refugee status? Upon the granting of citizenship?
- 9. Every refugee is first and foremost an asylum-seeker. A good reception policy for asylum-seekers is therefore vital to the would-be refugee's eventual integration in legal, psychological and social terms. It is in the best interests of both the host society and asylum-seekers and refugees to promote a reception policy with a long- term perspective. Refugees who began their life in the host country in detention, or isolated for several months in a state of enforced inactivity at a collective reception centre for asylum-seekers are likely to be hampered when they later attempt to integrate.
- 10. The conditions in which asylum-seekers find themselves during the immediate reception stage are therefore of important significance as regards the future possibilities for integration. A reception policy that combines effective and adequate services (in particular as regards skills training, access to gainful employment and health care) with a swift asylum procedure and that is based on giving asylum-seekers as much autonomy as possible would increase the chances of successful integration in the host country.

Conclusion

11. There is no "one-size-fits-all" approach to integration. The situation of refugees must be analysed in the context of the respective host society and with regard to the living and working conditions of nationals. However, it is also clear that international events, discourses and frameworks have an important impact on the integration of refugees and respective policies at the national and local level. There are a number of broad goals of integration that apply across countries. These include efforts to enable refugees to reach and develop their full potential, to protect their human rights, prevent their marginalisation, and foster social cohesion and harmonious co-existence.

Promoting integration through social connections

The focus of this section is on ways in which resettlement countries can provide assistance and support to refugees to enhance social connections in the receiving community. Refugees will need to navigate various practical tasks in an unfamiliar environment, often with limited fluency in the language of the receiving community. Providing early social support can help reduce anxiety and assist resettled refugees to gain a sense of control and independence. Early positive relationships in the receiving community have other benefits, such as restoring a refugee's sense of belonging. This type of support can be facilitated by integration caseworkers, youth workers, volunteers (i.e., buddies, mentors). Whenever possible or relevant, resettled refugees should be placed close to family members. The support provided by family is a vital resource in the integration process.

Supportive relationships with members of established refugee and diaspora communities can also help resettled refugees to build their connections with the receiving community. Through these connections they can access other important integration resources such as employment, volunteering opportunities and a wider social network, as well as opportunities to participate in wider community activities.

Social connections between resettled refugees and members of diaspora communities are particularly important in this regard. Supporting refugees to reconnect with the cultural and religious institutions that are familiar to them can assist them in maintaining their cultural integrity while building a new identity in the receiving community. At the same time, it should be kept in mind that some refugees might not seek contact with the refugee community of the same origin due to personal circumstances and reasons for flight from their country of origin.

Checklist

When establishing a new programme, think about:

- Establishing processes and services to address the different needs of resettled refugees during the integration process.
- Establishing placement policies to enhance social inclusion.
- Identifying opportunities for resettled refugees to participate in local cultural, community and recreational events.
- Incorporating information about family reunion provisions and settlement support programmes in orientation information provided to resettled refugees.
- Support for the development of volunteer programs in the community.
- Professional development and support for integration caseworkers and volunteers, including language training for interpretation.
- Building the capacity of integration-related services that support resettled refugees.
- Building and supporting the capacity of refugee-led and community-based organisations.
- Determining the feasibility of establishing a community sponsorship programme to engage individuals, local communities and organisations in the reception and integration process along with appropriate training, support and monitoring for sponsors.

Factors affecting access to social support available to refugees

The benefits of social support are well established. Studies in a number of countries indicate that individuals with supportive relationships in their family and community have better physical and mental health than those with limited or lesser quality support. Social connection is especially important for resettled refugees with psychosocial needs and for those facing particular integration challenges, such as women at risk, older refugees and refugee children and young people. As indicated in the section on

planning programmes many resettled refugees will have experienced disruption to supportive relationships and to connections with their communities in the course of their flight and experiences in the country of asylum.

Most resettlement countries have arrangements in place to ensure that resettled refugees:

- Have access to basic integration resources and systems.
- Have access to some form of specialised social support and assistance to build supportive relationships and connections in the receiving community.

Personal contact between resettled refugees and members of the wider community, meanwhile, helps to foster mutual understanding and empathy and to promote greater community understanding of and support for refugee resettlement and diversity more generally.

Resettled refugees who have been adequately supported in their integration process will have a greater sense of motivation to become part of their new communities. They will also contribute their skills and attributes if they feel they are part of the community.

A number of factors may influence the support available to resettled refugees, including:

- Their fluency in the language of the receiving community.
- Their psychosocial needs. For example, uneasiness or anxiety may prevent refugees from accessing
 formal social support service as well as developing supportive relationships with people in the wider
 community.
- Their health condition. For example, complex medical needs can mean a family has added barriers in accessing support available;
- Their age, gender, and diversity.
- Their family composition. For example, loss or separation from family members can result in unaccustomed social roles such as a refugee becoming a head of household or being without extended family support.
- Whether they have family members in the receiving community or established links with support networks.
- Background context. For example, resettled refugees from rural communities may require more
 intensive support to deal with the process of integration, particularly if settling in highly urbanised
 communities.
- The extent to which support services, in particular those that serve refugees, are developed.
- The existence of established refugee and/or diaspora communities and their capacity to provide support.
- The broader social climate in particular, the extent to which newcomers are welcomed; the level of understanding of the refugee experience; and the extent of support for refugee resettlement.

Planning issues to consider

The long-term objective of integration programs is to ensure that resettled refugees have access to the same level and quality of services as nationals, and that refugees come to feel part of their new community. However, refugees may have particular and intensive support needs in the immediate post-arrival stage, which are unlikely to be met by existing services available to nationals. For this reason, a number of countries have established specialised services to assist new arrivals with long term integration support, see for example section on integration casework management section.



In some countries the primary responsibility for integration and social support lies with the government. Social support is an area where it is important to engage other partners, among them nongovernmental agencies (NGOs), grassroots initiatives, refugee-led organisations and volunteers from receiving communities. They tend to be locally based, have a wider support network and a detailed knowledge of local resources and systems.

Mainstreaming of integration services

Some countries integrate the services they provide to refugees in the services they provide to nationals. This can be an effective way to quickly immerse refugees in their new communities. Mainstreaming offers refugees and nationals equal treatment and opportunities, while targeting and addressing specific needs that refugees may have. Having reviewed the range of services they provide, countries often decide to add specialised programmes to support integration because it can address gaps in refugee-specific support and expertise. Specialised services are normally tailored to meet the needs of specific refugee populations and, within them, the specific needs of individual refugees. Mainstreamed services must also evolve, of course, to reflect the changing profile of a population.

Effective Inclusion of Refugees Toolkit

This toolkit, developed by UNHCR and the Migration Policy Group, provides participatory approaches for practitioners at the local level. The toolkit builds on the practical experiences of municipal authorities and local actors in translating national policies into solutions such as appropriate housing, access to documentation and social and economic inclusion. These solutions work best when refugees are fully included in their design and development. Refugees bring a wealth of skills, and experience and a willingness to contribute to their new communities. We know that refugee participation in decision-making helps to build confidence in exercising basic rights and fostering a sense of belonging and trust in host communities. Participatory approaches lead to smarter policies and more impactful programmes. Yet managing the effective participation of diverse constituencies can be challenging, especially when meeting refugees' needs in project design. This tool is designed to help local authorities do exactly that.

Initiatives to build social support

Volunteer programmes

Volunteers are well placed to offer personalised, flexible and informal support and can serve as mentors for resettled refugees. In most countries, volunteers fulfil supplementary rather than core integration functions. Involving volunteers in delivering services to refugees adds value to the service, creates a broader social network and fosters positive interactions between resettled refugees and the wider community. For example, social and leisure activities, support with language and befriending schemes. The assistance they give refugees who have specific needs, for example older refugees or one-parent households, can be especially valuable.

Rossana Leal and her family fled Chile in 1976 when she was nine years old after her father was detained by the Pinochet regime. Having been resettled by UNHCR from Argentina, she always remembers the warm welcome that the family received from the small mining village in Scotland – with a party, bagpipes and toys for the children, and the coal shed that winter remaining stocked by generous villagers. This was her inspiration years later when, moved by the plight of Syrians arriving in Europe, she set up the Buddy Scheme in Hastings, UK. Wanting to recreate the welcoming environment she had experienced, Rossana pairs locals with refugees, and together they share meals, visit local sites and festivals, run sewing groups, driving lessons and children's activities. Rossana's volunteer work has created a community of more than a hundred people who are forming new friendships and providing hope, as refugees build a new life in the UK.

Some countries offer befriending, buddying or mentoring programs. Usually, the volunteers in such programs provide transport, assist with language learning, give guidance on services and local activities, accompany them to appointments, etc.

Volunteer programs are not 'cost neutral', requiring considerable investment, ongoing support, and monitoring, including:

- identification of suitable volunteer candidates;
- screening to ensure that they explore their motivations, understand their obligations and that they are aware of the boundaries of their role. Many volunteer programs also require routine police clearances to optimise the safety of clients;
- ongoing training and support;
- quality assurance and accountability measures;
- debriefing mechanisms;
- oversight to ensure volunteers are not exploited, especially if they are from the refugee community;
- public liability insurance.

USA

The New York HOME program, has volunteers take on essential roles in welcoming refugees and asylum seekers. HIAS harnesses the capacity of private citizens to foster social, economic, and civic integration. Volunteers are recruited through congregations and other organised communities to fill essential roles and make a financial contribution as families are getting on their feet.

Capacity building in refugee and diaspora communities

Established refugee and diaspora communities can help receiving communities prepare for new arrivals, in addition to extending hospitality and support themselves. Local community actors, including faith-based groups, community associations and student societies, also play critical welcoming and support roles. In some countries, the authorities formally develop partnerships and networks with community stakeholders and local media to promote welcoming and integration initiatives.

Members of established refugee and diaspora communities have contributed to the social support of resettled refugees: They can provide:

- Language skills a particularly important resource in countries where formal interpreting and translating services are limited or costly.
- Cultural skills they can serve as 'cultural consultants' or 'cultural interpreters'. 'Cultural interpreters' who use their knowledge to assist refugees to better understand cultural differences and practices.
- An understanding of the demands and requirements of resettlement based on their own experience.
- Links with social and business networks and religious and cultural institutions.



Importantly, engaging refugee communities in the provision of social support is one way of ensuring refugee involvement in the planning and development of services. Resettlement countries have sought to build the capacity of refugee communities to provide support by:

- Offering training and professional development programmes to members of refugee communities working in social support roles in either a paid or voluntary capacity. These can range from highly formalised, accredited programmes through to relatively informal peer training.
- Work force development initiatives aimed at supporting refugee-led and other community-based organisations.
- Providing funding and technical support to facilitate the development of support services and associations for refugees.

Issues to consider in engaging refugee community support

Members of existing refugee communities have a critical role to play in building social connections for recently resettled refugees. Experience suggests that the following are factors to be taken into consideration:

- Former refugees bring language and cultural knowledge. However, they may need some support to acquire the skills needed to fulfil their role (e.g. setting boundaries, confidentiality, or providing information about the systems and resources available to resettled refugees in the receiving community).
- Access to debriefing will be particularly important because exposure to traumatic histories of other refugees may serve as triggers of their own experiences, or those of close relatives and friends.
- Efforts should be made to recognise the work carried out by former refugees engaged in voluntary roles. For example, in a number of countries, training programmes for volunteers are accredited or voluntary work is given formal recognition, which can enhance future employment prospects for participants.
- Refugee community support volunteers can maintain an ongoing dialogue with integration caseworkers in the receiving community which can facilitate resettled refugees' integration.

A decision will have to be made on whether to engage existing refugee communities to support newly resettled refugees. This would be based on the specific context in the resettlement country and the cohort of resettled refugees. There may be religious, ethnic, political and clan-based diversity within refugee communities which may influence their suitability to provide support to all newcomers.

Building the capacity of sponsors



Community sponsorship programmes provide an opportunity for individuals, local communities, and organisations to be directly engaged in the reception and integration of resettled refugees. Broadening the number and types of actors involved in supporting refugees can increase access to protection and solutions for refugees and build positive voices in support of refugees more broadly. All programs would normally have in place training and ongoing support for sponsors. For more information on training of sponsors, see for example:

Community sponsorship programmes

Community sponsorship presents another model of integration. Most community sponsorship programmes have been developed relatively recently. State practice is developing in three directions:

- **Sponsored resettlement:** Sponsorship as a tool for reception and integration support for refugees who are referred by UNHCR for resettlement and matched with a sponsor.
- Support for refugees admitted through complementary pathways: Sponsorship can also be used as a tool for reception and integration to support refugees who are admitted through a complementary pathway, such as education, employment or family reunification.
- Named sponsorship: Sponsorship as a pathway allows communities, individuals or institutions to sponsor and support the entry and stay of named or nominated individuals. The short-hand way of labelling such programmes would be "named sponsorship".

UNHCR recommends that during the design and building of community sponsorship programmes there should be a focus on three general principles:

- Additionality community sponsorship programmes can expand solutions for refugees and in doing so, do not diminish government-assisted programs but rather enhance them through support of UNHCR-referred refugees. The aim is to effectively contribute to an increase in international responsibility-sharing;
- 2. **Protection focus** community sponsorship programmes should not endorse or encourage selectivity. The primarily focus should be on individuals with resettlement needs that are referred by UNHCR;

3. **Safeguards** – community sponsorship programmes should not diminish State responsibility for protection and solutions. Community sponsorship programmes should also be underpinned by a safety net of government support and rights consistent with international protection standards.

Video - Canada

When Syrian refugee Rabiaa Al Zhouri and her family first arrived to Antigonish, Canada, they didn't know how they would become members of the community. Welcomed and supported by a group of sponsors, the family quickly found their niche.

Different sponsorship models:

• United Kingdom

The UK Community Sponsorship programme supports the UK's existing Syrian Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Scheme (VPRS). All cases are UNHCR-referred. The government matches UNHCR referred refugees with sponsor groups. The program was limited to the Syria situation but will be global and additional as of 2020. For more information, please click here.

Canada

In addition to the government assisted refugee programme (GAR), Canada has one of the longest-running Private Sponsorship of Refugees (PSR) programme. The PSR is principally a 'named' programme for non-UNHCR referred cases that are identified directly by sponsors. Sponsors could be charitable organisations or groups of five individuals. More recently, Canada introduced the Blended Visa Office-Referred (BVOR) program which connects UNHCR-referred refugees with sponsors. For more information, please click here.

Ireland

Ireland's community sponsorship programme is intended to support resettlement at increased levels from previous years and meet ambitious resettlement targets that were unlikely to be met through the government delivered programme. Similar to the UK's, all cases are UNHCR-referred. The government matches UNHCR referred refugee with sponsor groups. It started as a pilot in 2019, but was formally launched in November 2019.

• Argentina

Argentina's programme is technically a humanitarian admission programme since refugees are not provided with refugee status but have a pathway to citizenship. The programme started as a 'named' programme but has evolved to include UNHCR referrals further to UNHCR advocacy. The program is limited to the Syria situation, but Argentina has announced it's the intention to expand the program to all nationalities in 2020/2021.

Germany

Germany's Community Sponsorship Programme was announced in February 2018. The pilot aims to admit 500 refugees by the end of 2020. First arrivals occurred in November 2019. The target population of the program mirrors Germany's resettlement quota allocations in 2019. Building the capacity of existing social support services

At all stages of the integration process, resettled refugees will have contact with social service providers, such as teachers and health care professionals. There are a number of ways in which countries have sought to enhance capacity to extend support to resettled refugees, including:

- Providing professional development programmes to people working in key social support positions (e.g. teachers, health care professionals).
- Work force development initiatives aimed at enhancing the number of personnel with bilingual skills.
- The development of resource materials (such as videos and manuals) to enhance professionals' understanding of the refugee and resettlement experiences.
- Special funding programmes to support services and systems to build their capacity to meet the needs of refugee communities.

Placement policies

Social connections can be optimised through placement practices. While these are discussed in greater detail in placement section, the following criteria are important:

- The presence of established refugee and diaspora communities and family members.
- The availability of formal social support and targeted services that recognise the different needs of diverse groups.
- The extent to which the location has a tradition of welcoming and supporting newcomers.

Mutual support programmes

Supportive relationships between resettled refugees at comparable stages of their integration can be fostered either through formalised support groups or by linking people with similar needs and experiences with one another. This has been done, for example, through creating WhatsApp groups or other format. This approach also provides refugees with the chance to share experiences with someone in a similar situation.

UK – Community Development Workers

The British Refugee Council include community development workers as part of their resettlement teams. Community development workers enable newly arrived refugees to identify their needs and aspirations, and to encourage them to pursue set goals. This is done through assisting resettled refugees to develop and take part in social, cultural, recreational and other community activities. These workers promote initiatives that create links between resettled refugees and the wider community. The ultimate goal is to promote the successful integration of resettled refugees through community initiatives that may include areas such as **health**, **employment**, **housing**, **education and training**. Focusing on community development can also encourage communities to be more open to diversity and share experiences and learning, whilst recognising **the importance of retaining culture and identity**. Good practice features

Overall, a sound integration programme would:

- Engage government, non-government agencies and the refugee and wider communities in building social connections.
- Develop strategies for enhancing the capacity of refugee communities to offer support to newcomers.
- Develop strategies to ensure that social support services provided to nationals are accessible to resettled refugees.

Specific programmes established to enhance social connections for resettled refugees would:

- Provide language assistance.
- Engage refugee communities in planning and implementation.
- Promote mutual benefits for both resettled refugees, the receiving society, individuals and volunteers providing support.
- Provide or facilitate access to support by removing practical barriers (childcare, transport, translation, etc.).
- Promote participation of nationals to programmes that support social connections.
- Provide culturally sensitive and age appropriate support.
- Take account of the needs of the whole family as well as individual family members, including refugee children and youth.
- Build connections and supportive relationships between resettled refugees and wider local communities.

Jordan can be regarded for a typically Arab country for its people are very warm, friendly and hospitable. Jordanians are typically happy to forgive foreigners who break the rules of etiquette. However, visitors seen to be making an effort to observe local customs will undoubtedly win favour.

Joining local people for a cup of tea or coffee can be a wonderful way to learn more about local culture. If you are invited yet are unable to attend, then it is perfectly acceptable to decline. Place your right hand over your heart and politely make your excuses.

Many families, particularly in rural areas, are very traditional and, if you visit their house, you may well find it is divided between the men and women. Foreign women are often treated as "honorary" men.

Local women in Jordan enjoy considerable freedom when compared with many other countries in the region. Women are entitled to a full education, they can vote, they can drive cars, and they often play significant roles in business and politics. Arranged marriages and dowries are still common.



Despite that Jordan's culture is extremely influenced by the western traditions, it has in common Arabic and Islamic characteristics, which shape a lot of Jordanians' behaviours, traditions and customs. It is also affecting the daily life activities of people, who are known with their generosity and lovely attitude. Because of Jordan's location at the intersection of the three continents (Africa, Asia, and Europe) of the ancient world, it has become a global meeting place for multiple cultures in the present as in the past. This is evident in several respects like the traditional clothing and music. As you can see that Jordan is influenced by its neighbours especially in clothing and music, it also has imported potion of interests from other distant cultures as in sports like football and basketball, where they are coming from Europe and United States.

Most Jordanians live in the capital city of **Amman**, where you can see the impact of western cultures especially from Europe and America on the daily life, and this is reflected in music, the arts, filmmaking, cinema, fashion and many other forms of entertainment. Amman is one of the

most famous modern cities in the region. This is reflected in the major malls which offer many international brands in addition to international hotels that provide a sign of urban life.

Jordan Travel Information

What makes Jordan a unique country to travel to?

Country Description

The Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan is a constitutional monarchy with a developing economy and a modern infrastructure. Western culture features prominently in the lives of many Jordanians. At the same time, traditional Islamic ideals and beliefs provide a conservative foundation for the country's customs, laws, and practices. Businesses and facilities catering to tourists are widely available, although quality may vary depending on price and location.

Crime

Statistically, petty crime is the most common form that Western nationals experience in Jordan, especially at tourist sites and in crowded areas. Pickpockets, purse snatchers, and opportunistic thieves are known to target foreigners in the narrow and crowded streets of the older parts of Amman's city centre. Travelers should be more guarded in these areas and in all tourist locations in Jordan to lessen the likelihood of becoming a victim of petty thefts. Jordanian police have warned the public to exercise vigilance when leaving banks or ATMs, as thieves have reportedly preyed upon persons soon after using these services.

Women from Western countries visiting and residing in Jordan have periodically reported incidents of sexual harassment, stalking, and indecent exposure. The Embassy continues to receive a limited number of reports regarding incidents of sexual assaults involving taxis and taxi drivers. Many of the incidents have involved verbal sexual harassment, staring, or following the victim, but some have included physical assaults. To decrease the likelihood of being victimised while using a taxi, foreign women should take precautions such as avoiding travel to unfamiliar areas at night, not traveling alone, not riding in the front seat of a taxi, and dressing modestly when in public. We also recommend carrying a cellular telephone at all times and immediately reporting incidents to the police.

Violent crime is infrequent and rarely targets Westerners. In the past, the Embassy has received reports of firearms being discharged at vehicles being driven by Westerners. A dispute between two rival protection rackets led to shots being fired at multiple nightclubs, bars, liquor stores, and similar establishments in March 2011. While not common, thefts of vehicles, assaults, robbery, and attempted residential break-ins have also been reported.

Don't buy counterfeit and pirated goods, even if they are widely available. Not only are the bootleg copies illegal, if you purchase them, you may also be breaking local law.

Criminal Penalties

While you are traveling in Jordan, you are subject to its laws even if you are a foreign citizen. Foreign laws and legal systems can be vastly different from our own. In some places driving under the influence can land you in jail. Criminal penalties will vary from country to country. There are also some things that might be legal in the country you visit, but still illegal in your home country, and you can be prosecuted under your local law. Engaging in sexual conduct with children or using or disseminating child pornography in a foreign country is a crime prosecutable in most countries. If you break local laws in Jordan, your passport won't help you avoid arrest or prosecution. It's very important to know what's legal and what's not wherever you go.

The Jordanian constitution provides for freedom of speech and of the press; however, in practice the government has imposed some restrictions on these rights. In particular, insulting the King or members of the Royal Family may lead to detainment or imprisonment. Additionally, activities that the Jordanian government considers proselytizing to Muslims are forbidden under the law and anyone undertaking these activities are subject to prosecution, imprisonment, and deportation.

While some countries will automatically notify the nearest embassy or consulate if a foreign citizen is

detained or arrested in a foreign country, that might not always be the case. To ensure that the your home country is aware of your circumstances, request that the police and prison officials notify the nearest embassy or consulate as soon as you are arrested or detained overseas.

Medical Facilities and Health Information

Modern medical care and medicines are generally available in the principal cities of Jordan, but not necessarily in outlying areas. Most acute and chronic medical conditions can be appropriately handled. When called, ambulance vehicles are often slow to arrive and personnel generally have only a basic level of training. Seasonal dust storms that envelop the country for days or weeks each spring may significantly aggravate respiratory conditions such as asthma or sinus problems. Most hospitals in Jordan, especially in Amman, are privately owned. Doctors and hospitals often expect immediate cash payment for services. Because serious medical problems requiring hospitalisation and/or medical evacuation could cost over US \$150,000, we strongly advise travellers to carry medical evacuation insurance.

Travelers should take normal precautions against contracting the flu, including frequent handwashing and covering sneezes. It is a good idea to postpone traveling while ill.

Safety and Security

The threat of terrorism remains high in Jordan. Transnational and indigenous terrorist groups have demonstrated the capability to plan and implement attacks in Jordan. In August 2010, a roadside improvised explosive device (IED) detonated next to a vehicle carrying three USG contractors as it was travelling through an Amman suburb; the contractors did not suffer any serious injuries. In January 2010, an official Israeli motorcade was struck by an IED as it was traveling from Amman to the King Hussein/Allenby Bridge border crossing; passengers in the vehicles were unharmed and the vehicles sustained minor damage. Several rockets believed to have been launched from the Sinai Peninsula struck the port city of Aqaba in April and August 2010. In the latter attack, one rocket destroyed a taxi cab outside of a hotel, killing the driver.

The Department of State remains concerned about the continued threat of terrorist attacks, demonstrations, and other violent actions against foreign citizens and interests overseas. In October 2012 the Jordanian government foiled a terrorist plot, arresting a number of Al-Qaeda operatives targeting public areas and the U.S. Embassy in Amman. Travelers to Jordan should be cognisant of the fact that Al-Qaida in Iraq affiliates have carried out terrorist activities against U.S. and Government of Jordan (GOJ) targets in Jordan.

Terrorists often do not distinguish between U.S. government personnel and private U.S. citizens. Terrorists may target areas frequented by Westerners, such as tourist sites, hotels, restaurants, bars, nightclubs, liquor stores, shopping malls, and transportation hubs, places of worship, expatriate residential areas, and schools. In light of these security concerns, U.S. citizens should maintain a high level of vigilance, be aware of their surroundings, and take appropriate steps to increase their security awareness. It is especially important for travellers to be unpredictable in their movements by varying their times and routes and maintaining a low profile. Moreover, foreign citizens should avoid contact with any suspicious or unfamiliar objects and immediately report the presence of such objects to local authorities. U.S. government personnel overseas have been advised to take the same precautions.

Demonstrations are common. Some, especially smaller ones, have turned violent, leading security officials to intercede. Because demonstrations intended to be peaceful can turn confrontational and possibly escalate into violence, travellers should avoid all protests and large gatherings of people. Many demonstrations occur on Fridays near mosques following noon prayers. Consequently, you should exercise special sensitivity and caution when visiting or traveling near mosques and religious sites during holy days and Fridays. Demonstrations and other forms of unrest have occurred on public university campuses in Jordan. Some acts of violence on university campuses have involved the use of firearms. Anti-U.S. demonstrations have also taken place in front of the U.S. Embassy. Travelers should avoid any

demonstrations or large gatherings of people.

Tribal violence in Jordan remains a concern. Clashes between feuding clans or families periodically erupt without notice and sometimes involve an escalation in violence, including the use of firearms. In some cases, Jordanian security services are slow to respond or may opt to let the violence subside before intervening. When necessary, authorities have closed major roads, including a key road near Amman's international airport, or parts of cities to contain the violence.

U.S. citizens should avoid the border area with Syria. Police and security officials have arrested weapons and drug smugglers, as well as foreign fighters attempting to enter Syria to fight in the country's ongoing civil war. Some riots have occurred at the Ramtha / Jaber border crossing, resulting in the burning of key municipal facilities. The Department of State also advises against travel into Iraq.

Traffic Safety and Road Conditions

While in Jordan, foreign citizens may encounter road conditions that differ significantly from those in the United States and similar countries. The information below concerning Jordan is provided for general reference only and may not be completely accurate in a particular location or circumstance.

U.S. Embassy Amman has advised its employees to avoid driving at night outside the Amman metropolitan area due to road conditions, poorly lit rural roads, and erratic behaviour by other drivers.

It is typical for drivers in Jordan to not signal turns or lane changes. Drivers can also be aggressive, and cars operate very closely together on the highways. Jordanian roads are particularly treacherous during the rainy season, which runs from December to March. Driving in Amman is also more hazardous in the summer months of June to September when Jordan experiences an influx of visitors from other countries in the region. Highways are more crowded around the Muslim holidays when many Jordanian expatriates return to Jordan for family visits. Poor lighting and road conditions prevail, so extra caution must be exercised at all times, especially when driving at night.

The Desert Highway outside Aqaba, a popular tourist destination, is particularly dangerous because it is narrow, winding, steep, and crowded with trucks. If possible, you should try to avoid this area at night. When driving in both urban and rural areas, motorists should be aware of both unmarked speed bumps and livestock, including camels, sheep, and goats. Collisions between livestock and automobiles are common.

As a result of all these factors, traffic accidents are very frequent and continue to be the largest cause of injury and death in Jordan. Drivers and passengers are required to wear seatbelts, and all cars must have a fire extinguisher and warning triangle in the vehicle. Child car seats are not required by law. Violators of speed limits may be assessed fines up to US \$140. Police routinely pull over reckless drivers as well as those believed to be driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Talking on a cell phone while driving is officially prohibited, although the practice is common. If stopped by police, drivers may face a fine. Licensed drivers must carry local third-party insurance with sufficient coverage for accidents resulting in injury or death. Drivers who are involved in an accident should remain at the scene and immediately call the police and emergency personnel in case injuries have occurred. Police may hold the driver's license or passport in order to prevent the driver from fleeing. Identification documents can be recovered at the police station.

Landmines are often located within two miles of military installations and borders, including the popular Dead Sea area. Minefields are usually fenced off and marked with skull-and-crossbones notices, but the fences and signs may be in poor repair or hard to see. Avoiding these areas reduces the risk of accidentally setting off a mine.

Jordan has abundant bus and taxi services. Please see the Crime section for more information about incidents of sexual harassment and assault involving taxi drivers and important safety tips when using

public or private transportation in Jordan. Visitors should arrange for their transportation needs via their hotel and should request that drivers not pick up additional passengers en-route to their destinations. We do not recommend other forms of public transportation. Jordanian security authorities often establish checkpoints, especially on roads leading to popular tourist destinations, where drivers are expected to stop and present their identity documents. All drivers should stop when directed to do so and comply with the instructions provided to them by the authorities.

Is it Safe to Visit Jordan Right Now? Updated Advice for 2024

In the past year, I've been – as many of you may also be – devastated by the news coming out of the Middle East. Whether you are more supportive of one group or another, for any reason, the loss of human life and extreme violence we're watching is heartbreaking and will be long remembered in the history books.

This site doesn't typically focus on anything to do with Jordan's neighbours. After all, many of them are difficult or unsafe to visit in the first place! Jordan is, in many ways, a bastion of peace and stability in a region that has long been tumultuous; this is one of my favourite reasons for encouraging visitors to travel to Jordan, since it can show you this part of the world in a safe, meaningful, and memorable way.



But Jordan *is* neighbours with Israel and Palestine, and has welcomed millions of refugees over the past eighty years; it doesn't border Lebanon but is geographically close with disputed borders between Israel and Syria separating the two countries. Iran, too, isn't far away. One might say it's all the "same neighbourhood," on a global scale.

What's happening to the east and north of Jordan impacts the Hashemite Kingdom itself, and you may wonder if it's safe to visit Jordan given the current political climate of the Middle East.

To try and help you decide whether visiting Jordan is still a good idea, I've put together this guide which covers the current situation in Jordan, the official guidance from the Jordanian government as well as other common countries readers like you might call home, and my own

final thoughts and advice to help you decide what's right for you. As always, I can try to help in the comments below, too. Safe travels, whenever you make them, *inshallah*.

Current Situation in Jordan



As of writing, what's happening for visitors – and local Jordanians – on the ground has not been dramatically affected by the military action in Gaza or Lebanon.

Currently, Jordan's borders are open for travellers, though you should expect delays and extremely heightened security. There have been peaceful demonstrations in support of Palestine within Jordan, but these have been localised and organised – and it means travel plans can be adjusted.

So in brief, travel in Jordan is not that different now than it was a year ago. But does that mean it's safe to visit Jordan right now?

Official Guidance from Jordan

The Jordan Tourism Board said in a recent statement: "We want to reassure everyone that Jordan's borders are open to tourists, and we are eager to share our extraordinary experiences with the world.

"We understand that tensions around the world can raise concerns, but we believe in the power of travel to foster understanding and build bridges between nations."

Of course, it's worth taking this statement with a grain of salt, right? The Jordan Tourism Board is about encouraging tourism in Jordan – that means they have an interest in encouraging visitors to continue with their travel plans...

But I will say that I personally trust that **the Jordanian government** / **tourism board would not be encouraging visitors if they didn't feel you could be kept safe while there.** Jordan's economy is dependent on tourism (comprising 10-15% of the country's GDP, *source*), and they have a strong incentive to be forthright about the potential for safety (or lack thereof) for visitors. After all, when something bad happens to a visitor, the ramifications are far beyond the scale of the event.

Of course, there are no safety guarantees while traveling, but as I've travelled to Jordan when my own government was discouraging visits (but Jordan still welcomed tourists) and had a great time, I feel confident that Jordan itself is best capable of assessing their ability to keep tourists safe.

Speaking of my own country and what they have to say...

Stance of the US / Canada / UK Governments

According to the U.S. Department of State, Jordan is currently at "Level 2: Exercise Increased Caution." **This has not changed in the year since the Hamas attack on Israel**, suggesting the U.S. government *still* feels confident that Americans can safely visit Jordan.

Here are the specific suggestions provided in that warning:

Do not travel to:

• Within 3.5 km of the Jordanian border with Syria and east of the town of Ruwayshid in the direction of the border with Iraq due to terrorism and armed conflict.

- Designated Syrian refugee camps in Jordan due to Government of Jordan restrictions on entry into these camps.
- Zarqa, Rusayfah, and the Baqa'a neighbourhood of Ayn Basha due to terrorism and crime.

Reconsider travel to:

• Ma'an City and some areas of Ma'an Governorate due to terrorism and crime.

As you can see, there is no specific guidance about Israel or Palestine at all; even the U.S. Department of State does not consider this a reason to not visit Jordan yet.

On the other hand, the Government of Canada does specifically mention the current situation, and the appropriate page is noted as being last updated in August 2024.

Exercise a high degree of caution in Jordan due to the threat of terrorism, civil unrest and demonstrations.

They specifically advise against all travel to the border with Syria, the border with Iraq, and Northeastern Jordan (east of Ruwaished), and recommend against non-essential travel to any refugee camps.

There's an additional section about the "Situation in Israel, the West Bank and the Gaza Strip," which talks about how – while the border is currently open – the situation is incredibly dynamic and may change quickly to affect your travel plans.

Lastly, the U.K. Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office doesn't explicitly recommend against travel to Jordan, but advises against travel within 3km of the Syrian border. Updated at the beginning of October, their resources do not mention the specifics of the current situation and tensions, but make it clear that visitors may have difficulty receiving support or have their travel insurance invalidated if they travel against FCDO advice.

While the messages are mixed I believe that you can still safely visit Jordan; the final choice is yours. I just recommend registering with the appropriate foreign database for international travel (such as the U.S. STEP program) so that your home country is aware of your Jordan travel plans and can support you if needed.

So, Is It Safe to Visit Jordan Right Now?

Up to this point, all of my suggestions have been based on the advice of political and governmental organisations... and that only goes so far. At the end of the day, the decision is up to you and your personal comfort level.

On my own scale of comfort, *I* would not change any travel plans if I already had flights and other logistics arranged to visit Jordan at this time. If I were just *starting* to plan my trip and didn't have dates or other details set / paid for, I might wait to plan my trip further in the future – just because the situation is so dynamic and may change / disrupt plans later.

But again, the most I can give you is the official guidance and my personal input. In the end, the decision is yours, and I hope that if you decide to cancel or postpone your plans, you will visit Jordan at some point in the future. It's an incredible place and your trip will be memorable and safe (*inshallah*), whenever you make it.

The **Middle Eastern** Arab country of **Jordan** is located on the Jordan River's East Bank. Due to its location at the crossroads of the three continents of **Europe**, **Asia**, and **Africa**, the country's culture is influenced by Arabic, Islamic, and Western elements.

6. Ethnicity, Language, and Religion in Jordan

Jordan is home to a population of around 10,458,413 individuals (population of **Jordan** is **11,540,864** as of Thursday, 14 November 2024). Ethnic Jordanians comprise 69.3% of the population of the country. Other ethnic groups of Jordan include Syrian, Palestinian, Egyptian, Iraqi, and others. Arabic is the **official language** and is spoken by most of the population. English is spoken widely among the upper and middle classes of Jordan. Islam is the **official and largest religion** in the country comprising 97.2% of the population. Christians account for 2.2% of the population.

5. Cuisine of Jordan

Jordanian cuisine has developed over many centuries. Baking, grilling, roasting, sautéeing, etc., are some of the many techniques used in the cuisine. A wide variety of meat like beef, lamb, goat, and poultry are consumed. Carrots, greens, and eggplants are the most commonly eaten vegetables. Olive oil is an important ingredient and most cooking is done using this oil. Lemon, garlic, herbs, tomato sauce, etc., are used to flavour the Jordanian dishes. Yogurt is often used as an accompaniment or an ingredient of a dish. Mansaf (lamb cooked in fermented yogurt, and served with rice or bulgur) is Jordan's national dish. The zarb is another traditional dish consisting of rice served with slow cooked lamb prepared in a taboon (a submerged oven). Hummus and falafel are also eaten. Baklava, halva, knafeh, etc., are some popular desserts. Turkish coffee and tea flavoured with sage and mint are everyday drinks. Arabic coffee is offered on more formal occasions.

4. Literature and the Arts in Jordan

The Jordanian literature is a part of the larger wealth of Arabic literature. Historically, much of Jordan's literature has been oral in nature. Poetry was an important part of this literature since ancient times. Even today, the **Bedouin community** of the country continues to use poetry as a form of entertainment or for praising or criticising their leaders. Poetry is either recited or sung. A one-stringed violin-like instrument called the rabab is played to produce music to accompany the singing of poetic verses. Contemporary Arabic literature began in the second half of the 19th century. Cairo and Beirut became the major hubs of the evolution of such literature, and it soon spread to Jordan. It included the writing of novels and short stories that replaced the more classical literary formats.

Like literature, art in Jordan also has an ancient history. Some notable fields of Jordanian art and craft work include mosaics, silver work, glass-blowing, ceramics, weaving, and calligraphy.

3. Performance Arts in Jordan

Jordan has a long history of traditional music. Poetry recited to the tunes of various traditional instruments like the tablah, oud, rabab, mijwiz, etc., have been an integral component of the country's culture for centuries. Recently, however, Western music has had a significant influence on the Jordanian performing arts scene. The number of Jordanian pop stars and DJs have also risen considerably. Rum is a highly successful, internationally famous musical group from the country. It plays rearranged Jordanian folklore, songs, and instrumentals.

The dabke is one of Jordan's most popular traditional dances. Here, dancers gather together to form a circle. They place their arms over the shoulders of the neighbouring dancers and then move around in a circle, and kicking and stomping their feet to the tune of music. Mizmar (a reed instrument), tabl (drum), and ney (flute) are some of the musical instruments used to produce the dabke dance music. In more recent times, Western dance styles have also influenced the performance art scene in Jordan. Ballroom and ballet dance studios have opened up in **major cities** like the **national capital**, Amman.

2. Sports in Jordan

Sports are an important part of the Jordanian culture. The people of the country engage in a wide variety of sports including tennis, basketball, cycling, diving, swimming, equestrian games, etc. Football (soccer) is the nation's most popular sport. The Jordan League attracts a large number of spectators every season. Rugby is also gaining a lot of attention in recent years. Four Jordanian clubs already play the game.

1. Life in the Jordanian Society

The society in Jordan is patriarchal in nature. Islamic beliefs guide the way of life. **Women are expected to obey their fathers, brothers, and husbands at different stages of their life.** The process of educating women began only recently in the country. Very few women work outside the home. The free mixing of members of the opposite gender is strictly restricted. Unless married or related, men and women are not allowed to be together in all public situations. Women are expected to cover their heads with scarves. Some also cover their faces with a veil.

Getting married and having children are often the top priorities of life in Jordan. Marriages are mostly arranged and are often between cousins. Extended households are common in Jordan. The bride moves in to stay with the groom and his family after marriage. Polygamy is practiced by many men in Jordan. If divorces occur, the men have the right to keep the children. Divorced women are often regarded as outcasts. Hence, divorce is not a common practice in the country. Inheritance is guided by Islamic laws. Male children are highly prized.

Over 60% of Jordan's population lives in the Amman Metropolitan area. The metropolis has a thriving Jordanian pop culture that is heavily influenced by "Western" music, movies, and fashion. Partying and clubbing are an integral part of the culture of this city. Hotels, malls, and stores selling Western brands are common in Amman.

The Jordanians are known to be great hosts. Even on the streets of the country, one can often hear the greeting of "ahlan wa sahlan" ("I welcome you"). One of the traditions in the culture is to welcome a guest by sharing a cup of coffee together. The host takes the first sip of the coffee to ensure it is perfect and then the guest has the rest. The guest is also offered food and a resting place at home.

A TRAVELERS NARRATIVE: THE BEAUTY OF JORDANIAN PEOPLE

Jordan is renowned for its physical beauty. The historic charm of the ancient city of Petra, the stunning chasms and plains of Wadi Rum, and the unique wonder of the Dead Sea are only a few of Jordan's many exquisite features. The warmth and generosity of the Jordanian people, however, are no less exceptional.

My name is Abigail Corey, and I travelled to Jordan last fall to spend a semester in Amman studying Arabic, and the hospitality I experienced there was one of the most meaningful aspects of my trip.

Jordanians harbor a culture of hospitality.

A culture of hospitality has existed in Jordan since ancient times, when the harsh environment in many parts of the Middle East meant that there was a moral imperative to provide all travellers with food and water. These customs have persisted even as times have changed, and love of travellers is



still a prominent characteristic of Jordanian culture.

Throughout my stay in Jordan, I was constantly amazed by my encounters with people who gave as easily as they smiled. The woman sitting next to me on the plane ride to Amman gave me her phone number without hesitation and urged me to call her so that she could show me around. People I had only just met told me, "Welcome to Jordan!" and promptly invited to me to their homes for tea. The family who owned the little coffee shop across the street from my apartment was always a highlight of my day. They complimented my rudimentary Jordanian dialect skills and encouraged me to come to the shop more often to practice speaking. Several times, they waved away my money as I attempted to pay for my Turkish coffee, telling me that I was a friend.

The other American students in my program had similar experiences. During fall break, several of my friends attempted an ambitious four-day hike across the desert. When they ran out of water, Bedouins, Arabic-speaking nomadic people, invited them in and insisted they stay for tea, asking for nothing in return. This level of hospitality, while unusual in the United States, is routine in Jordan.

Jordanians make having close family bonds a priority.

One of the most notable characteristics of Jordanian culture is the importance of family in everyday life. My study abroad program provided us each with a Jordanian student as a language partner with whom we could practice our Arabic. Within twenty minutes of meeting my language partner, Jomana, she informed me that we were going home to meet her family. I met her mother, her sister, and her two nieces. They gave me homemade pastries and made me feel welcome. Throughout the entire semester, her family invited me over at least once a week to feed me elaborate Jordanian meals and talk with them.

Life in Jordan is very much family cantered in general. Discussions at home revolve around engagements, weddings, holidays, and other family celebrations. Families are quick to extend the warmth of family to outsiders, however, making every effort to include them in these festivities. Jomana even expressed dismay that I would not be in Jordan long enough to make it to her sister's wedding.

Jordanians show overwhelming acceptance of other cultures.


Although Jordan is more conservative than the United States, everyone that I met was open minded and eager to engage in discussion. As I was in Jordan during the 2016 presidential election, I encountered many questions about American politics. I had many spirited conversations with various taxi drivers and Jordanian friends that were far more light-hearted and courteous than political discussions often are in America.


Moreover, my Jordanian teachers and roommates were eager to learn about American customs and holidays. We invited them to our apartments on Thanksgiving and cooked a traditional Thanksgiving meal, complete with pumpkin pie. They helped us cook, and we explained the day's historical significance. My American friends and I agreed that it was one of the best holidays we had ever spent.

It is easy to feel isolated or homesick while traveling in a foreign country, but the unparalleled level of hospitality and warmth I experienced in Jordan helped me feel at home at the unlikeliest of times. Although I remember Jordan fondly for many reasons, the beauty of the Jordanian people is one of the

things I miss the most.

Alternative Care



Family-like Care (between the ages of 3 and 14)

This programme is the backbone for care at SOS Children's Villages Jordan. The programme consists of a community made of family houses, where each house is led by a mother who provides care and love for 5 to 7 children.

An SOS family is similar to a biological family in terms of variety of ages and gender. In the family house the children are raised as brothers and sisters until the age of 14. At this age the youth moves from the family house to a youth house. The youth lives at the youth house until the age of 18.

Youth Houses (between the ages of 14 and 18)

SOS youth houses accommodate youth from the age of 14 till the age of 18. A youth house provides a home to 8 male or 8 female youth and each house is led by a male or female youth leader. Moving to an SOS youth house intends to be the first step towards an independent life outside SOS Children's Villages. Currently in Jordan we have eight youth houses in the cities of Amman, Irbid and Aqaba.

Community Houses

SOS Children's Villages Jordan introduced the innovative "Community Houses" model in Aqaba in 2020, making it the first of its kind in Jordan, and is aligned with the global focus towards alternative care and reducing institutionalisation.

The community housing model takes the Family-like Care model into a rented house outside the premises of the village allowing children and youth to live independently within the community. Living in a community house allows children and youth to learn and adopt the values and social norms of the local community, and participate in more group activities. This prepares them better for the supervised-independent living.

To ensure the safety and well-being of the children and youth in these houses, they are monitored by the Children's Village Programme Director (CVPD) and a psychologist through periodic physical visits. The Ministry of Social Development (MoSD) also conducts monthly visits to the houses.

This model has been successful because it empowers children and youth, helps them socialise and become a part of the community, and reduces stigma and institutionalisation. Building on this successful experience, SOS Jordan expanded this model, and SOS Children's Village Amman opened its first community house in 2022.

Small Group Homes

Small group homes provide temporary alternative care for children and young people until they can be reintegrated with their families, and provide a safe environment for them to live in. This model follows a "family-like care" approach. Additionally, this model provides integrated care for biological siblings who come from broken families, with the aim of reuniting them by providing care in a single home.

Parent-child Living

The Parent-Child living model offers temporary accommodation within the village premises to women and their children in need of residential care until the mother gains the confidence and capability to provide the best care for her children.

It aims to prevent parent-child separation due to a mother's economic situation, by providing accommodation and economic empowerment programs that enable the mother to become financially independent and care for her children.

Supervised-independent living (between the ages of 18-24)


After the age of 18, the responsibility of looking after youth falls under the Ministry of Social Development. However, we continue to provide them with support; this includes financial and technical support for those who are still studying in either academic or vocational paths. As well as for those who are looking for employment. We have strategic partnerships, such as Al Aman Fund for the Future of Orphans, where education, residence rental, household expenses, health insurance and personal expenses are covered by our partners for these young individuals.

Some of the youth who graduated from SOS Children's Villages Jordan have reintegrated with their biological families or with their relatives. Others are living an independent life and are self-reliant. Most of the graduates have successfully developed professional careers in different sectors such as business, engineering, hospitality and pharmaceuticals among others.

After Care (between the ages of 18-35)

SOS Children's Villages Jordan continues to offer support after care programmes aimed at empowering youth (between the ages of 18 and 35) by equipping them with the essential skills, networks and knowledge necessary to obtain equal opportunities and the ability to compete in the labour market, or to start their own businesses, enabling them to achieve financial stability and economic independence. Through these programmes, we are empowering young people to build a foundation for a bright future.

Family Strengthening



Every child has the right to grow up in a loving family, preferably with one or both parents. However, families experiencing crises or extreme hardship may have difficulty caring adequately for their children. By virtue of accumulative experience at the Children's Villages in childcare and in alignment with our slogan that "No Child Should Grow Up Alone", SOS Children's Villages Jordan implements a programme called "Family Strengthening Programme".

Our Family strengthening programme aims to support families at risk of child-family separation and reintegrated families and to empower them to provide quality care to their children. The programme supports families to be able to access essential services and provide educational, parenting, economic and MHPSS support.

How We Help Families Stay Together

- Provide training on positive parenting and family expense management.
- Provide family counselling services to solve issues and problems.
- Facilitate access to healthcare services for children and mothers.
- Facilitate access to education for children, including school fees, school uniforms, educational materials and private lessons.
- Provide economic empowerment and training programmes for families.

Empowering Communities

The Family Strengthening programme also aims to strengthen the capacities of community members to respond to the needs of the target group including their mental health needs.

We collaborate with partners to develop social support systems that promote positive and nurturing environments for children and families to learn, grow, and thrive. Our partners include community-based organisations, local authorities, and government agencies.

In addition to community support centres in our three villages in Amman, Irbid, and Aqaba, we also launched several economic empowerment projects to help women in the local community find sustainable sources of income that enable them to care for their children and provide them with a decent life. The Safe Homes



The project "Improving Access to Comprehensive GBV Services in Jordan", also known as "The Safe Homes", funded by the European Union and implemented by Spanish Agency for International Development Cooperation (AECID) in collaboration with UNFPA Jordan, was established at the beginning of 2022

The Safe Homes project aims to enhance prevention and protection systems against gender-based violence in Jordan. It involves the creation of safe houses to accommodate women survivors of violence along with their children. These houses offer a range of services including shelter, nutrition, education, psychological health, and legal assistance. Additionally, they provide economic empowerment through training and entrepreneurship programs.

The main activities of the project are designed to provide a secure shelter for women and children who have survived domestic violence in three locations: Amman, Irbid, and Aqaba, covering the north, central, and southern regions of Jordan. Services are offered to women and their children from various provinces, referred either by the Family Protection and Juvenile Department (FPJD) or other referral partners.

This accommodation service aims to bridge a gap in society by allowing violence survivors to seek refuge away from danger through an open-service model. This model grants them the freedom to move and temporarily reside with their children in safe homes in Amman and Irbid. Moreover, within the framework of this project, we plan to extend this model to include Agaba.

Furthermore, the Association also manages and operates Dar Al-Wefaq in Aqaba through a memorandum of understanding with the Ministry of Social Development. The current shelter in Aqaba, which currently operates under a closed-care model, is assessing risk factors associated with each case to determine appropriate interventions. For example, women facing moderate to low risks are allowed to move without escorts, while those facing higher risks require additional support and protection, possibly with police accompaniment when leaving the shelter.

This service is accessible to any woman referred to SOS through appropriate channels, following inclusion and exclusion criteria in Amman, Irbid, and Aqaba.

We are dedicated to providing high-quality services in line with the standardised operational procedures set by the National Council for Family Affairs. Our commitment extends to having a clear plan for performance monitoring and evaluation, employing key indicators and standardised tools across all locations.

It's worth mentioning that The Safe Homes project is part of the 'Implementation Plan for Essential Services for Women and Girls Victims of Violence 2021-2023' in collaboration with the National Council for Family Affairs (NCFA) and United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA).

Green Villages



SOS Children's villages Jordan strongly believes in the importance of achieving environmental sustainability. Since the beginning of 2015, the association initiated multiple environmental projects that included harnessing rainwater for plant irrigation, repurposing water and waste through recycling, constructing plastic houses, and adopting organic agricultural methods. In addition to implementing the renewable energy project carried out by AES Jordan through their generous donation for the three villages in Amman, Irbid and Aqaba, where they covered the costs of installing and operating the solar system in all three villages. This project promotes environmental responsibility and improves children's quality of life through sustainable energy.

The installation of photovoltaic (PV) systems in our three villages, currently amounting to 328 kw, has resulted in an annual production of 500 thousand Kilowatt / hours (KwH), and a significant reduction in our carbon footprint by preventing approximately 170 tons of carbon dioxide (CO²) emissions each year.

The launch of this project marks a significant milestone towards achieving the association's future strategy of environmental sustainability through green methodologies and resource preservation.

Emergency Response Programme (ERP)



In compliance with SOS Children's Villages International vision to support refugees and vulnerable families, SOS Children's Villages Jordan launched its first Emergency Response Programme (ERP) in March 2017 called "Women and Children Empowerment to Secure a Better Future for their Families".

The programme was launched in partnership with a community-based organisation in Northern Hashimi, Amman. The programme fulfilled the basic needs for the Syrian refugee families and vulnerable Jordanian families to improve their quality of life.

Through its planned lifespan of three years, the project worked to enable Jordanian and Syrian children to benefit from formal and non-formal education; while women (mostly mothers of aforementioned children) were trained on income generating vocational skills, business and employability skills. Socio-psychosocial support was provided for both children and women as well.

We implemented a second ERP to fulfil the need for psychological support for children victims of violence and trauma, the project also worked to empower the social support networks for children via training staff of relevant ministries and juvenile courts.

ERP2 ensured that the holistic needs of the target group are addressed. Through targeting students aged between (12-18 years), ERP2 aimed to prevent the deterioration of the situation of Syrian youth refugees

living in Jordan, and support students enrolled in the non-formal education system, implemented by other INGOs, alongside Mental Health, Psychosocial Support (MHPSS), and life skills activities.

Global Scholarship Program



Initiated by Hermann Gmeiner Fonds Deutschland e.V. (HGFD), this comprehensive programme empowers and supports young individuals who have benefitted from services offered by SOS Children's Villages. The program focuses on awarding scholarships to young individuals during their last stage of education based on specific selection criteria, emphasising academic achievements, motivation, social responsibility, and leadership qualities. Currently supporting 200 students aged 18 to 34 years old at the start of their studies, the programme strives to foster economic independence and academic success, and also focuses on equipping the young individuals with the required financial and psychosocial resources that are essential for them to succeed in their studies.

SOS Children's Villages Jordan introduced the Global Scholarship Program for SOS youth / housing, medical insurance, and pocket money, enabling you to pursue your dream bachelor's or master's degree at one of the top universities in Jordan.

As a politically stable, culturally diverse, and strategically located country in the Middle East North Africa (MENA) Region, Jordan is committed to building a robust education system, with a focus on becoming a regional hub for technology and innovation. Jordan's universities shine on the global stage, with 41,850 international students from 109 countries studying at Jordanian universities. This data was reported in March 2023 by the Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research.




UNFPA Jordan Gender-based violence is one of the most prevalent human rights violations in the world. It knows no social, economic or national boundaries. Worldwide, an estimated one in three women will experience physical or sexual abuse in her lifetime. Gender-based violence undermines the

health, dignity, security and autonomy of its victims, yet it remains shrouded in a culture of silence.

Harmful practices are persistent practices and behaviours that are grounded on discrimination on the basis of sex, gender, age and other grounds as well as multiple and/or intersecting forms of discrimination that often involve violence and cause physical and/or psychological harm or suffering. Harmful cultural practices, such as child marriage and female genital mutilation (FGM), are discriminatory practices committed regularly over long periods of time that communities and societies begin to consider acceptable.

GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN AND GIRLS



Gender-based violence is a significant issue in Jordan, with women and girls experiencing various forms of violence and discrimination due to their gender. The prevalence of violence against women affects all segments of society regardless of their social or economic status. The most common forms of gender-based violence in Jordan include physical violence, sexual violence, emotional abuse, and sexual harassment. These forms of violence can occur in a range of settings, including the home, the workplace, and public spaces.

The Jordanian government has taken steps to address gender-based violence, including passing policies and laws, and increasing awareness through public campaigns. However, much work remains to be done to prevent and address gender-based violence in Jordan, including addressing social norms and beliefs that perpetuate violence against women and girls, providing better support and resources for survivors of

violence, ensuring that perpetrators are held accountable for their actions and tackling child marriage, which remains a concern, particularly among refugees.

Gender-based violence (GBV) has a significant impact on individuals, families, and communities in Jordan. The latest Jordan Population and Family Health Survey (DHS) 2017-2018 reveals that 29.5% of ever-married women aged 15-49 reported experiencing physical, sexual, or emotional violence by their husband or partner at some point in their lives. Among women who had experienced physical or sexual violence, 41% reported injuries.

Additional data from the latest GBV IMS reports (2020 and 2021, analysing data on reported GBV incidents by 7 data gathering organisations in Jordan) provide further insight into the GBV trends and wide-ranging consequences for individuals and communities in the country. GBV not only affects the physical and emotional well-being of survivors but also has economic and social consequences that can perpetuate the cycle of violence. These studies highlight the urgent need for continued efforts to prevent and respond to GBV in Jordan.

What does UNFPA do in Jordan?

As the lead agency in working to respond to and reduce gender-based violence, UNFPA works in Jordan in collaboration with the government, civil society organisations, and other partners to address gender-based violence and promote gender equality.

UNFPA comprehensive GBV prevention and response program in Jordan contributes to the UNFPA's Jordan Country outputs through the following areas of intervention:

Supporting policy and accountability frameworks

UNFPA, in Coordination with NCFA and MoSD, has developed the "Executive Plan for the National Priorities for strengthening the response to Gender-Based Violence, Domestic Violence, and Child Protection 2021-2023" in coordination with NCFA and MoSD. The plan was launched in 2022 and NCFA has undertaken monitoring of the implementation of the plan in coordination with the different relevant partners.

UNFPA is also supporting the Government of Jordan in implementing and monitoring the National Action Plan to address Child Marriage, which includes measures to improve access to education for girls, increase awareness of the negative impacts of child marriage, strengthen child protection systems, and enhance law enforcement and legal frameworks to prohibit child marriage.

Providing high-quality services to respond and prevent gender-based violence and harmful practices

UNFPA supports comprehensive, survivor-centred responses in humanitarian and development settings through quality health, social and justice services. At the core of UNFPA's approach are the right to safety, confidentiality, non-discrimination and self-determination for all survivors.

UNFPA Jordan works in partnership with international, national and community-based partner organisations to support women and girls safe spaces across the Kingdom. In the Women and Girls Safe Spaces (WGSSs), women and girls can access non-stigmatising GBV response and prevention services including access to case management services (virtual and in-person), referrals, psychosocial support, awareness raising, counselling, life skills and empowerment activities. UNFPA extends support to women and girls and communities with 17 WGSSs with 5 centres in Syrian Refugee Camps (Zaatari

Camp and Azraq Camp), and 11 centres in host communities in Amman, Zarqa, Irbid, Mafraq, Balqa, Madaba, Karak and Tafilah. We strive to continuously ensure quality life-saving inclusive support for GBV survivors by also providing **cash and voucher assistance**, improving referral pathways and networks of services, and promoting the use of innovative and digital technologies.

UNFPA Jordan works also to prevent GBV through strengthening mechanisms and capacities of actors and institutions to address discriminatory gender and social norms, increasing community-led initiatives through local women's / feminist and youth-led organisations, tackle the **gender digital divide**, raise awareness about combating child marriage and disability inclusion. A key area of work in preventing GBV focuses on empowering adolescent girls through girl-centred investments that empower them with the information, skills and services they need to be healthy, educated and safe, helping them make a successful transition to adulthood. UNFPA also works to support the needs of married girls particularly in family planning and maternal health through the AMAL approach.

UNFPA Jordan has launched several public awareness campaigns aimed at preventing GBV in the past years, especially around key international days such as the 16 days of activism, International Women's Day, and the Day of the Girl Child. These campaigns have engaged various stakeholders, including youth and women-led organisations, media outlets, and community leaders, to promote a culture of zero tolerance towards all forms of gender-based violence and harmful practices.

Generate data and evidence on Gender-based violence and harmful practices

UNFPA also works extensively in collecting data and generating evidence to understand the prevalence, incidence and impact of gender-based violence worldwide. For example, UNFPA supports the Gender-Based Violence Information Management System (GBVIMS), which is used in crisis settings, and an adapted version of this system for development settings (GBVIMS+). These systems enable the safe collection, storage, analysis and sharing of data reported by survivors.

UNFPA is also supporting the Jordanian National Commission for Women (JNCW) in the framework of the National Strategy for Women (2020-2025) to develop the study on Estimating the economic cost of Violence, as part of UNFPA's advocacy efforts. The study would in result allow the Jordanian government to improve its response to VAW using it as a tool to raise awareness and promote legislative and policy change.

We also investigate specific aspects of GBV, in particular:

- The connection between **Climate Change and GBV**;
- The situation of **Female Genital Mutilation** and its related services among non-Syrian refugees in Jordan as part of its efforts towards Leaving No One Behind and following the one refugee approach for the humanitarian response framework in Jordan, finding that albeit mostly hidden, the practice is present in the country;
- Period Poverty, which describes the struggle many women and girls face in trying to manage in a
 dignified way their menstrual health. UNFPA Jordan developed a policy paper "Period Poverty
 Policy Paper: Menstrual Hygiene Management and Access in Jordan", shedding light on the situation
 in Jordan regarding Menstrual Hygiene Management, the ability of women and girls in Jordan to
 access services and information on menstruation and the impact of the legislative, economic and
 social gaps in accessing health products related to the menstrual cycle, especially for girls with
 disabilities.

Inter-Agency Coordination

UNFPA leads the Coordination efforts in the multi-sectorial response to GBV co-chairing the **Gender Based Violence Sub-Working Group** with UNHCR and the GBV IMS taskforce producing analytical products and trends analysis that inform the GBV response programme at national level.

National study... Alarming numbers

The right of children to be protected from violence is enshrined in the Convention on the Rights of the Child, yet **one billion children** are subjected to some form of emotional, physical, or sexual violence **every year**; **one child dies from violence every five minutes.**

In Jordan, more than 40% of the population is under the age of 18, that is more than 4.221 million children, that is why Jordan was one of the first countries to sign the Convention on the Rights of the Child and issued a special law to endorse it.

Jordan attaches great importance to children's affairs and place it among its priorities, whether it is at the level of services provided to children, legislation upholding their rights and ways to meeting them or mechanisms protecting these rights and putting them into full effect.

This National Study on Violence Against Children in Jordan aims to shed light on societal practices and trends relating to violence against children, and to provide relevant data, which will help build an integrated picture of **violence against children in Jordan** and contribute to determining the requirements of the child and family protection system for the coming years.



50 per cent of children were physically abused by parents / legal guardians, school teachers, administrators and siblings.

No boundaries

Violence against children knows no boundaries of culture, class, or education. It may occur against children in institutions, in schools, and at home. Peer-to-peer violence is also a concern, as is growing cyberbullying. Children exposed to violence live in

isolation, loneliness, and fear, not knowing where to turn for help, especially when the offender is a family member.

Children's gender, disability, poverty, nationality, or religious origin may increase the risk of violence.

What is "Violence Against Children"?

All forms of physical or mental violence, injury or abuse, neglect or negligent treatment, maltreatment, or exploitation, including sexual abuse against persons under the age of eighteen, whether committed by parents, other caregivers, peers, institutions or others.


Head in the Sand!

Living true to your feelings:

We are to express our feelings to uncover their truth. So you can do nothing, even stop acting out your feelings, whilst you spend years and years simply talking them out.

We are to feel our feelings, identify what they are, accept and fully acknowledge that we're feeling them, express them fully, all whilst longing for the truth they are to show us.

God's Divine Love: Pray for it, ask for it, and receive it.

The Golden rule is: Never interfere with another's will.

Golden Rule: that one must always honour another's will as one honours one's own.

By living true to ourselves true to our feelings, we are living true to God. It's that simple.

We are to express our feelings, both good and bad, at all times, and to long for the truth of them.

We are to Find the Truth of our Childhood.

We are to Find the Truth of our Childhood.

That's it; and find it through our feelings by directly connecting, feeling, experiencing, and most importantly, knowing they are true by being them. We ARE our childhood, the truth is already there, it is already within us, we are already living it, we don't have to look anywhere else for it other than within ourselves. All of why you are what you do, say and live, everything about how you are and how you conduct yourself in life, is all what your childhood was. You grew into being the adult you are because of the childhood you had, we can't be a different adult that's not a direct and complete product and result of our childhood. And if you take away the time element, we are still our childhood, our life is still manifesting how it was for us as a child. We can believe and pretend all we want that we are different to how we were as a child, that having become adult we can leave our childhood behind and move on becoming the adult we want to be. No, we think we can do that, yet we can't. We can't do anything that's not already done, we are still effectively living our childhood and being as we were in it, and that's within all the different times and phases of it, all which adds up to being one big, often contradictory, mess of ideas, beliefs and opinions about ourselves.

And we can't be anything else other than what we are, which is how it was for us through our childhood, yet we fail to see it because we're not fully connected with those parts of ourselves and all the corresponding feelings that will help us see it. So we are to find the truth of ourselves – hence: the truth of our childhood. Because in knowing the whole truth of our childhood and being it, being aware that we are it, connects us as adults fully with ourselves back then. You know how it was for you, because you feel it, your feelings tell you, show you, and there's no avoiding or denying them, because they are expressing (by making you feel) the truth of how it was for you, how it has always been since conception, and how it will remain until the Mother and Father transform you out of your untrue state – out of your unloving childhood.

So our Healing is about finding the truth of ourselves from the beginning, which equates to the truth of our whole childhood, because it's our childhood that made us be as we are. And because we were so heavily interfered with and prevented from being our natural true selves, so we have to 'Heal' all the damage that was done to us. Healing ourselves by seeing the truth of ourselves. So by acknowledging all our feelings, and by wanting to find and uncover the whole truth of our childhood, we work progressively deeper into ourselves, bringing to light all that happened to us to make us be as we are. And part of that is to help us see how much of our childhood and forming was true and loving, and how much was untrue and unloving.

And presumably, once we've brought to light within us the whole truth of our childhood, then the good, true parts, those founded on true love, will remain; and the bad, that which was founded on untruth, will be transformed out of us by God through our soul.

As a forming and developing child, we don't have enough of ourselves to find and so experience the whole truth of what's going on. But as adults we do. And if we grew up in a fully true and loving situation and environment with only loving and true relationships, then as an adult that's how we'd be feeling completely loved and true, happily wanting to bring to light all the positive influences that affected us through our childhood, all of which would be a very enjoyable and loving experience. Whereas because we grew up in rebellion against Truth and Love being forced to be mostly untrue and unloving, and even possibly completely untrue and unloving, then it's not enjoyable going back bringing to light and expressing all our hurt and pain.

We start out not knowing anything about how it is for us through our childhood; or at best, a minimal amount as some people and families are more feeling expressive and self-aware. And through our Healing we have to get to know it all, because we are it, so we're getting to know ourselves – which for many people

will equate to getting to know their shit-start in life. And once we've brought to light the truth of our childhood, then we can leave it, moving on bringing the truth to light of being a true adult. Which is what The Urantia Book means by saying we become true universal spiritual citizens once we are living a Celestial level of truth. So the Mansion Worlds are really provided for us to uncover the truth of our childhood, to see how it was for us, and consequently, how we lived as a child. And they are really only for that, and not so much for us to set about righting all that we find out is wrong within us. We are to only see and so uncover the truth of ourselves. As far as fixing ourselves, or changing or transforming ourselves, that is up to God.

The Mansion Worlds are called probationary worlds, ones in which we can settle the Law of Compensation within our untrue states and continue living against ourselves and the Truth, furthering our truth and self denial; and ones in which we can do our 'Healing' to see the whole truth of our untrue state. Which we can now do either in the Mansion Worlds themselves, or on Earth.

So there is no avoiding the truth of your childhood if you want to ascend beyond the Mansion Worlds. And the fact that none of the spiritual or religious systems on Earth are wholly devoted to helping people bring to light the truth of their childhood through their feelings, shows what a terrible state we're all in. Imagine if the whole world was focused on helping everyone bring to light the hidden truth of themselves, and so the truth of their childhood. It certainly would be a different way to live and so a different world we'd live in.

We can't actually fix anything from our childhood. We can't, only God can. And God will when we've brought to light all the truth of it that God wants us to see. We can undergo therapy (and some truth might come to light), go to the doctor, do whatever we do trying to feel better, all trying to get rid of our bad childhood, all trying to fit in with the beliefs we have from our childhood of how we should be in the world, yet it's only at best scratching the surface. God, through our soul, won't allow us to change anything from our childhood anyway, at least not until we've seen and brought to light and fully connected through our feelings with all the truth of it. There'd be no point God subjecting us to such horror if we could make it all go away before we found the truth of what it was all about and why God made our childhood as it was. So we can do a little, or so we think, adjusting ourselves this way and that, however even those adjustments we come to see through our Healing are 'allowed' because we're still just doing them within our prevailing childhood patterns. Executive Summary

There were no significant changes in the human rights situation in the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan during the year. Significant human rights issues included credible reports of: torture or cruel, inhuman, and degrading treatment or punishment by government authorities; arbitrary arrest and detention; political prisoners or detainees; arbitrary or unlawful interference with privacy; serious restrictions on freedom of expression and media freedom, including harassment and intimidation of journalists, unjustified arrests or prosecutions of journalists, censorship, and enforcement of and threat to enforce criminal libel laws; serious restrictions on internet freedom; substantial interference with the freedom of peaceful assembly and freedom of association, including overly restrictive laws on the organization, funding, or operation of nongovernmental organizations and civil society organizations; inability of citizens to change their government peacefully through free and fair elections; extensive gender-based violence, including but not limited to domestic or intimate partner violence, sexual violence, and other harmful practices; crimes involving violence or threats of violence targeting lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, or intersex persons; and significant restrictions on workers' freedom of association, including threats against labour activists.

The government took some steps to investigate, prosecute, and punish officials who committed human rights abuses; however, government impunity for such abuses remained widespread.

Jordan is a source, destination, and transit country for adults and children subjected to forced labour and, to a lesser extent, sex trafficking. Women from Southeast Asia and East Africa voluntarily migrate to Jordan for employment among the estimated 50,000 foreign domestic workers in the country; some domestic workers are subjected to forced labour. Many of these workers cannot return to their home countries due to pending criminal charges against them or their inability to pay overstay penalties or plane fare home.

Jordanian authorities continued to limit civic space in 2023, quashing dissent by arresting and harassing peaceful dissidents and journalists and using vague and abusive laws to limit free speech and peaceful activism in violation of international legal protections.

In August, Jordanian authorities promulgated a new repressive cybercrime law that further undermines free speech online, threatens internet users' right to anonymity, and introduces a new authority to control social media that could pave the way for a surge in online censorship.

In May, authorities finally rescinded a state of emergency declared in March 2020 in response to the Covid-19 pandemic that had granted the prime minister sweeping powers to rule by decree.

Freedom of Expression

Jordanian law criminalises speech deemed critical of the king, foreign countries, government officials and institutions, Islam, and Christianity and defamatory speech.

In August, Jordan's parliament hastily overhauled the country's cybercrime law, circumventing public discourse and input. The law uses imprecise, vague, and undefined terminology like "fake news," "inciting immorality," and "online assassination of character." Such language falls short of meeting international legal standards for clear and precise legislation, making it difficult for individuals to understand and adhere to the law.

Notably, authorities dramatically increased penalties for online defamation or "character assassination" to a minimum three-month jail sentence or a fine of up to 20,000 Jordanian dinars (about US\$28,000). In 2021, the number of cases relating to online defamation under the 2015 cybercrime law reached 4,030,

nearly double the number from the previous year, according to the annual reports from the National Center for Human Rights (NCHR).

In May, the trial of political activist Sufyan al-Tal and two other men, Abed Tawahiya and Omar Abu Rasaa, on charges related to free expression began. While al-Tal was released on bail soon after his arrest, Abu Rasaa and Tawahiya remain detained. In August, authorities briefly detained journalist Heba Abu Taha after she was sentenced to three months in prison for criticising normalisation with Israel in a Facebook post. She was released pending appeal. Also in August, a court sentenced commentator Ahmed Hassan al-Zoubi to one year in prison for a 2022 Facebook post criticising the government's response to fuel price protests. Following a lengthy hunger strike to protest his own detention, the health of activist Hamad al-Kharsha had deteriorated by September. Authorities had arrested him in January 2022, and he is facing charges based on a coerced confession, according to his lawyer.

Freedoms of Assembly and Association

Under the Public Gatherings Law amended in March 2011, Jordan did not require government permission to hold public meetings or demonstrations, but authorities continued to require organisations and venues to obtain permission from the Interior Ministry or General Intelligence Department to host events.

Several Jordanian laws restrict freedom of association, including the Labour Law of 1996, which limits the ability to freely form trade unions, and the Associations Law of 2008, which regulates the formation and operation of nongovernmental groups (NGOs). Jordanian authorities impose onerous pre-approval restrictions on the receipt of foreign funding by NGOs.

In late 2019, Jordanian authorities created a centralised committee under the Prime Minister's Office to study and decide on foreign funding approval requests. However, representatives of donor states and local NGOs told Human Rights Watch in 2023 that the committee has done little if anything to ease restrictions.

Refugees and Migrants

By late 2023, over 655,000 people from Syria had sought refuge in Jordan, according to the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR). Over 85% of Syrians lived outside refugee camps in rented accommodations.

According to UNHCR, Jordan also hosted asylum seekers and refugees from other countries in 2023, including 61,081 Iraqis, 12,772 Yemenis, 5,163 Sudanese, 593 Somalis, and 1,195 people from other countries. Authorities continued to enforce a January 2019 decision banning UNHCR from registering as asylum seekers non-Syrians who officially entered the country for the purposes of medical treatment, study, tourism, or work, effectively barring their recognition as refugees and leaving many without UNHCR documentation or access to services.

Authorities continued to implement the Jordan Compact, the 2016 agreement between the Jordanian government and donor countries, which aimed to improve the livelihoods of Syrian refugees by granting new legal work opportunities and improving the education sector. By July 2023, labour authorities stated that they had issued or renewed at least 373,000 work permits for Syrians since 2016, although many of these were renewals. Most professions remained closed to non-Jordanians, and many Syrians continued to work in the informal sector without labour protections.

The roughly 230,000 school-age Syrian refugees in Jordan face multiple obstacles to education that are most acute for children ages 12 and older. Only one-quarter of secondary-school-age Syrian refugee children in Jordan were enrolled in school.

Jordan hosted an estimated 49,000 documented migrant domestic workers in 2023, according to Labor Ministry statistics, mostly from the Philippines, Sri Lanka, and Indonesia. NGOs repeatedly referred domestic workers who had suffered multiple abuses to Labor Ministry investigators. Abuses included wage theft, unsafe working conditions, long working hours without rest, passport and document confiscation, and physical, verbal, and sexual abuse.

Women's and Girls' Rights

Despite amendments in 2019, Jordan's personal status code remains discriminatory. Women and girls over 15 need the permission of a male guardian to marry for the first time, and marriages between Muslim women and non-Muslim men are not recognised. Women cannot travel abroad with their children without male guardian or judicial consent.

Article 98 of Jordan's penal code, amended in 2017, states that the "fit of fury" defence does not allow mitigated sentences for perpetrators of crimes "against women," but judges continued to impose mitigated sentences under article 99 if family members of victims did not support prosecutions of their male family members. Article 340 of the penal code also allows a man to receive a reduced sentence if he kills or attacks his wife or any of his female relatives in the act of committing adultery or in an "unlawful bed."

Such discriminatory laws leave women exposed to violence. Similarly, the penal code and Juveniles Act do not prohibit corporal punishment and allow parents to punish children in accordance with "general norms."

Article 9 of Jordan's Nationality Law does not allow Jordanian women married to non-Jordanians to pass on nationality. And while non-citizen children of Jordanian women no longer need work permits, many professions remain closed to them.

Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity

Jordan has no laws that explicitly criminalise same-sex relations. The penal code includes vague "immorality" provisions that are used to target sexual and gender minorities. Jordanian law does not prohibit discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity.

Lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) activists in Jordan reported facing increased harassment by authorities in 2023, which included the detention of two activists and freezing of their bank accounts, the closure of two LGBT rights organisations, and threats by security forces to expose LGBT people to their family members.

In a 2023 report, Human Rights Watch documented the far-reaching offline consequences of online targeting against LGBT people in Jordan, including entrapment, online extortion, online harassment, and reliance on illegitimately obtained digital information based on arbitrary phone searches in prosecutions. As a result of digital targeting, LGBT people said they felt unable to safely express their sexual orientation or gender identity online and that LGBT rights activism has subsequently suffered.

Social Protection and Economic Rights

Jordan continues to grapple with high unemployment, particularly for youth and women, coupled with a sharp rise in poverty following the Covid-19 pandemic and an increase in the cost of living that makes it difficult for many people to afford necessities. A decade of International Monetary Fund (IMF) loan programs has both failed to bring down Jordan's high debt levels and introduced economic reforms that further increased prices, including for fuel and electricity. Human Rights Watch reported in June that Jordan's automated cash transfer program for workers on low incomes, developed with significant financing from the World Bank, is undermined by errors, discriminatory policies, and stereotypes about

poverty. The program is part of a social protection system that is failing to provide support to many people even as they go hungry, fall behind on rent, and take on crippling debt.

Jordan remains one of the few countries in the world that still allows imprisoning people for debt, which is prohibited under international law. In 2023, authorities lifted the pandemic-related state of emergency, ending a moratorium on debt-related imprisonment for sums exceeding 5,000 Jordanian dinars (about US\$7,000). Human Rights Watch documented how, in the absence of an adequate social security net, tens of thousands of Jordanians took out loans to cover basic necessities, only to end up in prison or wanted for failure to repay.

Criminal Justice System

Local governors continued to use provisions of the Crime Prevention Law of 1954 to place individuals in administrative detention for up to one year, in circumvention of the Criminal Procedure Law. Jordan's NCHR reported in 2023 that only 2,258 people were administratively detained in 2021, marking a dramatic decrease from the 21,322 administrative detentions in 2020.

There is much to do and share without prejudices or distinction.





'Amman is a prison':

Rise in suicides highlights mental health crisis in Jordan

Adam Jawad escaped Iraq with his family following the US-led invasion in 2003, living in Syria until war forced him to flee again a decade later, this time to Jordan, where he eked out a living doing odd jobs and working at a cultural centre in the capital, Amman.

Jawad wrote scripts for short movies and sometimes performed as a DJ and rapper, but he felt his aspirations were impossible to realise and saw no future for himself in Jordan. Without the freedom to travel outside the country, and unable to find the support he needed to cope with trauma and displacement, despair took over.

"Amman is a prison," he wrote in his last post on social media, a few hours before he ripped out the pages from his Iraqi passport and took his own life last November. He was just 27.

A rising number of people in Jordan are choosing to end their lives. The government's National Institute for Forensic Medicine registered 169 suicides in 2020 – the highest number in a decade (and the latest year for which official statistics are available) – but experts believe the real numbers are probably much higher, since deaths by suicide are often underreported due to the stigma of discussing the issue.

While it's not easy to pinpoint the exact cause, life is becoming increasingly difficult for many in the country. Unemployment rates have soared to nearly 25%, reaching 48% among youth. Last February, young Jordanian men protesting against unemployment threatened to take their own lives if their demands for jobs were not met. Then there are the rising rates of depression among refugees, many of whom carry the trauma of war and prolonged displacement, paired with a critical lack of support.

The government's response to the crisis has been to criminalise public suicide attempts. Last month, Jordan's parliament approved an amendment to the country's penal code, which would punish attempted suicide in public spaces with up to six months in jail, as well as a fine of 100 Jordanian dinars (US\$140). The law still needs to be ratified by King Abdullah II, who holds the power to promulgate all laws passed by parliament's two houses.

Jordan's Prime Minister Bisher Al-Khasawneh has defended the law as a way to "protect the right to life" and "maintain public security". But for people like Dr. Walid Sarhan, a psychiatrist who has spent decades campaigning for mental health awareness in Jordan, the government's proposal to criminalise suicide attempts in public is "a catastrophe".

Sarhan worries that the law will punish and incarcerate people who are sick, and discourage many from looking for help when they may need it most.

"Instead of punishing people who attempt to commit suicide, we should be focusing on improving mental health services," Sarhan told The New Humanitarian.

Refugees particularly vulnerable

There is only around one psychiatrist for every 100,000 people in Jordan, according to the World Health Organization. In addition to services provided by public hospitals and private clinics, just a few NGOs provide mental health services and psychosocial support to refugees and vulnerable Jordanians who are unable to afford treatment. But Sarhan says needs far exceed the services provided.

Sixty psychiatric beds per 100,000 population were considered optimal and 30 the minimum, whilst 25–30 was regarded as mild, 15–25 as moderate, and less than 15 as severe shortage. This is the first expert consensus on minimum and optimal bed numbers involving experts from HICs and LMICs. Further, consider 15 psychiatrist for every 100,000 people as a base level.

Jordan has 5 psychiatric hospitals, 3 psychiatric inpatient units, and 103 primary healthcare facilities integrating mental health services through mhGAP

"Public hospitals are understaffed and overcrowded," he said. "Services need to be upgraded and we need more training and investment, but very little has been done to improve mental health care over the last two decades," he said.

According to a 2020 report by the International Medical Corps, most people with symptoms of mental illness in Jordan do not ask for help, and very few follow up with treatment. Other recent studies of

mental health services in the country found that financial limitations, stigma, and poor accessibility to – and shortages of – mental health professionals were the main barriers to treatment.

These obstacles pose a particular challenge for Jordan's refugee population – one of the world's largest in terms of proportions of refugees per capita. More than 760,000 refugees, mostly from Syria and Iraq, are registered with the UN's refugee agency, UNHCR, but the unofficial number is estimated at around 1.3 million.

The consequences of the prolonged COVID-19 pandemic and deteriorating socio-economic conditions have been particularly hard for these communities; **about 80% of Jordan's refugees live below the poverty line, with 60% in extreme poverty**. UNHCR surveyed refugees who do not live in camps earlier this year, and 28% said they experienced high or severe levels of depression.

"Consultation rates increased by over 50% in 2021, the mental health situation deteriorated, [and] there are increasing reports of suicide attempts and suicidal thoughts," said Ahmad al-Shibi, who coordinates International Medical Corps' Mental Health and Psychosocial Support programme supporting refugees and vulnerable Jordanians.

The organisation runs psychotherapeutic care centres across the country, providing free services to about 8,000 patients a year.

"There are more people in need of mental health services, but at the same time there is donor fatigue," said al-Shibi. "Jordan is facing a difficult situation because needs are increasing, but funding is being reduced."

With over a decade of conflict in Syria, and the Ukrainian war overshadowing crises in the Middle East, international assistance is being cut and humanitarian programmes are shutting down. Mental healthcare in Jordan is already underfunded in the public sector, too: Experts told The New Humanitarian that less than two percent of the country's total health budget goes towards mental health.

Jordan's refugee population is likely to be particularly in need of the few services that do exist. Dr. Mohammad Abo-Hilal, a Syrian psychiatrist who has worked in Jordan, said refugees are at increased risk of psychiatric disorders as they are more vulnerable to the traumatic effects of violence, loss, the destruction of homes and livelihoods, and prolonged displacement.

Abo-Hilal had fled in 2011 to Jordan, where, together with Syrian psychologists, he set up an NGO that provides psychiatric and psychosocial support to refugees and raises awareness about mental health issues.

Non-Jordanians are barred from certain professions in Jordan, and Abo-Hilal was unable to work as a clinical psychiatrist in the country. He moved to Turkey in 2014, where he continues to work with refugees. He believes that a community-rooted approach is the best way to address the current mental health crisis and reduce the stigma that prevents many from looking for help.

"Suicide is not just about mental health, and it's not an individual issue," said Abo-Hilal. "It's also about deteriorating living conditions, about a lack of basic needs, and about social injustice. So we need to deal with it as a collective issue, and to look at the structural problems to be able to solve it."

Suicide as a political and social issue

Shaken by the loss of their friend and alarmed by the rise in depression and suicidal thoughts among young people, members of <u>Jadal</u>, the cultural centre where Jawad used to work, decided to host a collective mourning session and organise events to raise awareness about mental health.

"We are not talking about individual acts of despair," he said. "It's collective suffering, so it takes a collective approach to solve it."

"Our goal is to create a safe space for people to know they are not alone," said Fadi Amireh, Jadal's cofounder and a close friend of Jawad's. For Amireh, the reasons behind the rising suicide rates in Jordan are political, social, and economic. "We are not talking about individual acts of despair," he said. "It's collective suffering, so it takes a collective approach to solve it."

Others in Jordan are creating campaigns to change the stigma around mental health and suicide and making resources available online for anyone seeking mental health treatment.

Hareb, which means "fight" in Arabic, a social media campaign started by psychiatry resident Yazan Halasa, conducts awareness-raising sessions to promote mental health as an essential component of health, and to combat the perception of mental illness as weakness. Circle of Hope, a youth-led organisation founded by psychologist Renad al-Qurani in 2019 when she was still a student, is collecting information about psychosocial support to make it easier for people to look for help in Jordan.

"We gathered resources on mental health and will make them available online so people will know where to find help and also be able to find more information about therapy and mental health," al-Qurani told The New Humanitarian, adding that Circle of Hope will soon launch a website with listings of psychiatric and psychological service providers.

Psychiatrist Sarhan has also created an online campaign to fight mental health stigma in the Arab world, and is working with a psychologist and a publisher to create booklets on mental health to distribute in Jordanian schools. But he told The New Humanitarian that awareness-raising initiatives are not enough.

"We need to be able to provide proper mental healthcare services," he said. "What's the point of raising awareness and telling people they are sick if then we are not able to provide treatment?"

Amireh of Jadal believes the only way to push back against the proposed new law and lack of mental healthcare in Jordan is to band together. "Instead of addressing the structural problems, the government is trying to punish and repress the symptoms of the crisis," he said. He pins his hopes on community-based initiatives providing support and mutual aid. "We need to stand in solidarity with each other, to take responsibility for our own societies and to take care of each other." In the end, he said, "that's all we have".

MENTAL HEALTH IN JORDAN

The World Health Organization (WHO) has determined Jordan's mental health system needs significant restructuring, estimating that more than 25% of Jordanians experience mental health symptoms. Increased poverty rates due to conflicts in neighbouring countries impacting the social climate have affected Jordan's ability to cope with mental health in Jordan. Out of 100,000, only 305 Jordanians seek help for mental health symptoms, a problem needing a resolution.

The Current State of Mental Health in Jordan

When discussing the challenges the Jordanian government must address, there are pre-existing strengths to build on. The fact that the Jordanian government has acknowledged the problem is a small leap in the right direction, especially in a predominantly Muslim country.

As of 2020, the WHO observed that Jordan's mental health care system had a solid psychiatry program, a community that wants reform and affordable mental health that is free or inexpensive. The Jordanian Ministry of Health supports implementing the WHO's mental health action program (mhGAP). Aside from programs and affordability, mental health in Jordan has a low budget designated for facilitating mental health programs. In 2021, the annual budget reserved 6.1% for health services, and there needs to be more information on how that funding impacts mental health care. Known usages of Jordan's health funding supported long-stay psychiatric facilities.

Psychiatrists and medication availability are scarce. Before the expansion of mental health in Jordan, there was less than one psychiatrist per 100,000 Jordanians, an unbalanced ratio showing a shortage of resources. In addition, medications, even for common disorders such as depression and anxiety, are sparse, and regulations make it harder to receive medication if available.

NOTE: "Stigma remains another huge barrier blocking people from seeking mental health support. Mental health is considered a taboo topic, and people often hide their concerns and avoid seeking help from their families or from a professional."



THE HEALTHCARE SYSTEM IN JORDAN

Jordan is an Arab country located in the East Bank of the Jordan River. It has a population of 11.5 million (2024) people. Although one of the smaller countries in the Middle East, many know Jordan for its advanced healthcare system. The international community, along with the World Health Organization, are consistently taking notes from the Jordanian healthcare system in the hopes of applying some of its stronger elements, such as widespread insurance coverage and increased investment, to countries with weaker systems.

Facts about Healthcare in Jordan

The healthcare system in Jordan includes public and private sectors. The public sector provides a majority of Jordan's 12,081 hospital beds. The private sector contributes to the country primarily through the provision of home healthcare. There is a total of 106 hospitals, public and private, in Jordan. Due to recent shifts in the political climate in the Middle East, Jordan has accepted a high rate of refugees. More refugees, coupled with an increase in the domestic population, has greatly increased the demand for hospitals. To keep up with the growing population and improve the healthcare system in Jordan, lawmakers implemented a national e-health system. This e-health system intends to connect all public and university hospitals, maintain organisation and establish easily accessible health records for all. Primary clinics supply rapid access medical care along with vaccinations, maternity and childcare and quick treatment for chronic conditions. Until recently, healthcare in Jordan lacked a formalised home healthcare system. Without this system, patients needing long-term care must remain in acute care facilities for weeks, even months, at a time. Since the implementation of Jordan's home healthcare initiative in 2017, the industry has trained 300 health professionals and gained the participation of 28 healthcare facilities, both public and private. The country is currently expanding home healthcare policy while other countries in the Middle East lack a structured home healthcare system, putting Jordan at one of the most modern healthcare systems in the region.

Infant Mortality in Jordan

The infant mortality rate, one of the lowest rates in the region, stands at 13.9% and has steadily declined over the last 10 years. Furthermore, the maternal mortality rate is 62 per 100,000. This rate is much lower than the average of 420 per 100,000 live births in the Eastern Mediterranean region. The consistent betterment of the health conditions of children and infants is in part due to the universal child immunisation that the country achieved in 1998. Since then, Jordan has made it a significant priority to improve the conditions of healthcare that it provides to women and children. Unfortunately, this priority does not stand true in most countries surrounding Jordan.

National Health Policy and Organization

Given Jordan's sectoral organisation of the healthcare system, the country has one of the most modern systems in the region. Its high expenditure in healthcare goes toward developing newer methods of treatment and expanding healthcare accessibility sets Jordan apart from other countries. In 2003, the healthcare expenditure comprised about 10.4% of Jordan's GDP. Each sector has its own independent financial and managerial systems that reflect the regulation and delivery of services. This distribution of regulation allows for the country to target and improve specific elements of its healthcare system.

In the last decade, Jordan has reformed and improved its health information systems and human resources teams. Additionally, Jordan's government introduced a National Health Insurance system to provide large-scale accessibility to health insurance to a large part of the country's population. Overall, the net population of insured individuals in the last four years was around 55%. However, in other countries surrounding Jordan like Egypt, healthcare insurance coverage relies heavily on an individual's financial status and income. As a result, only those who are very well-off receive effective coverage.

Given the recent changes in prioritisation of the healthcare system in Jordan, the country has improved its standard of care greatly in the last 10 years. Compared with other Middle Eastern nations, Jordan stands out with its advanced healthcare system. Currently, though, the healthcare assistance that Jordan provides to Syrian refugees begins to decline due to financial burdens on its budget. Therefore, continued support from the U.N. is necessary to sustain refugee healthcare accessibility.

Abstract

Background

The Jordanian healthcare system has evolved over the past decades expanding its services, technological, and educational resources. A comprehensive view of this system is lacking. The objective of this report is to describe the structure of the Jordanian healthcare system, the challenges facing it, and the current and recommended health policies.

Materials and methods

This study reviewed the current status of the Jordanian healthcare system. The following parameters were analysed: health indicators, infrastructure, human resources, insurance system, pharmaceutical expense, health education system, and medical tourism. Data were collected from various relevant official institutions and related published literature.

Results

Jordan has a young population with a median age of 23.8 years. Life expectancy is 78.8 years for females and 77.0 years for males. The Jordanian healthcare system is divided into three major categories: (1) Governmental Insurance (i.e., the Ministry of Health (MOH), the Royal Medical Services (RMS) and semi-governmental insurance); (2) Private Insurance; and (3) Refugee Insurance, including the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA) and the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (NHUR). The Governmental Insurance covers 64.30% of the total population. Health expenditure is 6.37% of the gross domestic product (GDP). Pharmaceutical expenses make up 26.6% of the total national healthcare budget. Human resource assessment shows a high ratio of medical staff per 10,000 inhabitants, especially concerning physicians (31.7), dentists (7.9), and pharmacists (15.1). However, the ratio of nursing staff per 10,000 inhabitants is considered low (37.5). The Hospital bed/1000 population ratio is also relatively low (1.4). Healthcare accreditation is implemented through the Joint Commission International (JCI) accreditation which was achieved by 7 hospitals and by the National Health Care Accreditation Certificate (HCAC) achieved by 17 hospitals and 42 primary healthcare centres. Postgraduate medical education covers almost all medical and surgical fields. Medical tourism is currently well-established.

Conclusions

Assessment of the Jordanian healthcare system shows high ratios of physicians, dentists, and pharmacists but a low ratio of nursing staff per 10,000 inhabitants. The hospital bed/1000 population ratio is also relatively low. Pharmaceutical expenses are significantly high and medical tourism is well-developed.

Introduction

Jordan is a Middle Eastern Arabic country covering an area of 89,342 km with a total population of 11.517.887 inhabitants. Jordan is considered a low-middle-income country with a gross domestic product (GDP) of 48.65B USD/year and a GDP per Capita of 4,255.00 USD/year. In addition, Jordan hosts the second-highest share of refugees per capita worldwide.


The Jordanian healthcare system has evolved over the past decades transforming into a generally well-developed service despite being in an area of constant conflicts and volatility, particularly in neighbouring countries, such as Palestine, Syria, and Iraq.

During the last three decades, the health status of the Jordanian population has significantly improved. For example, since 1990, life expectancy has increased from 69.85 to currently 77 years for males and 78.8 years for females. Infant mortality has decreased from 32.0 to 12.8 per 1,000 live births in 2024. In addition, Jordan has become a popular destination for medical tourism in the region.

The country has one of the most modern health systems in the region and the total health expenditure was estimated at 6.73% of the GDP. The national policies in Jordan have been oriented towards expanding the health care umbrella to cover all Jordanian citizens.

The Jordanian healthcare system provides wide public healthcare services with a relatively low budget and is divided into a public system, private sector, and refugee insurance system. The public system is subdivided into the Ministry of Health (MOH), the Royal Medical Services (RMS), and semigovernmental insurance, such as the Jordan University Hospital and King Abdallah the First Hospital. The refugee insurance system is subdivided into the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA) and the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (NHUR) (Fig. 1). The governmental and semi-governmental insurances cover approximately 64.3% of the Jordanian population.

Structure of the Healthcare System in Jordan

A comprehensive assessment of the Jordanian healthcare system is currently lacking.

In this article, we describe the structure of the Jordanian healthcare system, the challenges facing it, current and recommended health policies.

Methods

In this study, we analysed the following parameters of the healthcare system: infrastructure (hospitals, number of beds, primary healthcare centres), human resources (physicians, dentists, pharmacists, nurses), insurance system (variety of insurance systems), pharmaceutical expenses, healthcare educational teaching system (undergraduate and postgraduate) and medical tourism.

Data were obtained from various relevant official resources and institutions, such as the MOH, Jordan High Council for Health (JHCH), National Statistics Department (NSD), Ministry of Higher Education (MOHE), Jordanian Universities, Royal Court (RC), National Department of Civil Status (NDCS), health care teaching, World Health Organization (WHO), the UNRWA and World Bank. We also utilised upto-date related published data. We excluded any data that was not officially published in PubMed nor reported by the official Jordanian organisations in order to avoid inaccurate data. This research project was sponsored by the University of Jordan (R.1511/2023/19). It did not require approval by our institutional ethical committee.

Results

Jordanian Administration System

Jordan is a constitutional monarchy in which the king is the head of state. He exercises his executive power through the Prime Minister and the Council of Ministers. The House of Representatives is democratically elected by Jordanians and the members of the Senate are appointed by the king. In addition, there is an independent judiciary system. Jordan is divided into 12 Governorates subdivided into 54 municipalities.

The Jordanian economy is classified as an emerging market with a mixed economic system, including a private economy combined with centralised economic planning and governmental regulation.

Demography and health indicators

According to the national official statistics from 2023, the total population of Jordan was 11,517,887 [8,514,069 (73.92%) Jordanians and 3,003,818 (26.08%) non-Jordanians], including 5,344,299 (46.4%) females and 6,173,588 (53.6%) males. (note the wide variance of females to males)


The age range of 0–14 years constitutes 30.7% of the population, and individuals between 15 and 65 years and over 65 years constitute 65.9% and 3.7% of the population, respectively (Table 1). The median population age is 24 years.

The unemployment rate is still above the pre-pandemic levels (22.6%), especially among women (29.4%) and the young (46.1% among those under 25 years). The female labour force is particularly small, being one of the smallest in the world. Life expectancy for females and males was 78.8 and 77.0 years, respectively. The infantile mortality below the age of 5 years was 12.8/1,000 live births whilst the fertility rate was 2.22 children per woman. (Table 1).

Disease patterns have also changed in Jordan, alongside the economic development, from predominantly acute to chronic diseases. Today the leading causes of death per 100,000 inhabitants are ischemic heart disease (48.08), cerebrovascular accidents (28.8), road traffic accidents (RTA) (17.0), diabetes mellitus (16.7), and lung cancer (10.84) (Fig. 2). Two important burdens on the health system are smoking and obesity. The prevalence of smoking among Jordanians is very high, with a prevalence of smokers under the age of 45 years of 85% with a male-to-female ratio is 53.6%, to 46.4%. Obesity, a global public health problem in terms of morbidity and mortality is prevalent in the country. According to the waist-to-height ratio (WHtR) measurement, 44.2% of Jordanian men and 47.8% of Jordanian women are considered obese.

Health Insurance System

Overall, 76.80% of the Jordanian population is covered by some healthcare insurance system (Table 2). Among non-Jordanians who are not considered refugees, this figure is 25.3%. The Jordanian health insurance system can be divided into three different categories (Table 2):

- 1. Governmental insurance, which is subdivided into the MOH, the RMS, and semi-governmental insurance. A total of 65.59% of Jordanian citizens are covered by governmental insurance. The MOH insurance covers governmental employees and their dependent family members (i.e., 40.99%). In addition, all children less than 6 years old and citizens aged above 60 years are freely covered by the MOH. The RMS covers military members and their dependents (i.e., 23.31%), and the semi-governmental services cover university employees, their dependents as well as university students (i.e., 1.29%).
- 2. Private insurance: it includes private institutions that are responsible for the health insurance of their personnel and independent individuals who purchase private insurance (i.e., 12.5%).
- 3. Refugee insurance: It includes mainly primary healthcare. The UNRWA is responsible for the healthcare of Palestinian refugees (i.e., 6.8%) while NHUR covers Syrian refugees (Table 2).

4. Primary healthcare clinics in Jordan provide quick access to medical care, vaccination schedules, maternity, childcare, and chronic disease management services. They operate in urban as well as rural areas and range in size from small individual clinics to comprehensive multi-clinic centres, depending on the area and its population.

Health Expenditure

- The national expenditure on public health arises from services provided by the MOH, RMC, and semi-governmental agencies and represents 6.4% of the GDP. This expenditure covers 65.6% of the Jordanian population (Table 3). The costs of governmental and private sector services constitute 64.3%, and 31.75% of the total healthcare expenditure, respectively.
- The in-hospital services represent 69.55% of the national health expenditure, whereas 21% is spent on primary care, 7.17% on administrative activities, 1.62% on training, and less than 1% on miscellaneous activities (Table 4).
- The MOH insurance also covers the dependent family members of contributing individuals. Affiliated subjects pay 3% of their gross salaries per month, with an upper limit of 30 JD/month. Coverage includes all potential health conditions and their respective treatments (Table 4).
- In 2022, the average cost per patient admission was 782.3 JD regardless of the length of hospitalisation. Moreover, the mean inpatient day cost was 236.6 JD, and the bed day cost (i.e. without additional medical procedures) was 172.9 JD.
- The average operation cost was 449.6 JD and the per emergency room visit cost was 31.8 JD.
- The outpatient clinic expenditures (out of pocket) were 28.8 JD and 6.8 JD at private and public facilities, respectively (Table 4).
- The pharmaceutical and disposable expenditures accounted for 15.15% of the total health expenditure budget of the MOH whilst 26.6% of the total health expenditure was attributed to just the pharmaceutical expenses. However, medication fees for the insured are symbolic, ranging from 0.25 to 10 JD per drug. Other types of insurance have followed similar payment criteria.

Syrian refugees place an important burden on the healthcare system in Jordan. The cost of healthcare for Syrians in Jordan is 271 million JD/year. The Government's policy on Syrian refugees' access to healthcare services has changed over the last 10 years. At the beginning of the Syrian crisis, the government granted free of charge access to the Jordanian public health system. However, by 2015 Syrian refugees followed the same insurance criteria as Jordanians. In 2018, the policy was reversed with Syrian refugees having to pay 80% of the established fees for foreigners in Jordan at the MOH facilities. However, Syrian refugees were still exempt from fees for maternity and childhood services.

Hospital beds and primary health care

- Tertiary health care in Jordan includes 120 hospitals [i.e., 31 MOH hospitals with 5,884 beds, 17 RMS hospitals with 3,350 beds, 2 university hospitals with 1,236 beds and 70 private hospitals with a total of 5,529 beds]. Accordingly, the total number of hospital beds in Jordan is 15,999 (1.45/1,000 population). (Table 5)
- There are a total of 832 primary healthcare clinics and 440 dental clinics.

Human resources

The ratio of healthcare professionals in Jordan per 100,000 population is 31.7 for physicians, 9 for dentists, 15.1 for pharmacists, and 37.5 for nursing staff (Table 6).

Accreditation and healthcare

During the last decade, there has been an increasing awareness of the importance of accreditation in healthcare activities. Accordingly, 7 hospitals were accredited by the Joint Commission International (JCI) [i.e., 2 university hospitals, and 5 private hospitals] as well as a private laboratory.

The National Health Care Accreditation Council (HCAC) also accredited 17 hospitals from the public, private, and academic sectors and 42 public primary health care centres. In addition, it also certified two diagnostic imaging centres. This has led to a significant improvement in the overall quality of the Jordanian healthcare system.

Medical education

Undergraduate medical education

Jordan's undergraduate medical education started in the 1970s with the establishment of the first medical school at the University of Jordan. There is a relatively large number of medical and dentistry schools in the country (i.e., 8 and 6, respectively).

Admission to medical schools depends exclusively on grades obtained in the Jordanian General Secondary Certificate exam (JGSC) or equivalent. The students who meet the minimum requirements in the science JGSC track (i.e., a score of 85%) or equivalent are eligible to apply for medical schools in Jordan. No additional cognitive or non-cognitive tests are required for this purpose.

The admission system to Jordanian medical schools includes multiple tracks: (a) The open National Unified Admission (NUA) track; (b) a track for underprivileged students; (c) for the children of university employees (UES); (d) the parallel track (i.e. this is a track for students with lower scores that are required to pay higher registration university fees) and (e) The international track for foreign students.

The curriculum is divided into an initial 3-year pre-clinical or basic medical science stage (integrated system) followed by 3 clinical years (traditional). At the end of the sixth year, students undergo a written theoretical assessment as well as a supervised clinical assessment. The students who successfully pass the exams are awarded a medical doctor degree provided they also complete a research project, which is evaluated by a faculty committee during the last semester of the program.

There are currently approximately 20,609 medical students at Jordanian universities with a similar number studying abroad. However, there is a relatively low number of nursing students and a high number of dentistry and pharmacy students (Table 7). Approximately, 3,000 students graduate from Jordanian medical schools annually, whilst another 1,000 students graduate from countries abroad.

Postgraduate medical education

A partial postgraduate specialty medical training program (i.e. 2–3 years of training) was established in 1968 at the RMS and some MOH hospitals. This resulted in residents having to complete their training in centres abroad to obtain their official specialty degree. In 1982, the Jordan Medical Council (JMC) was established to control the practice of medical specialties in the country, and the first complete residency programs were established at Jordan University Hospital. This was followed by similar programs at other MOH and RMS hospitals as well as the Jordan University of Science and Technology Hospital and, more recently in some private hospitals and the King Hussein Cancer Centre. The approximate number of the offered medical training positions is 1,200 posts/year nationwide.

Postgraduate medical education in Jordan is oriented towards the acquisition of specialty degrees in all the major clinical specialties and some subspecialties. The admission criteria to postgraduate medical and surgical training programs are based on a theoretical exam and an interview, both performed by each training centre and accredited by the JMC. The duration of the training period varies between specialties, ranging between 4 and 6 years, and the trainees are evaluated each year. To qualify as specialists, the

trainees must pass the JMC competency assessment at the end of the program. This assessment is supervised by a select committee of senior qualified specialists and is divided into two parts: (a) Part 1; a multiple-choice questions (MCQ) exam that includes basic medical and clinical sciences related to the specialty and (b) Part 2 comprised of a comprehensive assessment that includes specialty-specific MCQs, oral and clinical exams. After passing these final exams, the residents are qualified to practice as specialists throughout the country. Specialists trained in other countries must also pass these exams to be eligible to practice in Jordan. In 2023, new legislation exempted from the JMC exams postgraduates from countries abroad who hold a foreign board certificate and have 3 years of experience as specialists in the country they graduated from.

Regarding the postgraduate academic track, there are currently variable tracts of master's degree programs in basic medical sciences and only one PhD program in medical statistics.

Medical health tourism

The tourist industry's contribution to the global GDP reached 10.3% in 2019 and was responsible for the creation of one out of every four new employments worldwide. In Jordan, there are approximately 55,000 jobs directly related to tourism with an additional 125,000 jobs indirectly related. The state of the tourism sector is widely regarded as "below potential", especially given the country's rich history, ancient ruins, Mediterranean climate, and diverse geography.

Medical tourism in Jordan has progressively become more relevant as a result of the good reputation of the Jordanian healthcare system regionally. Medical tourism constitutes 3.5% of the country's GDP. This sector, which has a high added value and creates employment in many areas is supported by the government with investments and incentives.

The competitive edge of medical tourism arises from its cost-effective health services, its renowned healthcare reputation, and the diversity of its touristic attractions. In addition, the majority of the medical tourists who visit Jordan come from other Arab countries, as Jordan offers a similar culture and no language barrier.

Discussion

The Kingdom of Jordan is a low to middle-income country, with a population having a median age of 24 years, which is below the average world age (i.e. 30.5 years). However, with the continuous increase in life expectancy and decrease in the fertility rate, the average age of the Jordanian population is expected to increase in the coming years.

Jordan is in an area of constant conflicts and volatility, particularly in neighbouring countries, such as Palestine, Syria, and Iraq, affecting its economy and constituting a significant burden on its healthcare system. The country has a high percentage of immigrants (i.e. 33.89%) compared with other countries that are traditional receivers of immigrants (i.e. Australia 30.14%; Canada 21.33%; Germany 18.81%; the USA 15.28% and the UK 13.79%). Syrian refugees have placed significant challenges on the Jordanian healthcare system, especially because of the high prevalence of women and children, wounded patients, individuals suffering from mental health conditions, and elderly patients. These vulnerable groups require a wide range of expensive services. In addition to affecting the healthcare system, the high number of immigrants and refugees has a significant impact on the country's infrastructure, security, social structure, financial sector, and education.

The kingdom has a high unemployment rate (i.e., 23.5%), that is particularly high among the female population. Accordingly, only 14.7% of women within the working age contribute to the country's workforce compared with 39.49% worldwide. Nevertheless, there is a high percentage of female undergraduate students in Jordan (i.e. 55%) and this number increases to 65% among healthcare students (Table 7). However, many of these female students decide not to work after concluding their

studies attributed to multiple factors. We, therefore, believe that there is a need to readjust the current legislation to encourage women to participate in the national labour market.

On the other hand, the different causes of death and morbidity also have an additional burden on the health care system. The leading causes of death are similar to those in lower-middle-income countries. However, the incidence of road traffic accidents (RTA) is particularly high (i.e. 18/100,000 inhabitants) when compared with lower-middle-income and other countries (i.e. the UK, Spain, Germany, and Australia where the death ratio due to RTA is less than 5/100,000 population). The morbidities and disabilities caused by RTAs, constitute an additional burden on the Jordanian healthcare system with an estimated cost of RTAs of 324 million JD/year, according to the Jordan Traffic Institute.

The smoking rate in Jordan is one of the highest in the world, with a prevalence of 70.2% among adults. The male/female ratio is 53.6% /46.4%. Moreover, the prevalence of smokers below the age of 45 is 85%, making it the highest among eastern Mediterranean countries and the second highest worldwide after Indonesia. Smoking is associated either directly or indirectly with approximately one in every 8 deaths in the country. It also has an estimated cost of US\$2.67 billion annually because of healthcare expenditures and loss of productivity. Therefore, stricter implementation of the law by the different national institutions should be a national priority to reduce the burden of smoking on society. Obesity is another burden on the economy and healthcare system in Jordan due to associated morbidity and mortality. According to the WHtR measurement, the prevalence of obesity in the Jordanian population is 44.2% in men and 47.8% in women. The prevalence of obesity is alarmingly high and increasing in many countries in the Eastern Mediterranean region due to changes in food consumption, reduced physical activity, and an increasingly sedentary lifestyle. However, obesity in Jordan is also among the highest in the region and higher than in Western countries, such as the USA and UK (i.e. 34% and 24%, respectively). Consequently, obesity in Jordan results in an estimated cost of 650 M JD annually.

The number of hospital beds in Jordan (i.e. 4.4/1,000 inhabitants) is relatively low compared with other countries (i.e., 12.65/1,000 inhabitants in South Korea). Moreover, the bed occupancy rate is also low at 58% compared to the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) countries (i.e., 75%). Therefore, there is a need to increase the number of hospital beds and bed occupation efficiency, which requires further reinvestment in the infrastructure and a better management of resources.

Jordan has a high number of physicians, dentists, and pharmacists per 10,000 inhabitants and a relatively low number of nurses. These figures require future adjustments to adapt the number of health professionals to the demands of the labour market. Moreover, the number of unemployed physicians is currently approximately 2,500 (unpublished data from the records of the Jordan Medical Association). Public health insurances cover 64.30% of the Jordanian population. However, the government is considering a potential expansion of the public insurance system to include all Jordanians. This step would require an important additional investment increasing the health care expenditure to 9% of the GDP. Nevertheless, the size of the public healthcare insurance is one of the best in the region (e.g., in Egypt, the public health insurance covers 60% of the population) but it is still limited compared with other countries, such as Turkey (90%) and Spain (99%).

The total health expenditure in Jordan was estimated to be 3.17 billion USD (i.e., 6.37% of the GDP), which is similar to other countries such as Greece (8.6%), Israel (7.4%) and Turkey (4.3%). Expenditure on pharmaceutical products is relatively high in Jordan reaching up to 25.9% of the total health expenditure. This number is higher than the majority of the OCED countries and similar to Greece (27%) and Romania (23.9%).

Global Healthcare Accreditation (GHA) is one of the major players in the global medical travel industry, which identifies and compares medical travel programs and destinations against global standards and international best practices. There has been an early awareness of the importance of the quality of the

health system in Jordan. The country involved national and international organisations, to achieve quality certificates, such as those from JCI, JCI-academic centres, and Health Care Accreditation Council (HCAC). This awareness has had a positive impact on medical tourism, making Jordan a regional leader in this sector. As mentioned above, the number of healthcare graduates should be adjusted to the requirements of the labour market. Moreover, postgraduate medical education has a limited number of training residency programs and infrastructure; and there should be a close supervision of the quality of training programs, by JMC and the Jordan Medical Association (JMA).

Finally, the medical tourism sector in Jordan is highly competitive compared to other countries in the region, not just for the competitive costs of treatment but also for the additional services that support health tourism in general.

Strengths of the study

This is a comprehensive updated study of the healthcare system in Jordan. It includes information on the national health system, infrastructure, human resources, medical education, and health tourism. It also includes updated figures, which can be valuable for experts, stakeholders, and healthcare researchers.


The weak points

Due to the insufficient data in PubMed, we had to use information from different national institutions and annual reports. Moreover, there was some variation in several estimates depending on the sources (i.e. governmental reports or international organisations).

Conclusion and recommendations for future research and policy actions

The Jordanian health system is divided into public and private sectors and United Nations refugee services. The healthcare infrastructure needs a larger number of hospitals and a more efficient administration regarding bed occupancy and pharmaceutical expenses. Moreover, Jordan needs the effective support of the international community to cover the health needs of the Syrian and Palestinian refugees. The country also needs to address significant social health problems, such as the high number of road traffic accidents, the prevalence of smoking, and obesity. More attention should be paid to postgraduate medical education, including the academic track of PhD programs, especially in our medical schools. HIERARCHY of HEALING SYSTEMS




ALLOPATHIC – Western Medicine treats the symptoms, is highly regulated and costly as it is cost driven. Symptoms are suppressed – no healing!

In summary:							

Primary goal is to increase the number of doctors throughout Jordan, while advancing their education and skills.

Water supply and sanitation in Jordan is characterisd by severe water scarcity, which has been exacerbated by forced immigration as a result of the 1948 Arab—Israeli War, the Six-Day War in 1967, the Gulf War of 1990, the Iraq War of 2003 and the Syrian Civil War since 2011. Jordan is considered one of the ten most water scarce countries in the world. High population growth, the depletion of groundwater reserves and the impacts of climate change are likely to aggravate the situation in the future.

The country's major surface water resources, the Jordan River and the Yarmouk River, are shared with Israel and Syria who leave only a small amount for Jordan. The Disi Water Conveyance Project from the non-renewable Disi aquifer to the capital Amman, opened in July 2013, increases available resources by about 12%. It is planned to bridge the remaining gap between demand and supply through increased use of reclaimed water and desalinated sea water to be provided through the Red Sea-Dead Sea canal.

Despite Jordan's severe water scarcity, more than 97% of Jordanians have access to an improved water source and 93% have access to improved sanitation. This is one of the highest rates in the Middle East and North Africa. However, water supply is intermittent and it is common to store water in rooftop tanks. The level of water lost through leakage, under-registration, and theft in municipal water supply (non-revenue water) is approximately 51%. Water tariffs are subsidised. A National Water Strategy, adopted in 2009, emphasises desalination and wastewater reuse. The country receives substantial foreign aid for investments in the water sector, accounting for about 30% of water investment financing.

Access

Jordan has reached a high level of providing water supply and sanitation services (see table). 99.3% of the population have access to improved water supply, 99.5% to improved sanitation, which is high compared to other developing countries and considering Jordan's very scarce resources. Although the physical infrastructure exists, a lack of available water causes a rising demand of bottled and tanked water for many households.

According to WAJ, only 65% of the population are connected to the sewerage system. The rest of those having access to improved sanitation uses on-site sanitation solutions such as septic tanks. These septic tanks, if not lined properly, may leak to the groundwater aquifers and contaminate them.









How Each Water Source is Used (in MCM)




Demand and Supply Projections for the Municipal Sector (Drinking Water)



Demand and Supply Projections for Irrigation




Demand and Supply for Industrial Sector




Cultivated Land for Irrigated and non-Irrigated Crops





Change in average water and watewater tariff versus electricity tariff of water sector










Detailed Projected Water Demand (MCM)



^{*}Seasonal peak demand is the additional water supply requirement and system capacity needed to meet the demand during the high period of the year mainly during May to August.






Current and Future Water Resources for Irrigation in MCM



The King's Highway: The road that reveals Jordan's history

It's mentioned in the Bible, it been used by a succession of empires and it links some of Jordan's most important historical sites.

"Welcome to Jordan!" a group of kids shouted excitedly, as I stepped out of the car to admire the sun setting over the vast sandstone canyon of Wadi Mujib.

While I stood on the cliff's edge, awestruck by the mountain ranges stretching to the Dead Sea, a black-and-white hooded wheatear swooped down near me. I wondered how something so delicate could survive in such desolate ravines, fluttering across the arid mountains and building nests in rock crevices.

From my perch, I could see a narrow, serpentine road winding down the ridges and gorges. This route, known as the King's Highway, or *Darb ar-Raseef* ("paved road", in Arabic), is believed to be one of the world's oldest continuously used roads. For millennia, merchants, pilgrims, warriors and kings travelled north to south through Jordan's central highlands, and this thoroughfare served as a vital artery connecting ancient kingdoms and empires.

Today, a modern, tarmacked road (officially called Highway 35) sits atop its ancient ancestor. It runs south from Syria along the Jordan River, passing through Roman ruins, Byzantine mosaics, Crusader castles and the ancient city of Petra – effectively revealing the history of Jordan and linking some of its most important historical sites.

"This route was used in the Nabataean period [4th Century BCE to roughly 106 CE], and probably even before that, in the Iron Age," said Fawzi Abudanah, an archaeologist who has studied the region's ancient road system. A road traversing Jordan known as the "King's Highway" is mentioned in the Bible's Old Testament as the route that Moses asked permission to cross after leading the Israelites out of Egypt. As Abudanah explained, since there is archaeological evidence showing Edomite, Nabataean, Roman, Byzantine and Islamic presence along much of the current highway, it suggests that this road has been in continuous use since at least the 8th Century BCE. "We keep following the footsteps of our ancestors," he said.

According to Abudanah, in ancient times, the King's Highway was an important trade route connecting Arabia, the Fertile Crescent, the Red Sea and Egypt. Caravans transporting incense and spices from Arabia took this road on their way to the thriving Nabataean capital of Petra. In the Roman period, emperor Trajan (who reigned between 98-117 CE) renamed the route Via Nova Traiana and paved it to accommodate wheeled carts. "We can still find Roman milestones on the side of the modern road," Abudanah said.


For centuries, the road was also an important pilgrimage route. In the Byzantine period, Christians used it on their way to visit biblical sites in the Holy Land, such as Golgotha, the site of Jesus crucifixion. In the early Islamic period, many Muslims travelled along it on their way to Mecca.

I lived in Amman, Jordan's capital on and off for several years, but always took the faster, easier roads heading south. When my cousin came to visit me, we decided the best way to explore the country's long and tangled

history was to take the King's Highway and travel slowly along the path that the many civilisations who have shaped this ancient land once used.

The ancient road once passed by Amman's highest hill, occupied since the Bronze Age. So before leaving the capital, we wandered among the ruins of a Roman temple, a Byzantine church and an Umayyad palace, which reflect the history of Jordan's layered heritage.

We then travelled 30km south – past olive orchards, ripening pomegranates and rows of prickly pears – to the ancient town of Madaba. "The road crosses the most fertile part of the country, the area where you have springs and water sources, but also agricultural land. It's the backbone of Jordan," Abudanah told me.

Madaba is best known for its collection of Byzantine-era mosaics. The most famous of them, the remains of a 6th-Century floor mosaic housed in the modest St George Orthodox church, is considered the oldest surviving map of the Holy Land, and depicts various sites linked by the King's Highway. Near the church's altar, I tried to decipher the Greek captions indicating Jerusalem in the centre of the map, and marvelled at the details of fish swimming in the River Jordan and boats on the Dead Sea.

Nine kilometres west of Madaba, a short detour from the King's Highway led us to Mount Nebo, where Moses purportedly first saw the Promised Land, and where he's believed to have died and been buried.

In the Old Testament, Moses asks the King of Edom to pass through his land in what is now south-western Jordan. "We will stay on the main road until we leave your territory," he promised. But his request to travel along the King's Highway was denied. The modern road is far more welcoming – I was told "Welcome to Jordan" dozens of times, and was offered tea and invited for lunch and dinner by many locals I met along the road.

"People here are so kind and generous," said Sabine Hendriks, a Dutch tourist cycling along the King's Highway with her partner, heading south to the Red Sea port of Aqaba. "When we couldn't cycle up a very steep hill, a truck stopped to help us. It was already full, but somehow they managed to find space for us."

On a quick stop to stretch our legs, a young man working in a bakery by the side of the road told us we were his guests and brought us a tray of sweets and warm date bread. Satiated, we continued south across the gently undulating plateau towards the Unesco World Heritage site of Umm ar-Rasas. When we reached the archaeological site it was already closing time, but a friendly guard named Alaa let us in anyway and offered to show us around.

Once a Roman garrison town, the site houses ruins from the Roman, Byzantine and Early Islamic periods. While we walked to the remains of an 8th-Century church (monastic Christianity was tolerated during Islamic rule), Alaa asked us to close our eyes, and we were only allowed to open them when we were in front of the site's renowned mosaics. I stood there consumed by the ancient towns and pomegranate trees depicted on the church's floor, wondering how the mosaics remained so vivid after more than 1,200 years.

We travelled along the valleys and rolling hills dotted with oak, cypress and juniper trees, the landscape becoming increasingly arid, and watched the sunset at Wadi Mujib. The next morning, we explored the medieval castle in the city of Kerak. Built in 1142 and retaken by Muslims in 1188, it is one the biggest and best-preserved Crusader fortresses in the Middle East. Fuad, a local guide, led us through the castle's many floors, some buried so deep we needed a torch to see the vaulted halls and underground chambers. He asked us to imagine Saladin, the legendary sultan who defeated the Crusaders, sitting there on a throne, their battles playing out against the backdrop of the ancient highway.

Continuing south along the meandering road, we passed by the <u>Dana Biosphere Reserve</u>, Jordan's largest and most diverse protected region. Spread over 292 sq km, this mountainous swath of the Great Rift Valley shifts from towering sandstone cliffs to desert plains. The plan was to visit the town of Shobak's imposing medieval castle. But instead, we stopped on a curvy by-road in the arid hills to drink coffee with Mohammad "Abu Ali" Al-Malaheem. When the former tour guide retired, he decided to build what he calls "the world's smallest hotel" – a battered Volkswagen Beetle lovingly decorated with his daughter's embroidery – that's become so popular, it has been visited by Jordan's King Abdullah II.

Abu Ali gifted me a colourful beaded necklace made by local women. His generosity and endearing roadside hotel reminded me that while the King's Highway might have lost its importance as a major trade route, it's the people who you meet and experiences you have along the way that bring it to life.



After a purposefully slow, two-day, 250km road trip, we reached our final destination: Petra, which was declared one of the New Seven Wonders of the World. Few places can rival the splendour of the ancient Nabataean city carved out of red sandstone in the arid desert. Petra was once a great mercantile city at the crossroads of empires and ancient trade

routes, and the road used by Nabataean caravans that made the region prosperous is now trodden by tourists who come from all over the world to visit the site's more-than-2,000-year-old temples, tombs and altars intricately carved into the narrow canyons.

Later that day, we stopped on a road outside of Petra to give a ride to a woman walking home after a long day selling souvenirs at the site's archaeological park. She introduced herself as Umm Khaled and, despite being exhausted from work, she invited us to her home in a nearby village.

Heading back to Amman with the promise to visit her again, I thought about the black-and-white bird I saw in the ravine of Wadi Mujib and how throughout history, people here have managed to carve extraordinary monuments from these rocks and breathe life into this arid landscape. The King's Highway not only showcases the most important phases of Jordan's history, but also reveals what makes the country so special: the surprising possibility of finding beauty, kindness and generosity even in the most difficult of places.

Jordan loses 3,511 lives in road accidents over six-year period

AMMAN — Alarming statistics from recent annual reports by the Public Security Directorate (PSD) reveal that road accidents in Jordan have claimed the lives of 3,511 individuals over a six-year period, transforming vehicles into unintentional killing tools and leaving families in grief and individuals permanently disabled, according to a report by Al-Mamlaka TV.

The reports released by the PSD shed light on the scenarios surrounding these accidents, indicating that driver errors and law violations were the main factors contributing to over 90 percent of the approximately **one million traffic accidents that occurred between 2017 and 2022.**

Stricter penalties and traffic law amendments needed

The absence of adequate deterrent punishments has prompted urgent calls for stricter penalties and amendments to traffic laws in Jordan.

The aim is to reduce these tragic accidents and safeguard human life.

Despite the disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the number of accidents remained relatively consistent each year. From 2017 to 2021, there were approximately 10,000 to 160,000 accidents annually, with a slight increase in 2018.

Surprisingly, 2022 witnessed the highest number of accidents over the six-year period, reaching 169,409.

Ineffectiveness of current traffic laws highlighted

The staggering figures from the PSD reports spanning the last six years emphasise the ineffectiveness of the current traffic laws' penalties in reducing the number of accidents.

With a total of 915,114 traffic accidents, 5,408 severe injuries, and nearly JD2 billion in financial losses for Jordan, the consistent yearly rates impose significant burdens on the state, society, and affected families, necessitating immediate action.

Analysing data from the first five months of the current year, the PSD's findings indicate that the youth demographic, specifically individuals aged 18 to 35 years, is most susceptible to road accidents.

Within this age group, 46% of both deceased and injured individuals were accounted for, underscoring the urgent need for targeted measures to address this concerning trend.

The World Bank is working for the people of Jordan to create more and better opportunities for all. The World Bank Program in Jordan promotes an ambitious agenda for jobs and access to basic services such as education and health while helping Jordan address the impact of the Syrian crisis.

Jordan has shown remarkable resilience in maintaining stability and growth in the face of regional and global crises. This includes being one of the most water-scarce countries in the world, making Jordan highly vulnerable to climate shocks. Jordan is also host to an estimated 1.3 million Syrian refugees (12% of the country's population), providing a public good for the wider global community.

The country has maintained a steady average growth rate of 2.5% over the past decade. However, there is room for improvement in generating more job opportunities for Jordan's young population and for bringing more women into the labour market. Jordan's labour force participation rate was 33.0% in Q2-2023 (and only 13.8% for women). Unemployment increased to 22.3%, remaining well above its pre-COVID-19 crisis average of 15.1% (2012-2019), with youth (46.1%) and women (30.9%) being the most affected. Annual headline inflation decelerated significantly in 2023, to 1.4% in October 2023, supported by monetary policy tightening and lower commodity prices.

Building resilience to climate shocks requires addressing as a priority the **intertwined needs for water**, **energy, and food security.** In the region, Jordan has been a pioneer on climate with ambitious Nationally Determined Contribution targets, a green growth strategy, and efforts to green Jordan's public and private investment framework and its financial sector. This action is essential as **Jordan's population doubled from 5 million to 11.5 million people over the past two decades, putting pressure on the country's already limited natural resources.** Climate change will decrease water availability even further for agriculture, cities, firms, and social systems.

The Government of Jordan is implementing a three-track, 10-year Political, Public Sector and Economic Modernisation Agenda that was launched in 2021. Reforms focus on democratising political life, including by empowering women and youth; doubling Jordan's growth rate; creating one million new jobs; improving living conditions; promoting sustainability and strengthening government effectiveness and accountability

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

JORDAN - OIL and GAS

Jordan is located in the north-western part of the Arabian Plate within a producing sedimentary basin. Since the start of exploration in Jordan in 1947 by the Iraqi Petroleum Company, two fields have been discovered so far: Hamza oil field and Risha gas field. A discovery is reported in the WS-4 well (Sirhan Development area). Production in Jordan has started in 1984 of crude oil and in 1989 of dry gas which is used locally to generate electricity. The existence of the Hamza oil field and the Risha gas field proves the presence of two working petroleum systems in Jordan.



Jordan oil latest value from 2023 is **0.02 thousand Barrels Per Day**, unchanged from 0.02 thousand Barrels Per Day in 2022. In comparison, the world average is 429.63 thousand Barrels Per Day, based on data from 190 countries.


The Jordan News Agency, Petra, said the data was based on gas production from Risha Field in eastern Jordan, which reached **about 6510 million cubic feet** during 2021. That constituted a daily production rate of 17.8 million cubic feet, which marked a 22 % increase over 2020.

Jordan needs to import both oil and gas.



Figure 2: Incidence of Deprivation in the Arab MPI indicator (% of population)





Figure 3: Deprivation by indicator (% of population) at Acute Poverty and Poverty for urban and rural areas



Jordan has made significant progress in human development and economic growth in the last decades. Jordan's economy grew on average 6.5% from 2000-2009, while from 2010-2014 it slowed down to an average of 2.7%. The crisis in neighbouring Syria and Iraq have deeply affected Jordan, chiefly through the influx of refugees that have put strains on public resources and the economy, but also through disrupted trade routes and lower investments and tourism inflows. According to the latest census, 19% of Jordan's populations are Syrian refugees.

Although Jordan has made significant progress in reducing poverty in the last decades, there are still pockets of (monetary) poverty throughout the country and rural areas are far poorer than urban areas (World Bank, 2016a 2016b). The same is observed for food security. While some governorates are food secure, other governorates exhibit pockets of food insecurity (WFP, 2014). Jordan is one of the most water scarce countries in the world. The rapid population growth, urbanization, income growth, and the influx of refugees, put severe pressure on the demand for water and sanitation infrastructure in the country.





Figure 4: Headcount Poverty (%) in Jordan Governorates at Acute Poverty and Poverty

As shown in Figure 5, virtually no Jordanians are severely poor at acute poverty. At poverty, only a small share of the population, 1.2%, are severely poor. Moving to vulnerability to poverty, only 2.2% of the population are vulnerable to falling into acute poverty, a large share, 27.8% of the Jordanian population, are vulnerable to falling into poverty.

The percentage contribution of each of the three dimensions to the overall poverty value (taking into consideration both headcount and intensity) is a useful summary indicator. As shown in Figure 6, in Jordan education contributes to almost 2/3 of total deprivation at both levels of poverty. At acute poverty, the contribution of health is higher than at poverty, while the reverse is true for living standards.

Figure 6: Contribution of dimensions to acute poverty and poverty value (%)




Figure 7: Contribution of dimensions to acute poverty and poverty by rural and urban areas (%)





Figure 12: Headcount poverty at acute poverty and poverty by education of household head (%)

Update on the Context and Situation of Children

In 2023, Jordan was home to around 11.5 million people, over 90% of whom resided in urban areas. The country has one of the youngest demographic structures among the middle-income countries of the Arab region, with children under 18 years representing 40%, and young people (aged 15- 24 years) accounting for 20% of the total population. The Jordan Population and Family Health Survey (Demographic Health Survey – DHS, 2023) preliminary results indicated that 16% of the population aged five years or more had at least one functional difficulty related to a disability, of which 6% were children 5-17 years old and 1.6% of children had severe difficulties.

Jordan ranks second highest globally by the number of refugees per capita. Around 730,000 refugees are registered with UNHCR, predominantly from Syria and living outside camps; and over 2.5 million Palestinian refugees are registered with UNRWA, most of them holding Jordanian citizenship. Although 3,500 refugees have returned to Syria in 2023.

A camp survey conducted in early 2023, indicated that 97% of refugees do not intend to return to Syria in the next 12 months.

With a national income per capita of USD 4,482 (2023) (PPP USD 10,451 2023), Jordan is now classified as a lower-middle-income economy, which depends mainly on services, tourism, remittances, and foreign aid. Gross Domestic Product (GDP) growth over the last decade has been sluggish, rarely over 2.5% and the country has been highly vulnerable to external shocks, including the increase in oil prices, the impact of COVID-19 pandemic and global and regional conflicts. By the third quarter of 2023, the unemployment rate in Jordan was approximately 22% of the workforce (31.7% among women), still higher than the pre-COVID-19 levels (19% in 2019). An external debt (equivalent to 93% of the GDP in 2023 and limited fiscal space constrained the resources available for social services and social protection policies.

The available data on monetary poverty illustrated that in 2017-18 around 16% of the Jordanian population was living under the national poverty line, while a regional study in 2023 indicated that around 14% of children in Jordan were living in multidimensional poverty. The Government of Jordan has put in some poverty relief measures with one in five Jordanian children receiving cash benefit from the government in 2021.

The monetary poverty headcount ratio in early 2023, reached 45% among refugees living in camps and 62% in host communities, likely impacted by the growing cost of living and the reduction in humanitarian aid.

The DHS (2023) preliminary findings showed improvement in some of the child survival indicators. Under-five mortality declined from 19 to 15 child deaths per 1,000 live births between 2018 and 2023 while three and two per centage points decline were observed for infant and neonatal mortality rates, respectively. There was an increase in basic childhood vaccination for children aged 12-23 months with the rate of zero-dose children dropping from seven per cent (DHS 2017-2018) to one per cent (2023).

A growing burden of micronutrient deficiency, obesity and poor feeding practices in Jordan is also evident, disproportionately affecting females. Stunting among under-five children slightly increased from 7.7 to 8.3% with 11.8% among the lowest quintiles between 2012 and 2023. Overweight among under-five children doubled from 4.4 to 8.8% while the proportion of exclusively breastfed declined from 26 to 24% during the same period.

Jordan is off track in meeting most of its national and Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) health targets. Jordan has made significant strides in increasing the enrolment in basic education of both Jordanians and non-Jordanians but inequities in access to education remain. 92% of Jordanians compared to only 41% of Syrian adolescents have completed basic education (Grade 10). Analysis showed that being a refugee and having a disability status were predictors of school dropout.

Jordan had one of the longest COVID-19 related school closures in the world and this continues to impact student's attendance and learning. The Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA) results conducted in 2022 and published this year illustrated that students in Jordan had a lower average in mathematics, reading and science than in 2018. Jordan scored lower than their peers in the Economic Cooperation and Development Countries list.

Despite strides made in amending legislation to prevent violence against children, physical violence remains high and is closely intertwined with domestic violence. PISA (2022) results for Jordan showed that 11% of students aged 15 years reported not feeling safe in their classroom at school and that 25% of girls and 37% of boys reported being the victim of bullying at school at least a few times a month.

In 2023, child marriage rates published by the Supreme Judge Department were 9.1%, showing a decrease for the third year since 2020 when it was 10.5%.

Child labour increased from an estimated 76,000 to 100,000 between 2016 and 2022.

Children in Jordan faced significant challenges related to the combined impact of water scarcity and climate change. Vulnerable populations in Jordan, especially those residing in refugee camps, faced heightened risks and increased vulnerabilities due to steadily declining groundwater levels. The recently published National Water Strategy of Jordan stated that, as of 2021, the average total renewable freshwater resources available was about 680 million cubic metres which is equivalent to only 61m3 per person per year for all purposes and this amount is forecasted to drop to 35 cubic meters by 2040. The global threshold for classifying water scarcity is 500m3 per person per year, highlighting the challenge for Jordan.







Resources invested in education

- Expenditure on education is related to student performance only to a certain extent. Among the countries / economies whose cumulative expenditure per student, over all primary and secondary school years between the ages of 6 and 15, was under USD 75,000 (PPP) in 2019, higher expenditure on education was associated with higher scores in the PISA mathematics test. In Jordan, the cumulative expenditure per student, over ten years of age between 6 and 15, was equivalent to about USD 20,900 (PPP).
- In about half of all countries / economies with comparable data, school principals in 2022 were more likely than their counterparts in 2018 to report a shortage of teaching staff. This was also the case in Jordan. In 2022, 57% of students in Jordan were in schools whose principal reported that the school's capacity to provide instruction is hindered by a lack of teaching staff (and 50%, by inadequate or poorly qualified teaching staff). In 2018, the corresponding proportions were 41% and 40%. In most countries / economies, students attending schools whose principal reported shortages of teaching staff scored lower in mathematics than students in schools whose principal reported fewer or no shortages of teaching staff.

"The focus is really on rare diseases, but a credible case can be made that there are at least 10,000 diseases in the world, though there is likely more. And there are a bit over 500 treatments. So, as far as round numbers go, 10,000 diseases / 500 treatments works as a talking point."



# US, World Bank top list of foreign aid donors to Jordan, contributing US\$8.5b

AMMAN — In a report presented by the Planning Ministry on Sunday, the US and the World Bank topped the list of foreign aid donors to Jordan over the past four years, contributing about US\$8.5 billion in total, Al Mamlaka TV reported.

According to data reviewed by the Kingdom, the US has provided \$5.323 billion to Jordan over the past four years, while the World Bank has provided \$3.205 billion.

In 2021, the total volume of foreign aid, including grants and soft loans contracted to Jordan amounted to US\$4.416 billion, equivalent to JD3.129 billion, of which 42.4% was in the form of regular grants, 40.8% in loans, and 16.9% directed to the Syrian crisis response plan.

The US provided \$1.243 billion in 2018, \$1.262 billion in 2019, \$1.399 billion in 2020, and \$1.418 billion in 2021, with the largest proportion of this aid being grants worth \$3.665 billion and \$1.657 billion directed to the Jordanian Response Plan to the Syrian crisis.

The World Bank has provided Jordan with \$2.953 billion in loans over the past four years, \$126 million in grants to support the Syrian crisis response plan, and \$125 million in other grants.

The bank transferred \$515 million to Jordan in 2018, \$1.151 billion in 2019, \$674 million in 2020, and \$864 million in 2021.

Germany has given the third most aid over the past four years, providing \$2.36 billion, of which \$1.459 billion was given as grants and loans, and \$900 million was directed to the Syrian crisis response plan.

Germany provided Jordan with \$654 million in 2018, \$453 billion in 2019, \$542 million in 2020, and \$710 million in 2021.

Over the past four years, the EU has granted Jordan \$1.896 billion, of which \$520 million was in response to the Syrian crisis, \$952 million took the form of loans, and \$422 million in grants.

The European Investment Bank has offered \$579 million over the last four years, with an amount of \$556 million in loans and \$22 million in grants.

Additionally, France has provided \$552 million, of which \$32 million was in response to the Syrian crisis, \$469 million as a form of loans, and \$51 million as grants.

The UAE gave the seventh most aid, providing \$233 million, of which \$222 million was in grants, with the remainder allocated to support Jordan's response to the Syrian crisis.

Following the UAE, Kuwait has contributed \$216 million over the past four years: \$11.3 million in grants, \$141 million in loans, and \$63.7 million in response to the Syrian crisis.

Saudi Arabia followed Kuwait, granting Jordan \$207 million, distributed as grants worth \$150 million, loans worth \$50 million and \$7.4 million in response to the Syrian crisis.

Offering Jordan \$118.25 million, the UK has provided \$58 million in grants and loans, and \$123 million in response to the Syrian crisis, while Canada provided \$118.24 million: \$24.5 million in grants and loans, and \$93 million for the Syrian crisis response plan.

Planning Minister Nasser Shraideh mentioned in a previous statement to Al Mamlaka TV that grants and loans are allocated for several purposes, including financing capital projects and development programmes as part of the general budget law approved by Parliament.

They also contribute to bridging the funding gap for the Treasury or for financing priority development projects, "which reflects donors and funders' confidence in the transparency of Jordanian domestic governmental systems in managing foreign aid in line with the best international practices".

With regard to disbursement and control of foreign aid, the minister said the Ministry of Finance and Jordan Audit Bureau maintain oversight.

In regard to loans obtained through the Planning Ministry, Shraideh said that they are directed to support the general budget and finance priority developmental programmes and projects, with interest rates ranging between 0 and 4 per cent and repayment periods extending for 35 years, including grace periods extending from three to 10 years.

In recent times, governments have frequently imposed fees upon students engaging in higher education only to find stagnation returning to productivity growth. A counter-productive step for their societies.








This childhood suppression way of living continues throughout our schooling years, thus we learn this is a way of life that is normal.





## Soul Partner

There is no homosexuality on a soul level, only on a dysfunctional personality level. When each soulmate couple have respectively healed the Rebellion and Default within them, then being compatible partners for all of eternity, embark upon their joint journey (ascension) to Paradise – the home of our Heavenly Mother and Father – the Original Soul Partners!

During 2020, this account was made of soul partners of a family group who had lived close together in a small rural community in mid New South Wales of Australia. They are all now in the Celestial Heavens. More or less, the diversity of experiences and journeys may be considered typical for many billions of family personalities:

Nanna Beth's soul partner lived and worked in Western Australia's gold mining industry at the same time that Beth lived in New South Wales, Australia.

Her daughter, Marie's soul partner is a native from the Middle Eastern Kingdom of Quasoria, which no longer exists, but was on an island in the Pacific that also no longer exists. He's what you would call an ancient spirit, from three pole shifts back. (A pole shift is a cyclical event that unfolds around 12,000 to 13,000 years, the last one being more than 12,000 years ago. That suggests he may have lived on Earth some 40,000 years ago. Adam and Eve materialised on Earth more than 38,000 years ago in the Middle East, on a peninsula at the eastern end of the Mediterranean Ocean.)

Kevin, born in 1937, married Marie's eldest daughter. Kathaleen, Kevin's soulmate / soul partner was born in 1901, and is from Tennessee, USA, and is black. Kevin is white, so they are 'salt and pepper'.

Bradley, Kevin's son, suicided in 1999, and early April 2018 became Celestial. Bradley's soul partner is from the region that is now Russia – but it was not when she lived.

Raymond, Nanna Beth's grandson, died aged 23. Raymond entered the 1<sup>st</sup> Celestial Heaven in May 2018. His soulmate / soul partner had been in the Celestials for about twenty years and she was in the third Celestial Heaven sphere then. She is from northern Europe.

Benjamin John, Marie's grandson, miscarried at twelve weeks and was spirit born. His soul partner is also spirit born and they are now in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Celestial Heaven, both having had lives in the spirit Mansion Worlds that replicated living as if they were on physical Earth.






#### We are more alive than ever – when we are dead!

We perpetrate their erroneous ways!






## Truth is Freedom

Artificial Intelligence cannot discern emotions, and consequently cannot reflect emotions.



### Feeling Circle for Kids




We are free to cry and express our pain here!


#### SPIRIT BODY Brennan Model of the 7 Levels of the Human Energy Field

#### **CHALDI COLLEGE – EDUCATION:** Nanna Beth – $3^{rd}$ Celestial Heaven and James 28 July 2017

James: John has been wondering about how to set up schools and schooling 'under a tree', in keeping with it all being opposite to what we're all used to, can you give him any suggestions or point him in the direction he should look?

Nanna Beth  $-3^{rd}$  Celestial Heaven: These are some ideas he can consider - just suggestions John, we won't say it has to be this or that way, as you know, it's for you to work things out. So basically, what would you like John - how would you have liked school to be?



Schooling is voluntary. It should be made to be something children want to do, not something that's forced on them.

It should be fun, as in keeping the whole focus on making them feel good about all they are doing. Not artificially praising them or praising them over their peers, but just supporting and being personal with them, allowing them to respond and find their own way.

It should not be separated into classes based on age. Classes should involve all ages, for example, the younger ones can learn and watch and be helped by the older ones, but not forcing the older ones to help the younger, all voluntary and what would naturally happen, more like in a big loving family rather than segregated because of age or whatever. Perhaps the 5, or less, to 10 in one group, 11 to 16 in another.

Teachers are to be able to deal with children of all ages, and work to allow the student to progress at the students own pace. Special or extra schooling can be provided when necessary to students that want more.

The subjects should all be practically oriented. Everything offered and so accepted voluntarily. Reading, writing and basic arithmetic, all so as to help the child deal with the real world. Other subjects like psychology — morals and ethics, love and friendship, acceptance and tolerance of ALL feelings, particularly bad ones, resolving disagreements, expressing feelings and yet not necessarily acting on them — particularly the bad ones, all based around how to respect and treat other people how you'd like to be treated. And how if you hurt by infringing upon another's will, then you will have to suffer that same amount of hurt, either now or in spirit. And about the Feeling Healing, what happens when you feel bad feelings, how to look to your feelings for their truth, so as to grow in understanding of yourself, nature, life, other people, and God — the whole spiritual aspect, including the Divine Love and Mother and Father, yet no religious indoctrination. The history, culture, place in the world. How to integrate with the modern world, computers, phones, internet, etc. Sport, play, arts, creative lessons and involvement. How to live and respect nature, the natural world, the environment, hygiene, natural health, sex, contraception, abortion and so on — about the person, the body, things to dispel myth and falseness, general science. Trades, technical work, hands on experience — building stuff, ways to use one's mind to do what one wants to do.

Duration of classes, half a day, longer when older for those wanting to learn more, homework voluntary and at the child's initiative – wanting to do it.

School is just part of life, not separate to life. Part of the family, tribe, society, not separate from it. Inclusion of other adults, parents, family members, as aides, helpers, teachers, together with professional teachers. Lots of people, and in particular older people (who also have the time), are natural teachers and should be encouraged even though they've not been specifically trained. One can only learn a certain

amount being taught to be a teacher, yet in reality, very few trained teachers have any real natural feeling for it. The more the 'teacher' makes their pupil feel the pupil is the important one, and the teacher is only there to help them if they need their help, and not to stuff it down their throats whether they like it or not, is where to begin. And how a child of differing ages learns, is as varied as the children themselves. So the more 'teachers' the better, and that means the child can gravitate to the 'teacher' that best suits them, rather than having to spend a whole year with someone you hate and you feel hates you.

University for higher learning, full on, voluntary, free, all information on any subject available with competent teachers. So the student can excel should they want to.

It all being with the focus on the person, offering them things which they can try and see if they like. Things that will help them in the world; and how to be a person living true to themselves – true to their own feelings; and how to respect another as one respects oneself.

James: Nanna Beth, John would like any comments on the Council of Elders continuing to contact people on Earth after he's croaked it.

Nanna Beth: It's as James said, there will be an increasing number of people opening up to us Celestials for all sorts of help, once they understand who we are and how we can help. So yes John, there will always be some main people on Earth we'll work with. Of course you're not wanting to go and instigate yet another religion in which people have to adhere to a set of rules because you know what will happen to that, any rules allowing people and their controlling agendas to take control over others, is something to be avoided at all times. However the notion of a 'religion', and one based on feelings, with no fixed agenda, no rules, just founded on truths, will allow people to have some sort of structure to relate to should they need that, but one in which they are entirely free to do whatever they feel based on their feelings. because it is a religion that is not a religion, yet more a true religion of truth than any of the existing religions are, so you're showing up those religions for the untruth that they are.



#### **TENTATIVE WISH LIST (Education)**

1. Early Childhood Education (identify and fund a model school).

Kindly consider a pre-school to be established within every province. This may be centred in communities that the mothers can obtain employment. The mode of operation and management of a centre could have a combination of trained personnel with extended family supporting. The structure may vary to reflect the needs and customs of the town or larger villages. Training of key staff is a priority leading to opening of pre-schools – this could be considered through regional campuses of Pascas University that are to be established.

These papers have been specifically developed for the education system and classroom application. These are to be added to the materials that may be considered by the Education Leadership Team. The culture of the people in each region being accommodated, to be melded with the environment presently existing and evolving.

3. School library / resource centre in each province possibly in the model school.

We can consider establishing a model demonstration school in every province – and even more than one – or as many as seen appropriate. Each school when reviewing their library / resource centre, with no exceptions, can have their wish list considered, should they come forward with what they may feel required. This will need a significant administration team and appropriate resources to manage the logistics. This could also involve internet communications involving satellite, renewable power generation and laptops / ipads / tablets to be provided and installed.

4. Teacher professional development (in-service, workshop etc.) on various topics such as early literacy and numeracy including multi modal literacy), civic and citizenship education, basic health

and hygiene. The teachers' professional development should be aimed at supporting the new curriculum in Jordan: Standards Based Curriculum (SBC). A priority area would be providing training on Teaching and Learning pedagogies – HOW to teach, not really WHAT to teach to complement what the Jordan government, through the Jordan Department of Education, is doing. With online teaching and learning, teachers need to be trained on various technological content knowledge (TCK) such as using Google classroom, setting up zoom link and webinars, etc..

Consider the establishment of teachers' training campuses in provinces with potential teachers also being provided with scholarships to enable them to follow their passions and complete required training. Scholarships may be extended to providing housing and costs of living. These provincial campuses may be the start of Pascas University throughout Jordan and surrounding nations.

5. Training on Leadership and Management in Schools aimed at school principals, curriculum leaders, etc. to engage in school policy development, implementation, and evaluation.

Again, Pascas University campuses in provinces to enable as many potential educators to be accommodated to build the numbers of true educators to a level that education throughout Jordan can be an example of what can be achieved in a short period. This will also require the flattening of the hierarchical controlling domination that prevails throughout the education systems worldwide – it is this control that is stifling free flowing initiatives of many great educators. Workshops can be conducted at all appropriate Teacher Training campuses for all leader type educators.

6. Standards Based Curriculum materials – supplied but insufficient for all schools throughout the country. Textbooks for different subjects except for Maths and Science developed by JICA (Japan International Cooperation Agency), then train them as well on how to use these Teachers' resources.

All materials and textbooks may be supplied. Uniforms may also be supplied. Kitchen facilities may be included in the schools and food supplied and prepared by catering staff for breakfast and lunch as required. The question is to ensure respect and acceptance of such support. Is it simply handed out? Is it invoiced to each student and announced as a scholarship? Is there a nominal payment from the student? It is to be free, however the student is to understand its importance in a way that is culturally acceptable.

7. Alternative education (adult and early school leavers) skills training to improve lives addressing inequities and promoting social justice concept. Begin by funding existing Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) schools with infrastructure, resources, (tools and equipment).

Pascas styled TVET Colleges may be established in each province and concentrated on providing Technical and Trade Skills and IT training to equip the school leaver to be immediately and valuably employed in the local workforce, thereby retaining more of the population in the regional areas. Again,

the education is to be free. This may be done with; "here are your fees and, congratulations, here is a scholarship".

8. STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) education – develop resource materials to help teachers to implement these various projects prescribed in the curriculum. Such as teacher workbook. Concept applied in projects. Materials / equipment needed for these to support.

This is a big task and it is for those with big overview sight and then detail focus to attend to the minute requirements. It will also be an ongoing evolution. Pascas is to support this agenda all the way.

9. Sport development in schools (Physical Education (PE) equipment, uniforms, etc.).

Sport is the only reason why many attend school. Education is meant to be fun. This is mostly lost in the controlling addictions of most people throughout the education world and elsewhere in our lives. Sport is an important component of the school syllabus and fields and courts and swimming pools may be established in each school and the necessary equipment and uniforms supplied.

Again, consider instructing an administration team to request what each education facility considers that it needs and then approve a delivery and installation operation.

Our minds are addicted to untruth. Our minds cannot discern truth from falsehood. Consequently 98% of assumptions are wrong – the other 2% are fluxes. Count the number of assumptions in research papers. We will then discover and understand the reason why society is floundering!

12. Education of girls to be prioritised.

If a girl spends only 2 years at school, she is likely to have more than 7 children. If she spends 6 years at school, she is likely to have around 4 children. If she spends 12 years at school then she may have only 2 children. World poverty is best averted by the tool of education in the first instance.

Mechanism by which Adverse Childhood Experiences Influence Health and Well-being Throughout the Lifespan



### Disability group

Disability group is a broad categorisation of disability. It is based on underlying health conditions and on impairments, activity limitations and participation restrictions. It is not a diagnostic grouping, nor is there a one-to-one correspondence between a health condition and a disability group.

Broadly, grouping disabilities depends on whether they relate to functioning of the mind or the senses, or to anatomy or physiology. Each disability group may refer to a single disability or be composed of a number of broadly similar disabilities. These 6 separate groups are based on the particular type of disability;

- sensory and speech (sight, hearing, speech)
- intellectual (difficulty learning or understanding)
- physical (including breathing difficulties, chronic or recurrent pain, incomplete use of limbs and more)
- psychosocial (including nervous or emotional conditions, mental illness, memory problems, and social or behavioural difficulties)
- head injury, stroke or acquired brain injury



• other (restrictions in everyday activities due to other long-term conditions or ailments).



# **HIERARCHY of HEALING SYSTEMS**




ALLOPATHIC – Western Medicine treats the symptoms, is highly regulated and costly as it is cost driven. Symptoms are suppressed – no healing!





Women are closer to their feelings and that is why the nursing profession hosts a lot of women who calibrate a little over 500. These women are the healers in hospitals.







# Income and expenditures, by age of reference person.


# **Salary Variance**

# 1. Average wages

In Jordan, the average salary can vary significantly based on occupation, experience, education, and other factors. As a developing country with a growing economy, Jordan has witnessed fluctuations in its wage structure over the years. According to recent data, the average salary in Jordan typically ranges from around 600 JOD (Jordanian Dinar) to 800 JOD per month, which translates to approximately 850 to 1,200 USD at the current exchange rates. 1 Jordanian Dinar = 1.41 US Dollar

The average monthly salary takes into account the full spectrum of jobs, from entry-level positions to high-level managerial roles. However, there remains a substantial difference between the salaries in different sectors. For example, the IT and banking sectors tend to offer higher wages compared to industries like tourism and retail, which often pay closer to the lower end of the wage scale. It's important to note that the average salary in Jordan is just a statistical measure, and individual wages can be much higher or lower.

The average monthly salary in Jordan is also shaped by the cost of living in the country. While certain areas, notably the capital city Amman, are known for their relatively high cost of living, others may be more affordable, allowing for a more comfortable lifestyle on an average salary. Additionally, expatriates working in Jordan might find their salaries to be higher than the national average, often as a result of international salary standards implemented by multinational companies operating within the kingdom.

It is also relevant to mention that, when discussing the average salary in Jordan, a distinction has to be made between public and private sector wages. Typically, public sector employees enjoy a range of benefits and job security that can compensate for what is sometimes a lower nominal salary when compared to the private sector. Private companies, on the other hand, may offer higher salaries but with varying degrees of job stability.

The statistics pertaining to the average salary in Jordan point towards an economy that is diverse and in a state of transition, reflecting both the opportunities and the challenges faced by its workforce.

# 2. Factors that Influence Salaries

In Jordan, as in many other countries, there are several factors that can significantly influence the salaries of employees across different sectors. Understanding these factors is crucial for both employers and employees to navigate the job market effectively.

- Educational Attainment: Individuals with higher education levels, such as a bachelor's degree or above, often command higher wages. Specialised degrees in engineering, medicine, and business are particularly valued and tend to attract higher salaries.
- Experience: Experience plays a pivotal role in determining an individual's salary. Employees with more years of experience in their industry typically earn more than those who are just starting their careers. Senior positions with managerial responsibilities are often compensated at a higher rate than entry-level roles.
- **Skills and Expertise:** In-demand skills can also boost earning potential. For instance, professionals with expertise in IT, programming, and language fluency (especially English) have an advantage in the job market and can negotiate higher salaries.
- **Industry:** Some industries offer higher wages due to the nature of the work or demand for specific skills. For example, occupations in the finance, IT, and healthcare sectors usually offer higher wages compared to hospitality, customer service, or retail.
- Occupation: Certain job roles are inherently higher paying due to their requirements and the level of responsibility they carry. Executives, physicians, and engineers often receive higher salaries than clerical staff or workers in the service industry.
- **Geographic Location:** Geographic disparities can influence wages. For instance, salaries in Amman, the capital city, tend to be higher compared to other regions due to the higher cost of living and the concentration of multinational corporations and government institutions.
- **Gender:** Gender can unfortunately play a role in salary variations, with men often earning more than women for equivalent roles, highlighting the gender pay gap.
- **Public vs. Private Sector:** As mentioned previously, salaries in the public sector versus the private sector can vary, with the private sector often offering higher average salaries but less job security and fewer benefits than the public sector.
- **Supply and Demand:** The basic economic principles of supply and demand also affect salaries. Jobs in high demand but low supply can drive up wages, whereas jobs with an oversupply of candidates may see downward pressure on wage levels.
- **Company Size and Profitability:** Larger and more profitable companies usually have the resources to pay their employees more than smaller businesses with tighter budget constraints.
- **Legislation and Unions:** Government policies and the presence of trade unions can influence minimum wages and collective bargaining agreements, ultimately impacting overall salary standards.

These factors collectively contribute to the complexity of the wage landscape in Jordan. It is important for job seekers to consider these elements when evaluating potential employment opportunities and for employers to remain competitive within their respective markets.

# 3. Minimal Wages (Monthly and Hourly)

In Jordan, the national minimum wage is mandated by the government and serves as the legal salary floor for most workers. As of the latest available data, the minimum monthly wage in Jordan was set at 260 JOD (Jordanian Dinar), which equates to around \$366 USD depending on the exchange rate. This amount

represents the lowest legal salary that employers are required to pay their employees on a monthly basis. Minimum Wages in Jordan remained unchanged at 260 JOD/Month in 2024 from 260 JOD/Month in 2023.

The hourly minimum wage is not widely used as a standard in Jordan due to the prevalence of monthly salary agreements. However, for the sake of comparison or calculations for part-time employment, it can be estimated by dividing the monthly minimum wage by the standard number of working hours in a month. The typical workweek in Jordan is Sunday through Thursday, with a standard of 8 hours per day, equating to approximately 40 hours per week.

If we assume a total of 26 working days in a month (excluding Fridays and Saturdays), this results in roughly 208 working hours per month (26 days x 8 hours/day). Dividing the monthly minimum wage of 260 JOD by 208 hours gives us an approximate hourly rate of 1.25 JOD, or about \$1.76 USD. It is important to note that these figures may vary slightly based on specific labour laws, customary work schedules, and any subsequent changes to the minimum wage rates made by the Jordanian government.

- The monthly minimum wage of 260 JOD applies to many sectors across the country.
- An approximate hourly minimum wage can be calculated for part-time jobs or overtime work.

This minimum wage is intended to ensure that workers receive a basic level of income to cover their living expenses. However, debates often arise regarding the adequacy of the minimum wage, with labour activists and certain employee groups advocating for higher minimum wages to keep up with the cost of living, particularly in urban areas like Amman.

Exceptions to the minimum wage standards might apply to certain populations such as domestic workers, agricultural labourers, and non-Jordanian employees, who are sometimes subject to separate regulations or agreements.

# 4. Gender Wage Gap

The issue of the gender wage gap is a significant concern in Jordan, as it is in many countries around the world. The gender wage gap refers to the difference in earnings between women and men in the workforce. This gap is often represented as a percentage that indicates how much less, on average, women earn compared to their male counterparts for doing similar work.

Several factors contribute to the gender wage gap in Jordan, including:

- **Social and cultural norms:** Traditional roles can influence the types of jobs that are deemed suitable for women and can also affect women's participation in the labour force.
- Workforce Segregation: Women tend to be concentrated in certain sectors which traditionally offer lower wages and fewer opportunities for advancement.
- Education and Skill Level: While educational attainment among Jordanian women is high, their skills may not always match the needs of the labour market, or they might face barriers to entering certain fields.
- Work Experience: Women often have interrupted career paths due to childbearing and family care responsibilities, which can impact their overall work experience and growth prospects.
- **Labour Market Policies:** Policies that do not support flexible working conditions or maternity leave, for example, can disproportionately affect women's earnings and employment opportunities.
- Lack of Representation: Women are underrepresented in leadership positions, which influences the overall gender wage dynamics and the perception of women's value in the labour market.

**Despite a highly educated female population, participation in the labour force has been historically low and unemployment high**. The average labour force participation rate for women in Jordan has been around 14% for 2009–19 as compared to male participation rates of 62% for the same period. Average unemployment rates for females are also higher for 2009–19 at 23% in comparison to males at 12%. Quantifying the gender wage gap in Jordan presents challenges due to the variety of factors at play and differences in data collection. However, reports indicate that Jordanian women earn significantly less than men on average when compared with their participation in the workforce.

The gender wage gap in Jordan is approximately 17% in the private sector. In the public sector, the gap is 28%. Females working in the private sector earn 41% less than their male counterparts. The International Labour Organization (ILO) reported that in the private sector, the median wage for males is 7% higher than the median wage for females. In the public sector, however, the median wage for females is 13% higher than the median wage for males. The World Bank estimated in 2020 the wage gap for women and men working similar jobs with similar education and experience in Jordan's private sector at about 17%.

Efforts to address the gender wage gap in Jordan include legislative actions, awareness campaigns, and initiatives to empower women economically. These are geared towards creating more equitable work environments, encouraging female entrepreneurship, and ensuring that women have access to education and vocational training that align with market demands.

Despite these efforts, progress in closing the gender wage gap has been gradual, and continued focus on gender disparities in the labour market is necessary to foster a more inclusive and fair economic landscape for all Jordanians.

# 5. Highest Paying Occupations

In Jordan, like in many countries, certain occupations offer significantly higher salaries than others. These high-paying jobs often require specialised skills, advanced education, and considerable experience. Here is a list of some of the highest paying occupations in Jordan:

- Healthcare Professionals: Doctors, particularly specialists such as cardiologists, neurologists, and surgeons, command very high salaries due to their specialised knowledge and the critical nature of their work.
- **Dentists:** As with other healthcare professionals, experienced dentists with private practices can earn high incomes in Jordan.
- **Engineering Managers:** Those with senior roles in engineering fields, especially in sectors like energy, construction, and manufacturing, are among the top earners.
- **Information Technology Managers:** IT managers and executives who oversee technology strategies and operations for companies often have significant earning potential.
- **Banking and Finance Experts:** High-level positions in banking, investment, and financial management, such as CFOs and finance directors, receive lucrative salaries.
- Lawyers: Legal professionals, especially those at senior levels or with expertise in commercial law, have access to high wages.
- **Telecommunications Engineers:** Experts in telecommunications engineering, due to the growing tech sector in Jordan, are in demand and well-compensated.

- **University Professors:** Academics with tenure or those working at prestigious universities may earn high salaries, particularly if they have a strong publication record or hold administrative positions.
- **Pharmaceutical Representatives:** Professionals in pharmaceutical sales or management positions, given the robust healthcare industry, can also secure high wages.
- Chief Executive Officers (CEOs): Executives at the helm of corporations, particularly successful multinational companies, can command the highest salaries in Jordan.

This list is not exhaustive, and various other professions, such as aviation pilots, marketing directors, and construction project managers, can also offer high salaries depending on the specific context of the job, the size of the company, and the scope of their responsibilities. Those occupying senior managerial positions or possessing rare skills and qualifications tend to be at the higher end of the pay scale. It's important to note that while these occupations offer high salaries, securing such positions often requires a combination of education, experience, and sometimes personal connections within the industry. Additionally, these roles come with a significant amount of responsibility and can involve long hours and intense workloads.

# 6. Annual Average Wage Growth

The annual average wage growth in Jordan provides insight into the economic trends and the evolving labour market conditions within the country. Wage growth is an indicator of how the average salary changes over time, reflecting factors such as inflation, economic development, productivity improvements, and shifts in supply and demand for labour.

In recent years, Jordan has experienced modest annual wage growth, which has been influenced by both domestic and global economic conditions. The growth rates have varied among different sectors and occupations, with some industries seeing more significant increases due to higher demand for skilled labour and others experiencing smaller gains due to market saturation or economic challenges.

- **Inflation:** Inflation plays a crucial role in determining real wage growth. The cost of living adjustments must be factored in to assess whether the wage increase actually corresponds to an improvement in purchasing power for the average Jordanian worker.
- **Economic Growth:** Economic expansion tends to lead to higher demand for labour, potentially accelerating wage growth as businesses compete to attract and retain employees.
- **Government Policies:** Fiscal and monetary policies implemented by the government, including those related to taxation and public sector wage adjustments, can directly influence wage growth.
- **Productivity:** Improvements in productivity, often driven by technological advancements and training, can lead to increased wages as businesses generate more revenue per employee.
- Labour Market Dynamics: The interplay between the supply of labour in various sectors and the demand for specific skills influences the rate at which wages grow, with high-skill industries often experiencing faster wage growth.
- External Factors: Global economic trends, trade agreements, and foreign investment levels also impact wage growth, as they affect overall economic performance and labour demand.

While Jordan's wage growth in certain years might paint an optimistic picture, it is essential to balance this against the cost of living increases and inflation rates to understand the real income progression for workers. The wage growth must outpace inflation for there to be a genuine improvement in living standards. Furthermore, disparities in wage growth across different demographics and regions within the country underline the uneven nature of economic benefits.

Jordan's government and private sector continue to implement strategies aimed at boosting economic growth and productivity, which are expected to contribute positively to wage growth over time.

However, these efforts must be sustained and coupled with educational reforms, skill development programs, and investment in technology to ensure that wage growth keeps pace with the evolving demands of the global economy.

# 7. Compensation Costs (per hours worked)

The compensation cost per hour worked is a crucial metric for understanding labour costs in any economy. In Jordan, these costs encompass not only the wages or salaries that employees receive but also include social security contributions, taxes, and any other legally mandated benefits or bonuses that employers must provide.

These additional compensation elements can significantly impact the overall cost of labour for employers and thus influence business decisions regarding hiring, expansion, and investment. The following are key components of compensation cost per hour worked in Jordan:

- Wages / Salaries: This is the basic hourly wage or salary that an employee earns for the work performed during a specific period.
- **Social Security Contributions:** Employers in Jordan are required to contribute to the Social Security Corporation on behalf of their employees at a rate determined by law, which covers pensions, disability, and other social benefits.
- **Annual Bonuses and Holiday Pay:** Depending on the company's policy and the employment contract, employees may be entitled to annual bonuses, holiday pay, or end-of-service benefits, which are averaged into the hourly compensation cost.
- **Allowances:** This may include transportation, housing, or meal allowances that are part of the compensation package offered to employees.
- **Health Insurance:** Many employers provide health insurance coverage, the costs of which are factored into the total hourly compensation.
- Overtime Pay: Employees working beyond the standard work hours are usually eligible for overtime pay, which is higher than the regular hourly rate.
- **Training and Development:** Investment in employee training and skill development can also be considered a part of compensation costs, although these are generally amortised over the duration of the employees' tenure.

The total compensation cost per hour worked can therefore exceed the apparent wage cost substantially when all these factors are included. While direct wage comparisons are more straightforward, understanding the full picture of compensation costs requires a detailed analysis of all associated expenses from the employer's perspective.

In Jordan, the labour law and various regulations dictate many of the above-mentioned elements, ensuring that workers receive fair compensation in addition to their wages. Employers need to take these costs into account when planning their labour budgets and when making competitive offers to potential employees.

Comparing compensation costs internationally can be challenging due to differences in labour laws, living costs, and economic conditions. However, multinational corporations and businesses considering outsourcing or establishing operations in Jordan must closely evaluate these costs to make informed decisions.

It is also noteworthy that while compensation costs are a significant factor for employers, they are equally important for employees as these benefits and protections form an integral part of their overall remuneration and job satisfaction.

#### 8. Comparison with Other Countries

The average salary in Jordan can be compared to both regional and global standards. These comparisons give insight into Jordan's economic standing and its competitiveness in the global job market. Below is a discussion on how salaries in Jordan stack up against those in other countries:

#### **Regional Comparison:**

When comparing Jordan to its neighbouring countries in the Middle East, it is evident that there is a wide range of average incomes due to the varying levels of economic development and wealth within the region. For instance, Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries, such as Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, and Qatar, often have higher average salaries due to their strong economies, bolstered by oil and gas revenues. However, these countries also have higher living costs, especially in major cities such as Dubai or Doha.

Countries like Egypt and Lebanon, on the other hand, might have average salaries that are closer to those found in Jordan, but they also struggle with economic instability and inflation, which can erode real income levels.

#### **Global Comparison:**

Globally, developed Western countries typically offer higher average salaries when compared to Jordan. The United States, countries in Western Europe, and Australia, for example, boast some of the highest incomes worldwide, reflecting their strong economies and high living standards. Nevertheless, it's crucial to consider the cost of living, which is significantly higher in such countries; thereby, a direct salary comparison does not always equate to the same standard of living.

To illustrate the differences more clearly, here is a comparison table featuring average monthly salaries in Jordan and selected other countries:

# Facilitating female employment in Jordan Key Issues and Trends

Youth make up the majority of the population in the region and in a country like Jordan, where around 70% of the citizens fall under 30 years of age, this is a critical issue that must be addressed immediately (United Nations Jordan, 2019).

The youth unemployment rate in Jordan for the year of 2018 stands at a staggering 37.2%, which is noted to be one of the highest figures in the past 30 years and among the highest globally (The World Bank, 2019). This is even higher amongst vulnerable groups such as women, where despite having a slightly higher ratio of educated females to males in Jordan, the female labour force participation rate is at only 14% (ILO, 2017b). According to the World Economic Forum's 2018 Global Gender Gap Index, Jordan has one of the lowest employment rates for women worldwide (World Economic Forum, 2018), suggesting that those females face more obstacles when attempting to enter the workforce than their male counterparts.

This is not just an attribute of the Jordanian labour market, but a common feature across the Arab States

which has the widest gender gap in workforce participation globally at 55% (ILO 2017a). While various policies and reforms to alleviate this have been put in effect, the outlook shows marginal improvement.

In Jordan, females account for 49.3% of the total population, and young females between the ages of 15-24 boast a 99.11% literacy rate (UNESCO, 2019). Exclusion or limited use of such high potential of

human resources carries huge implications for Jordan. Even when viewed through an economic lens, the UNICEF estimates that an increase in the female participation in the Jordanian labour force by 25% over the next seven years would help Jordan's GDP to grow by 5% annually UNICEF.

#### Female youth employment in Jordan: Key Challenges

While it is often presumed that higher educational achievements lead to an easier transition into productive employment opportunities, this does not hold entirely true in the case of Jordan. Even in this case, females are at a greater disadvantage compared to the males. According to the Jordanian Department of Statistics, unemployment rates are highest among those who have attained tertiary education by 24% in comparison to other educational levels. The unemployment of males who carry a bachelor's degree and higher is at 23%, while the same indicator is at 78.2% for females. Approximately 54.7% of the unemployed hold a secondary education certificate or a higher qualification (DOS, 2019). These figures indicate a great loss in the return on investment in terms of education for Jordan. Females may often find themselves confined to a limited range of occupations and places of work that are considered 'acceptable' due to various challenges. One of the main challenges for the country's economy is to shift workers towards higher levels of the value chain as the transition phase from school to work can be extremely long. Based on surveys conducted on a national level, this transition can take up to 3 years (ILO, 2017c).

This can be attributed to a wide array of reasons, the most obvious one being the lack of jobs in the private sector. Job creation in the private sector within Jordan is still primarily in low-skilled jobs which, very often, does not match the expectations of Jordanian youth. For the year of 2017 alone, around 61,000 students have graduated from Jordanian universities. On the other hand, the total net jobs in both the public and private sector was only at 48,000 jobs, many of whom were not entry-level jobs that match these youth's qualifications. Furthermore, out of these 48,000 jobs, only 16,000 required employees who had an educational background beyond high school (Ministry of Labour, 2017). This creates frustration among youth, causing many of them to either continue with further education or detach from the labour market altogether.

Another reason that contributes to further unemployment is the negative perception within the Jordanian population towards vocational training where its institutions are considered weak by many, as it is the stream that requires the lowest academic achievement. The negative stigma associated with certain jobs that are in the service sector or require a lot of physical labour, such as construction work, has left even more Jordanians unemployed (ILO, 2017c). These sectorial jobs are considered undesirable for men and are contemplated as unthinkable for women. This is one of the main reasons that the Jordanian labour market holds an estimate of 1.4 million non-Jordanians workers (Dupire, 2017).

The way employers perceive females is one of the obstacles attributing to joblessness among Jordanian women. Women are perceived as a liability since they may suddenly leave their job and are 'at the risk of being married at any time'. Employers tend to discriminate against females when hiring, because they view them as an uncertainty who may quit abruptly at any point, due to family obligations or even pregnancy. Studies have shown that employers in Jordan are much more likely to invest in building the skills and capacities of their male employees instead of their female counterparts, as they view their development as more long-lasting and sustainable for their firm (UNDP, 2015).




Figure 2: Employers' reasons for preferring male employees in Jordan

Different laws in Jordan, such as the Jordanian Labour Law, emphasise non-discrimination between men and women, however, the gender pay gap in Jordan in both the public and private sector is substantial. **Females working in the private sector in Jordan earn 41% less than their male counterparts,** with an average of JD 1.1 per hour for women vs. JD 2.0 per hour for men. Although often favoured by women, this is also a large problem in the public sector, where the gender pay gap stands at around 28% with an average hourly wage of JD 1.6 for women vs. JD 2.1 per hour for men (Majcher-Teleon & Slimène, 2009). In both sectors, there is occupational segregation where females are highly concentrated in lower paid jobs (ILO, 2013). Even within high ranking positions, female legislators, senior officials and managers are paid around 32% less than the men with similar positions within Jordan (Al-Sharari & AlKhatib, 2015).

The consequences of these obstacles are a missed opportunity cost for the Jordanian economy that negatively affects its GDP. Tax revenues in Jordan convey that an average male contributes to around JD 33,000 in income tax throughout his life, on the other hand, an average Jordanian woman's contribution does not exceed JD 4,600. Women's absence from the labour market also further impacts poverty rates of households and increases dependency ratios (Alami, 2019).

Ensuring the mobilisation of the second half of a very educated population in Jordan presents a huge potential as one of the key factors of economic stability in a dynamic region. No economy can advance to its full potential unless both women and men participate fully. Being half the world's population, women have an equally important role in driving economic growth.

#### **Grappling with the challenges**

#### 1. Raising awareness within the Jordanian society and on a grassroots' level:

Without changing societal views regarding gender stereotypical constructs in terms of the ideal roles associated with masculinity and femininity, top-down reforms will have a limited impact. In order to battle these stereotypes and increase the rate of females participating in the workforce, advocacy and

awareness campaigns by various stakeholders are vigorously required. Raising public awareness about the importance of a female's role in her community not only as a mother, but also as a powerful economic actor and a leader is important. This can be conducted through the implementation of national public awareness programs that encourage dialogues within society to discuss the challenges females face, equity among both genders and the important role women play within their communities.

#### 2. Increasing female representation in decision-making positions:

In order to challenge gender-pay gaps, occupational, and sectoral segregation, women must be in a position to influence and shape legislations and decisions. Improving female participation may first begin with increasing female leadership through targets, quotas and goals ensuring their participation on multiple levels within both the public and private sectors. High levels of civic participation generate substantial positive externalities in the form of greater economic participation which will be further reflected on an increase in the number of females in decision-making positions within the private sector as well.

#### 3. Capacity-building and skills enhancement:

Legislation alone is insufficient to prevent and eliminate gender discrimination. Equal treatment mechanisms must be underpinned by effective remedies and the capacity-building of women, especially through targeted TVET programmes. (Technical and Vocational Education and Training) This requires the cooperation of a multitude of stakeholders from different levels within the Jordanian society. Ministries and educational institutes should target and involve decision-makers within the private sector through policy forums and discussions regarding the challenges females face within the Jordanian labour market. This will assist in the creation of capacity-building programs that may include soft skills trainings, leadership trainings and mentorship to help enhance the skills of young females entering the workforce and help them cater to the needs of the private sector.


Collaboration among different stakeholders and building capacities will help in ensuring optimal utilisation of human capital when the country reaches its demographic dividend. Partnerships between the government and educational institutes, can help in improving the quality of technical and vocational education and training among youth, with a particular focus on females, while providing them with skills that are in line with the private sector's needs. The success of females in jobs stereotypically assigned as 'masculine' work, will help in battling occupational segregation and eliminating gender-biases when recruiting.


#### 4. Public-Private-Partnerships and Gender Mainstreaming:


Negative stigma remains associated with women's work in the private sector. Harmonising working conditions within both the public and private sector will allow the families of females to view the private sector as a source of acceptable employment as well. This is essential as the public sector alone can no longer accommodate the large number of annual male and female graduates. Applying similar working condition requirements to both genders will remove the disincentives and additional costs of hiring a female over a male. For example, amending Article 72 of the Jordanian Labour Law to include entitlement to adequate on-site childcare facilities for both men and women who have children under the age of 4, will remove any extra costs associated with hiring married females, and will level the field for competition among both genders. Moreover, it will help in shattering embedded, society-wide stereotypes where females are viewed as the family's caretaker, and childcare is solely seen as a mother's responsibility. This allows women to continue their career within a company without having to leave work or lose years of experience to take care of their children, and provides private firms with a wider variety of male and female employees to hire from, as opposed to only choosing from a pool of candidates where half of the potential talent is excluded.

#### **MOSAIC PROFILING:** What is your mosaic profile looking like?

Mosaic is a quantitative framework to measure the overall health and growth potential of private companies using non-traditional signals. The Mosaic score is comprised of 3 individual models — what we call the 3 M's, each relying on different signals (although all the signals utilised are not revealed for obvious reasons).

#### Market

The quality of the market or industry a company competes in is critical. If you are part of a hot industry, that serves as a tailwind to push you along. Conversely, being in an out of favour space means fewer investors, partners, media, and more. The market model looks at the number of companies in an industry, the financing and exit momentum in the space, and the overall quality and quantity of investors participating in that industry.

#### Money

The money model assesses the financial health of a company, i.e. is it going to run out of money? Look at burn rate, the quality of the investors and syndicate that may be part of the company, its financing position relative to industry peers and competitors, and more.

#### Momentum

The final model is momentum, look at a variety of volume and frequency signals including social media, news / media, sentiment, and partnership and customer momentum. Look at these on an absolute and relative basis vs. peers / industry comparables. The relative piece is critical as it ensures that, for example, enterprise software companies who may get less media attention or who spend less time on social media are not penalised versus consumer-focused tech companies.



## Cooperatives for the Local People

Cooperative arrangements within communities may be focused upon small area enterprises through to whole of nation endeavours to bring to the global markets high volumes of quality goods derived through value adding processes applied to natural resources and regional produce from the land, river and sea, encapsulating all elements of farming and animal produce.

Microfinance typically engages a cooperative of around five women when financing home enterprises. A cooperative is particularly useful when local fishermen bring their catches together at canneries for preparation to market their fish to foreign markets.

The introduction of 'Craft Creations' is to enliven the community's recognition of their high quality traditional skills and then enable their customary craftware to be globally marketed through a cooperative of their own making.

This is all about cooperatives to bring to the fore traditional and innate skills that fulfil needs for people around the globe, not just the local village. A cooperative may embrace several nations.

Natural resources that may be used in producing high quality goods in large volumes include:

Forrest logs processed into high quality furniture in volume for large distribution chains. Timber offcuts for high strength laminated beams and reconstituted timber products. Local building systems utilising local resources for durable housing – local market solutions. Hydroponics particularly for produce that is not native to the area and its climate. Aquaculture in rivers, estuaries and sea to mitigate depletion of ocean resources. Traditional home produce being increased in volume to provide famine relief worldwide. Hemp production to be on scale to enable volumes sufficient for manufacturing processing. Cocoa, coffee, moringa, sandalwood, tea, vanilla, plus others, cropping to be of commercial scale, cooperatively run. All farming and animal produce come into the equation for cooperatives.

What is available within a region and what may be introduced can now be thoroughly appraised and reviewed scientifically through local endeavours and with the support of research organisations such as CSIRO of Australia, increasing commercial options and products.

Nothing beats the insight and wisdom of the locals. Their FEELINGS, as well as our own, are to be embraced. Our feelings are the greatest guide as to how and what we are to embrace.

Education at all levels for all ages is our never ending journey. How it has been in ages gone by is not how it will continue. Dynamic change is unfolding and for those who embrace change, our futures are enticing, for those who don't they will have difficulties. We are to embrace and value add our natural resources, we are not to rape and pillage our environment, the forests are to remain, the rivers clean and our oceans are to restock with fish.

Now is the time for nation building, now we are to embrace self-sufficiency without the need for foreign goods and services. We have all we need within us and within our environment, so let us build the way forward for all within our community and show the world how it is to be.

### Microfinance

SPBD is a network of microfinance organisations working in Samoa, Tonga, Fiji, Solomon Islands and Vanuatu dedicated to eradicating poverty by empowering women in poor rural villages with the opportunity to start, grow and maintain sustainable, income generating micro-enterprises.

## Philosophy

SPBD's philosophy of lending is based on a **respect for each individual's innate human ingenuity**, **drive and self-esteem**. It's these qualities that make people creditworthy, not the collateral which traditional banks demand. By providing access to capital, SPBD allows women and their families to pursue their dreams and achieve their full potential. **We provide the opportunities to empower the poorest members of society** to make significant improvements in their lives.

## Methodology

#### **Micro-enterprise Development**

SPBD provides small, unsecured loans of around US\$400 to groups of rural women, who invest these loans into businesses based on their existing livelihood skills. They are given training, ongoing guidance and motivation for the purpose of helping them to grow these small income generating endeavours so that they can work their way out of poverty. This is a very structured program with clear rules.

#### **Childhood Education**

From the second loan onwards, members are encouraged to invest the proceeds of their loans for basic housing improvement and childhood education. SPBD helps to ensure the children of all our members receive a proper education by providing financing to pay for school fees, school uniforms and textbooks.

#### **Housing Improvements**

SPBD helps to improve the healthiness of our member's homes by providing financing for basic housing improvements such as obtaining access to electricity, running piped water, proper sanitation, building a secure foundation for their home (instead of a dirt floor) and to place a tin roof on their home (instead of a grass roof).

#### **Savings**

It is expensive and difficult for the poor to open bank accounts at traditional commercial banks. SPBD helps our members save for a rainy day and to develop good financial habits by providing a basic savings service. By saving with SPBD, members have a safe and convenient place to make small and regular savings deposits.

#### **Insurance**

SPBD offers a loan- and life insurance product to all its members. In the event of a member's death, her family receives a benefit. This assurance of no hardship on the remaining family is something that many of our members greatly value.

#### **Peer Group Support**

All SPBD members are part of a self-chosen group of four to seven women. In each village there might be two to five SPBD groups. The members of the peer groups support and guarantee one another. They are the first line of approval on all new business plans and loan applications of their group members. They act as weekly guarantors on all loan repayments and they play a vital role in the ongoing guidance and motivation of each SPBD micro-entrepreneur. For example, if a client falls ill, her circle helps with her business until she is well. If a client gets discouraged, the support group pulls her through. This contributes substantially to the extremely high repayment rate of loans made to microfinance entrepreneurs.

#### **Weekly Meetings**

SPBD has weekly meetings in the local villages with all its members. At these meetings all SPBD related business takes place, including business training modules, review of business plans, loan applications and approvals, weekly loan repayments, savings deposits, and ongoing business mentoring and coaching.

#### Competition

SPBD faces limited direct competition as the commercial- and Development Banks each require collateral or a steady income for micro/small business financing. SPBD is one of the only financial institutions able to deliver credit in Samoa, Tonga, or Fiji individually and to provide on a large scale completely unsecured credit to the poor. (Services are opening in other nations, such as Papua New Guinea.)

#### **Clients**

SPBD serves women living in both rural and peri-urban areas who are vulnerable to the consequences of poverty. These include single mothers, the unemployed, minorities, the poor in health, the disabled, the unbanked, and potential victims of domestic violence. Of the total number of loans distributed:

- 99% go to women
- 80% go to clients living in rural areas
- 40% go to single mothers

## The Healing Power of "Bello" - Beautiful:

How an Italian community uses craftsmanship to rehabilitate some of Europe's most intractable drug addicts.

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In the hills above Rimini, Italy, is a restaurant renowned across the region for its pizza. The terrace, surrounded by flowering trees, overlooks vineyards that roll down to the distant Adriatic Sea. In the centre of the restaurant, called "*SP.accio*," tattooed men knead, shape, and twirl dough in a gleaming, open kitchen. The cooks follow the standard routine of any good *pizzaiolo*—they sprinkle on herbs and cheese, and slip the pies into a fiercely-hot, wood-burning oven—but they cook with unusual focus and passion, as if their very lives depended on the perfection of these pizzas.

"The dough teaches you," says Massimo Bertoglia, the head chef, as he shapes a piece into a round. "You have to have constancy, and you have to have care." He pauses to survey his results and seems pleased. "If you don't care for it, it will die."

Unlike most rehab methods, SanPa doesn't rely on therapists, substitute drug treatment, 12-step programs, or religion. Instead, it treats addiction as a community problem, where an individual's destructive tendencies can be changed by becoming a member of a big family, Italian-style, participating in work and education for the common good.

Bertoglia's pizza philosophy is far more than a metaphor. Learning to become a pizzaiolo actually did help to save his life. A former drug addict, Bertoglia is one of some 26,000 people since 1978 who have come to San Patrignano, the addiction recovery community that runs this restaurant, as a last-ditch effort to pull himself out of a life centred on doing anything necessary to get his next fix. Everyone who works at SP.accio, from Chef Bertoligia to the waiters, busboys, and the woman who sells gifts in the boutique ("spaccio" means store in Italian) is either a current resident or a graduate of the rehab program. Some of the best chefs in Italy come here to train the pizzaioli, who are highly sought-after in Italy after graduation.

It's easy to see why. All the ingredients at the restaurant, Bertoglia explains, are *kilometro zero*—produced within view of the terrace tables, from the tomatoes and basil to the wine, mozzarella cheese, prosciutto, and delicate date cookies served with espresso at the end of their meals. The pizza crust—a crucial and elusive art in the pizza world—achieves an unusual quality here because it's part wholewheat, and it's made with natural yeast, with a "mother" dough that has to be refreshed three times a day. The resulting pizza, Bertoglia says as he thumps the dough, is more easily digestible than a pizza made with commercial yeasts. It's a bit like a Napolitano pizza—large, chewy, with a big border—but not quite as soft.

On my way out of the restaurant, I pass a sumptuous deli and gift boutique that tells the story of a community that makes much more than pizza. Cheeses, cured meats, wine, pastries, olive oil, and other quality foods are all made at

San Patrignano (SanPa), a campus covering 642 acres that includes farms and vineyards, and where some 1500 residents and 300 staff currently reside. Another room in the boutique features high-quality leather goods and finely-spun shawls and scarves, all with the SanPa logo: a tree of life. SanPa is also renowned for breeding horses and dogs, fine woodworking, graphic arts, and other sophisticated crafts. The income from the residents' efforts covers about 60 percent of the community's operating budget of 27 million euros (just over 30 million dollars). The rest is made up by donations to the private non-profit organization, some of which come from billionaire Italian patrons.



#### The Philosophy of 'Bello'

SanPa is unlike other Rehab Centres in the world for a variety of reasons. First is the length of stay, which is three and a half years. By contrast, the average stay in a Rehab Centre in the United States, according to the National Survey on Drug Use and Health, is 28 days. Second, unlike most rehab methods, SanPa doesn't rely on therapists, substitute drug treatment, 12-step programs, or religion. Instead, it treats addiction less as

a medical problem than a community problem, where an individual's lack of self-esteem and destructive tendencies can be changed by becoming a members of a big family, Italian-style, participating in work and education for the common good. (For an intimate sense of this culture, see our documentary short, "The Philosophy of *Bello*, in our sidebar column.)

Third, the entire program is free to the residents and their families. While this is costly up front—\$48,000 per resident year, including food, lodging, medical, and education and training costs—it saves taxpayers enormous sums over the long run. SanPa's directors estimate that its program saves the Italian government

23 million Euros each year (or about \$27.5 million) in costs it would otherwise spend on incarceration or governmental rehabilitation.

And fourth, unlike other Rehab Centres that sell their wares, SanPa doesn't produce crafty tchotchkes; it is dedicated instead to the production of high-quality goods that are sold to top Italian restaurants, fashion houses, and architects. According to SanPa's philosophy of rehabilitation, fine craftsmanship is essential to building self-esteem, and that ensures not only the residents' success but also the program's sustainability. And each craft sector seems to develop this idea its own way.

#### HIPPIE COMMUNE, ITALIAN-STYLE

Every resident commits to the full three-and-a-half-year residency. During this time they aren't paid for their work, but they learn a trade and may get a university education.

San Patrignano was founded 40 years ago Vincenzo Muccioli, by a hotelier who inherited a **200-hectare Estate** and wanted to do something about the drug addicts he saw in nearby Rimini. He began inviting addicts to his San Patrignano estate for Christmas, and then started bringing addicts home to live with his family. Eventually, he founded an informal alternative medicine free clinic at their weekend farm, and then began building the community.

Muccioli had no training as a psychologist or addiction specialist when he started the Centre; he was a messianic do-gooder with New Age interests. But he had a clear idea that the best way to treat drug addiction was to make addicts feel like they were part of a community that depended on them for its well-being. He and his wife invited addicts to live in San Patrignano on three conditions: They had to

stop all drug use, they couldn't ask for money from the government, and they had to choose among different income-producing activities to make SanPa a self-sustaining community. Instead of traditional therapy, **inmates talked while they worked**. Eventually, medical and psychological facilities were added on campus for a few residents, but the model was based on a feeling of belonging and working that raised self-esteem.

Soon, addicts in sleeping bags began to camp in line outside San Patrignano for weeks, awaiting a coveted spot in what was then akin to a hippie commune, where everything, from the buildings

and chairs to the cheese and wine, was made by the residents. In the 1980s, when few clinics would care for patients with HIV/AIDS, Muccioli opened a FOURTY (40) Bed Clinic for them at San Patrignano; several people with AIDS are still in residence.

Muccioli, who died in 1995, had powerful friends who funded his project: he'd been in a meditation group with Gian Marco and Letizia Moratti, billionaire oil industrialists who ranked among the wealthiest financiers in Italy, and who bankrolled San Patrignano from the start, encouraging other aristocratic (and often right-leaning) Italians to contribute to their foundation. Gian Marco died in 2018, but Letizia continues to help govern SanPa; she has also been mayor of Milan and the first female president of the RAI, Italy's public broadcasting company. This network of high-ranking political and business friends has helped give San Patrignano tax breaks and other financial benefits, forging collaborations with top Italian designers, chefs, architects, and fashion brands.

From the start, Muccioli made his own rules, and while he was beloved in the community, he was also attacked by some ex-residents and the media for being a dictator, and for his unconventional methods, which in the 1980s occasionally involved harsh punishments and violence (the rationale was that drug addiction inevitably caused death, and so they used whatever means necessary to save lives). In one scandal, Muccioli was accused of covering up the beating death of a resident, planting heroin on the



corpse and claiming the death was an overdose; he was convicted but did not serve time—again, because of powerful political allies.

Since Muccioli's death, San Patrignano has been reorganized into a more conventional non-profit structure with several boards of governance and oversight, and a network of community ties throughout Italy, and the scandals have ceased. SanPa now downplays its history, which is absent from its website, and instead focuses on the future, collaborating with several European groups to work on expanding its model of rehabilitation to other countries.

Today, San Patrignano, situated atop a hill above Rimini, looks more like a modern, well-endowed college campus than a commune. And while SanPa has a reputation for being a closed community, the family immediately opened its doors to a visiting journalist.

Antonio Tinelli, who until recently was the president of San Patrignano, and who entered the program as a cocaine-addicted financial trader (almost everyone who works at SanPa was once a resident there), says that over the years, the community has learned from its mistakes. "There was a time when we had a lot to learn, and there were moments during the 80s when drugs were difficult to combat, and it looked like they were going to win," he says.

"After trial and error, San Patrignano has built a structure that helps drug addicts find solutions and survive in the midst of all the challenges and difficulties of their lives."

When he first arrived, Tinelli was sent to work with the Centre's various animals; one of Muccioli's beliefs was that working with animals, whether horses, dogs, or farm animals, could help addicts calm down and give them an opportunity to connect with, and be responsible for, another living being. "They asked if I liked animals, and I said sure, thinking about cats and dogs," Tinelli recalled. One of the first jobs the slick financial trader was confronted with was midwifing a calf. "There I was, covered in everything that comes out of a cow giving birth, holding a tiny calf in my hands, and I knew it was more than a metaphor. This, here, is a new life."

Tinelli explained that when new residents arrive, each is assigned a "guardian angel," someone who is a year ahead of them in recovery, to act as a guide; they live, work, eat, and sleep alongside each other, providing constant peer support. The residents work in "sectors"— woodworking, textiles, graphic arts, baking, animal husbandry, wine, and many others—with people they eat and live with as a family. Every resident commits to the full three-and-a-half-year residency, during which time they learn a trade and may get a university education. They aren't paid for their work while they are in the community, but the products they make help support their stay, which is free.

During the first year, the residents (they are called *ragazzi* inside the community, which loosely translates to "*guys*") are allowed no contact with family except via hand-written letters. Men are housed separately from women, who are TWENTY PERCENT (20%) of the residents. For the entire stay, the *ragazzi* have no access to cell phones or the Internet. ("The real detox," as one told me.) San Patrignano claims that, upon release, nearly NINETY PERCENT (90%) of its residents are employed through its network of trade and community partners, and that SEVENTY PERCENT (70%) stay sober in three-year follow-up surveys conducted by the University of Bologna—impressive statistics in this field. While data on rehab success, including SanPa's, is hazy at best, the best Centres in the US claim only a THIRTY PERCENT (30%) rate of recovery.

# REHAB: COMMUNAL COOKIE-MAKING VS. AN OIL CHANGE

To understand its success, I toured San Patrignano to talk with some of the residents. From the administrative offices, with its large graphic design lab, I walked along a muraled alley wafting with breezes of something good in the oven. When I ducked into the bakery and watched the ragazzi shaping loaves of bread and mixing up cookie dough, I immediately noticed a light-hearted atmosphere—the



guys comfortably joking with each other as they kneaded vast quantities of dough.

In addition to all the bread for the community, and monthly birthday cakes for the residents, the bakery sector makes cookies, breads, and 35,000 buttery fruit-filled *panettone* at Christmas for commercial sale outside. When one of the guys, arms covered in tattoos, offered me samples, the quality was immediately apparent. The fig and walnut cookie was moist, chewy, and crispy at the same time. A corn and orange biscuit was both flavourful and delicate. No ordinary cookies, these.

Between bites, I chatted with Gregory Raimo, an Italian-American from New Jersey who had the toughguy looks and voice of Robert De Niro in *Taxi Driver*. His arms and chest were covered in rough tattoos. "I've done a lot of damage," he said, and indeed, I wouldn't want to meet those piercing blue eyes on a street corner at night. "Jail, rehab, nothing helped. In the United States, you get eight days detox, then a month of rehab—it's like an oil change. You go back outside and go right back to drugs and the life you were living before."

Desperate to find help for his drug problem, Raimo had to search beyond the U.S. He came to Italy when his Italian grandparents suggested San Patrignano as a final option. (While the program is technically open to foreigners, entry can be tricky for Americans to obtain. Among other things, it requires a three-year medical visa for a program that, by U.S. standards, is not accredited.) For Raimo, communal living was a big change. "Back home I minded my own business. Here, everybody knows if



you have a problem," he said. "It's not easy, but if it was easy, it wouldn't work." I asked him if would be interested in going into baking when he leaves. "I'm not big on cookies, to tell you the truth," he said, flashing a warm smile. "But I've learned a lot about organizing here. I'm good at organizing. I figure if I finish this, I can do anything."

# A THREAD OF QUALITY FROM THE PAST TO THE PRESENT

Next door, I entered the "Design Lab," a Textile Studio where I found FORTY (40) mostly young



women at work. The room on the left was filled with sewing machines, and on the right, giant, old-fashioned wooden looms. Each had a spread of colourful yarn, and the women sat in twos operating the looms, passing the shuttle under the threads. There was a quiet, regular rhythm of work in the room.

San Patrignano is one of the few places in Europe that continues to make hand-painted wallpaper. Claudia Corazza, a woman in her fifties who was helping a colleague thread a large loom, arrived at San Patrignano

when she was 18, an alcoholic and addict. "At that time, it was all mud and country living," she said. The weaving sector is one of the oldest at SanPa, initially taught by a woman who was a master weaver. "She was a little nonina—a grandmother—who showed us the basics, and she was glad to pass along what was a dying tradition," Corazza said.

From the start, SanPa invited older artisans to teach. Many had done their life's cycle of work and wanted to transmit their skills to another generation. The workshops taught by the artisans—weavers, Michelin-starred chefs, cheesemakers, winemakers, designers—created a foundation for SanPa to preserve those artisanal traditions. "Our ragazzi learn to make something that isn't slap-dash or just okay or good enough, but something with their hands, passions, and originality," said Tinelli.



Slow, deliberate work like weaving, he said, can help replace the immediate cravings of drugs. "Gradually, they learn that satisfaction isn't immediate, but longer, and more beautiful and profound. It comes from sacrifice and discipline, and the ragazzi have a sense of filling the emptiness inside, and of discovering a passion for life and quality."

Corazza, for example, took a course in weaving at SanPa, worked in the sector for years, and then stayed on to help others. Designers and others in the fashion world still visit. "It's a constant transmission of knowledge," she said.

Lisa Carrara, threading the loom with Claudia, has been at SanPa for over six years. "My parents brought me here, against my will, but I kept going," she said. After her three-year rehabilitation, she stayed on as a teacher. "Weaving helps you concentrate, and it gives you something to do. Sometimes you talk, and sometimes you take a moment to cry."

"Also," Corazza pointed out, "you learn mathematics." Figuring out measurements and quantities of yarn for weaving takes a good deal of calculation.

The women tell me that working in the all-female weaving sector helps the young women, most of whom have been raped or have prostituted themselves in order to get money for drugs. Almost all of them have suffered some form of violence and abuse. In contrast, the weaving workshop radiates calm, offering a safe place for women to untangle their feelings and experiences.

The weaving is still based on the techniques of the Nonina, but updated with new technology. There are nine looms in the weaving sector, ranging from 1.5 metres to 3 metres wide; each is equipped with 24 heddles—the wire cords that the thread passes through to create a weaving against the warp thread. Where older looms required a lot of pedals, which lifted shafts that determine a textile's design, a computer now operates those shafts. The computerisation allows for more complicated designs, and

fewer mistakes, but the actual weaving is still done by hand; each weaving, which is turned into a shawl, clothing, or a throw, takes two to three days to produce.

The weaving sector works on commission from fashion houses such as Chanel, Ferragamo, Brunello Cucinelli, and Zegna, as well as making San Patrignano-branded scarves and shawls that they sell to the public. At the workshop's entrance, an armoire displays samples for sale. With one touch, it's easy to tell that everything is made of the finest cashmere, silk, or linen. I couldn't resist a baby blanket-soft cashmere shawl in cloud blue with a dark border for \$140; similar items destined for Chanel will retail for \$1,200.

PRANZO: LUNCH, THE GREAT PROVIDER OF QUALITY AND

#### **COMMUNITY**

At precisely 12:30, the residents headed to an enormous dining hall, which can seat 1,200 people at long wooden tables, where the residents eat with others from their sectors. A wide arc of floor-to-ceiling windows shows off hundreds of acres of vineyards outside. Before eating, everyone in the room stands for a moment of silence. "It's a moment to offer thanks, or to reflect," said Tinelli. "It is not religious, but it can be." Many of the residents crossed themselves, then everyone sat.

White-coated waiters listed the lunch choices, served in the Italian style—a pasta *primi*, followed by a main dish. Everyone takes turns working as a waiter and serving others, rotating during the month. Like everything else at San Patrignano, most of the food was grown and processed on the premises. In this large, industrial dining room, I was stunned to find my plate of pasta was steaming and perfectly *al dente*, with creamy home-made ricotta cheese and sun-dried tomatoes.

"We're preserving and transmitting Italian culture, in which the idea of eating with a family is very important," said Tinelli. Until recently, in accordance with Italian tradition, everyone was allowed one glass of San Patrignano wine at lunch and dinner, but because many are alcoholic and had problems with the wine, now they drink water. After lunch, also in keeping with Italian rhythms, everyone takes time to nap or relax before getting back to work later in the afternoon.

#### WORK: THE GREAT EQUALIZER

That afternoon, I visited the leather sector, where residents stitch San Patrignano-branded handbags, and produce others for Italian fashion houses, including the high-end leather company Tod's, whose owners and designers have come to SANPA to offer workshops. Each person was at a station,

sewing zippers, cutting leather, or hand-stitching. Unlike at a commercial leather workshop I visited in the United States, the atmosphere was cheerful and talkative. Interestingly, this is one of the few sectors where men and women work together.

Why don't we see SanPa's model across the U.S.? "We're living in a world where everyone wants things cured in five minutes, shoot everybody up with drugs so we don't have to worry about whether we can change their lives," says Mimi Silbert, the founder and long-time president of Delancey Street. "People are terrified to do long, hard things."

I was struck by how diverse this group was—in age as well as life circumstances. When I asked Tinelli how someone like him—bright, educated, making piles of money as a financial trader—was able to bond with homeless heroin addicts and people with misspelled prison tattoos, he said it wasn't easy at first. "San Patrignano taught me one of the most important things I lacked: humility."

Marco Castelli, a 43-year-old Italian with a scruffy beard who was painting the edges of some pebbled calf leather that would become a luxury handbag, learned that lesson the hard way. Castelli is an engineer by training, and he used to work at the Italian fashion house Gucci, living a fast lifestyle fuelled by copious amounts of cocaine. In a story familiar to most addicts and their friends, the more Castelli used, the more of his stylish friends dropped away; soon he was left isolated, working long hours to support his habit. At a certain point, his income couldn't cover his drugs, and he found himself begging for money from his friends and parents. One by one, they turned away from him. Eventually he lost his job, his home, his friends, and his savings in pursuit of the next line of coke.

"After 23 years of abusing drugs, I decided I needed a change," said Castelli, who has spent over two years at SanPa. "I had two separate roads in front of me, and only one of them was life." Now he spends his time teaching his Gucci design sense and standards to fellow addicts in the leather workshop.

At one work table in the leather sector, women were stitching together stuffed animals made with real fur for the luxury market. One woman in her 50s, Roberta (who preferred not to use her last name), had a face etched

with the lines of a hard life. A former accountant, she became a heroin addict. After revolving in and out of TWO (2) Rehab Centres, she was clean from heroin but separated from her husband and had turned to alcohol. "San Patrignano was like the last beach," she said. It took a big commitment to stay in; she recently missed her daughter's wedding. But she said she is content, and somewhat amazed at her luck. "I could never have imagined this place. We get good food, a place to stay, and friends. Demonstrating a fur rabbit with evident pride," she said, "This place is beautiful, and we make these beautiful things."

A couple of tables over from Roberta, Kyra (who also did not want to use her last name), a woman in her early 20s who has spent two years here, was stitching wallets. An American from a celebrity family, she has dark hair, wide green eyes, and prep school elocution. "My aunt's friend was a friend of the founder, and she asked if I could enter," she said.

Kyra started taking pills on weekends as a child for fun, and the habit escalated, especially since her parents were rarely present. She'd been a debutante and interned at a famous fashion house; her Instagram feed prior to San Patrignano reveals someone who was a rich, partying, hot mess. "I had no morals when I arrived here," she said. "I didn't know what a relationship was. I had to learn to listen to people. San Patrignano has transformed me."

Despite her upbringing, with housekeepers and nannies, Kyra doesn't see the labour of stitching wallets as drudgery. "I'm passionate about fashion, and studied it, but I never thought I could use my hands to create something," she said. "Instead of

going into fashion as a business, now I want to go into design. I've been able to learn about leather, which is complex." Kyra has also taken courses in the textile sector, adding to her education in the hands-on side of fashion, which she took for granted before. "I came from a very fast-paced lifestyle, and this work, learning a skill, and these people have saved my life."

#### A RARE CRAFT, REVIVED

The most unusual craft workshop in San Patrignano's design lab produces hand-painted wallpaper, or *carta da pareti*. When I visited, two ragazzi spread a thin, gluey mixture on long rolls of paper, which then went into a kiln to be cured. When the paper came out, it was painted with one or more of three methods: stencils, silk-screen, or hand-painting with brushes. One of the guys in the workshop, a 36-year-old named Diego, paged through a sample book of wallpaper with geometric patterns, faux parquets, and marble inlay, damask, *chinoiserie*, and floral motifs that looked like they'd adorn the walls of palaces and Italian villas: in fact, they do, along with decorating yachts, luxury hotels, restaurants, and boutiques.

Hand-painted wallpaper—a single panel starts at thousands of dollars and may take 100 hours to paint—is a rare craft these days. Imported to Europe from China in the 18<sup>th</sup> century, the art form became popular among Italy's aristocracy. The late Renzo Mongiardino, one of the country's best-known designers of commercial and residential interiors as well as film sets, was a master of using hand-painted wallpaper to create illusion—

Moroccan tilework, drapery, frescoes, floral motifs. He designed homes for the uber-wealthy, as well as for directors including Franco Zeffirelli. Early in SanPa's history, he also brought his teaching skills to the community.

The difficulty with this wallpaper, since its colours are mixed and painted by hand, is achieving consistency over an entire wall. "You have to throw out a lot of pieces," said Diego. "It may take a year to do one large job. You need patience." Diego says he loves working with wallpaper, but once he's out of San Patrignano, he isn't sure he'll find work in the field. "Hand-painted wallpaper is a very restricted art," he said. "But I'll find something using these painting and design skills. It's become a passion."

#### CAN SANPA WORK ANYWHERE ELSE?

San Patrignano has now spread to THREE (3) Satellite Centres, one (1) in London and TWO (2) in Italy, and it participates in world conferences on rehabilitation, partnering with other like-minded programs in Europe. Given that more than 72,000 people died of drug-related deaths in the U.S. last year, and more than 8,000 in Europe, many people have studied SanPa to determine if the model could work elsewhere. But it's not easy to replicate.

The closest relative to SanPa in the United States is Delancey Street, a San Francisco-based rehabilitation program for violent criminals and drug abusers that has a similar approach. Mimi Silbert, founder and long-time president of Delancey Street and a criminal justice expert, praised the Italian program, which she called a "sister organisation." Like SanPa, Delancey Street rejects traditional therapeutic approaches in favour of making the addict feel like an important participant in a community, and accountable to its members.

At <u>Delancey Street</u>, which has expanded from its San Francisco home to SIX (6) other Treatment Centres around the country, residents run a restaurant, a moving company, and make some furniture and crafts. <u>The cost of a Delancey Street residency, which typically runs for about FOUR (4) Years, is approximately \$30,000 a year-close to the \$48,000 cost of a San Patrignano residency.</u> However, like SanPa's directors, Silbert argues that this expense ultimately saves on public costs for repeat incarcerations, to say nothing of superficial prison rehabilitation programs that usually fail, imposing further costs on society. But Delancey Street's model is not widely replicated, either.

"The reason they don't end up replicating us is primarily because of money," says Silbert. "In Italy, they have a great donor. We don't, so we have a great struggle—but a willingness to struggle." She says most treatment programs fail because they are short-term, partly for reasons of money and insurance, and don't provide residents with the sense of support and family they need.

"Instead of taking people who have messed up their lives and treating them as these poor people who need our help, we search for their strengths and develop them," said Silbert. "Making crafts develops those strengths, lets them be creative, gives them something to be passionate about, and teaches them to rely on each other in order to work together. In the process they discover their own self-reliance," she said. But few programs have the resources or patience to try such an approach.



And at one of Italy's prisons: Rehabilitation through wine-making. Why not?

"Right now, we're living in a world where everyone wants things cured in FIVE (5) minutes, shoot everybody up with drugs so we don't have to worry about whether we can change their lives," she said. "We're living in a time when people are terrified to do long, hard things. Change takes a long time, but it's worth it."

Another factor that makes SanPa difficult to replicate is its very Italian-ness; it grew in a country where the history and value of craft is woven into the fabric of society. One Australian team visiting SanPa concluded, "San Patrignano is un-replicable in its entirety, due to its history, its scale, its location, and the Italian culture in which it is situated."

Lucia Rughi, SanPa's communications director, is married to one of founder Muccioli's sons, Giacomo, who has become a veterinarian. "*Our philosophy*," she says, "*is the education of bello*." Within that philosophy, the process of understanding and working toward beauty is the only means to combat the ugliest expression of self-loathing: addiction.

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
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
